Regulations for Holiday Mailings Issued by the Roseburg Post Office

The necessity for the "Mail Early" slogan is being again brought to the attention of all for the delivery of Christmas packages before Christmas day, says C. S. Heinline, local postmaster. This year there will be no post offices open in the United States on Christmas day and the more than 350,000 employees will eat their Christmas turkey at home with their families.

By observing the following postal regulations patrons will greatly assist in the delivery of holiday packages:

"You must place your name and address on all packages, before they can be accepted," Mr. Heinline says. "Place the address on one side of the package only and do not use holiday stickers to seal the edges as this makes your mail carry the first class rate. Place no stickers on the face or address side. No packages intended for foreign shipment can be accepted with any stickers on the parcel. Remember not to inclose a letter with your gifts as this also subjects the matter to the first class rate of postage. It is permissible to use the words 'do not open until Christmas'."

"Incure your packages and thus protect the value of your gift as the price is so reasonable. The fees are: For parcel not over \$5.00, 5 cents; not over \$25.00, 8 cents; not over \$50.00, 10 cents; not over \$100.00, 25 cents. A return receipt is only 3 cents extra. These insurance rates are in addition to the regular postage."

"A special delivery stamp will insure the delivery even on Christmas day."

In sending mail to foreign countries the following is the last possible date of mailing to assure delivery before December 25th:

England December 10
France December 10
Germany December 10

PILGRIMS BARRED FROM GRAVE PRAY OUTSIDE GATES

MALDEN, Mass., Nov. 27.—Barred from entering Holy Cross cemetery under an edict issued by William Cardinal O'Connell, archbishop of Boston, pilgrims who had come here from afar to seek spiritual relief for ailments at the grave of Rev. Patrick J. Power, today knelt and prayed outside the cemetery gates. The cemetery was closed to visitors Monday to permit the Roman Catholic church to investigate claims of cure after prayer at the grave.

Many of those who gathered near the gates had come from distant points without knowing of Cardinal O'Connell's ban. Their appeals to cemetery officials for admittance were unavailing. The number of pilgrims was at no time more than fifty, as compared with thousands numbering more than 100,000 who have visited the grave on several days.

KLAN BLAMED FOR BLOODY REVOLT IN COLORADO PRISON

DENVER, Colo., Nov. 28.—A declaration of the existence of an organized Ku Klux Klan group within the walls of the Colorado penitentiary with both guard and convict members during the height of the Klan power, presented a new angle today in the investigation of the mutiny at the penitentiary October 3.

The charge was made by Thomas J. Tynan, who for 16 years was warden of the prison, in appearing before Governor William H. Adams' special commission investigating the riot. He testified that plotting of the Klan against the prison administration for several years had caused a collapse of discipline in handling prisoners.

Lack of proper discipline, traceable to this organization, was responsible for the outbreak of last month, during which a handful of convicts barricaded in a cell house held the entire law enforcement machinery of the state at bay for more than 18 hours and resulted in the death of 13 persons, eight of them guards, the former warden asserted.
