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The complaint recited that upon petition of Umatilla county the commission permitted the county to make certain changes in the Helly-Van Syde market road, crossing the plaintiff's roadbed in several places. The costs of such crossing to be apportioned between the county and railway.

Later an amended petition was submitted to the commission for a new crossing upon which a hearing was held at Pendleton September 18. Findings of the commission were served on the railroad November 12, showing the work to be valued at \$27,500 of which \$10,000 was for the crossing in question with half of this amount due from the plaintiff.

The railway company contended that as a result of the work done the company has been damaged more than this amount, holding that the county trespassed on railway property, damaged the company's drainage system and buried pipe lines.

ENGLAND READY TO INTERVENE IN MANCHURIA (Continued from page 1) In communication with Chang Tso-Ping, Chinese minister in Berlin, Soviet Denies Aggression MOSCOW, Nov. 27.—Russia, official government organ, today stated that the Red army activities in Manchuria during the past week were purely defensive in character and were taken in answer to repeated provocative assaults of Chinese and white-guard bands on Soviet territory.

The paper declares that panic stricken and demoralized Chinese troops and Russian white guard bands have been making a disorderly retreat from the Manchurian border into the interior. A general panicky mood among the Chinese military leaders after the disarmament of more than 8,000 Chinese soldiers and officers and the seizure of a large quantity of arms and ammunition by the Red army, says Izvestia, created abroad a distorted and greatly exaggerated representation of the actual situation and the Red army activities on the Manchurian front.

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"Soviet troops are believed to have withdrawn from the railway zone."
