

SELF-SUPPORTING U. OF O. STUDENTS IN THE MAJORITY

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Nov. 27.—(Special)—Students who are wholly or partially self-supporting at the University of Oregon, out-number students who depend on others for support more than two to one, figures announced by Earl M. Palfrey, registrar, today.

19 per cent self-supporting." Ninety-four failed to state an answer to this question. The figures show the surprising number of 792 students, or more than a fourth, entirely self-supporting. Of this number 697 are men and 185 are women. Students earning more than half of their way total 1488, or half of the student body. Of this number 1145 are men and 343 are women.
