

## ST. MARY'S DOWN'S U. OF O. GRIDDERS BY SCORE OF 31-6

Victors' Goal Crossed For  
First Time in Season;  
Browne Goes Over  
in 4th Period.

Willamette Wins Northwest  
Crown By 40-13 Victory  
Over Whitman; Ucla  
Trims Montana.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 28.—St. Mary's football team won its 1930 season yesterday by defeating the University of Oregon Gridders, 31 to 6, in a game that cost the victors the enviable record of being the only major eleven in the country to complete the year without having its goal line crossed.

Browne, Oregon half, caught a 15-yard pass from Robinson, half, back, in the final period and scored the only goal in the game. The goal was scored by St. Mary's, the supreme achievement, but the Gael supporters consoled themselves with the knowledge that Coach Bill McGowan's charges remained in the list of the undefeated college teams in the nation.

The Gaels swung into their stride early in the game, scoring three touchdowns in the first and another in the second period.

Smashing through the Oregon line that had yielded to only Stanbackfield's punt, a Gael scored a goal that had yielded to only Stanford and Idaho this season.

The fourth period was five minutes gone when a 26-yard pass put Oregon on St. Mary's 40-yard line. Robinson, Webfoot, negro, threw another pass and the officials ruled that Boyle, St. Mary's half, had interfered with the receiver. The ball was placed on the St. Mary's 20-yard line and while thousands held their breath in suspense, Robinson tossed a pass to Browne who ran five yards to place the ball behind the St. Mary's goal line for the first time this season.

Fighting mad, St. Mary's rallied to score their fifth touchdown and from that time until the final gun the two teams struggled on even terms.

**Willamette Gets Crown**  
WALLA WALLA, Wash., Nov. 28.—Coach Elmer Koenig's Willamette university football squad is today champion of the Pacific Northwest football conference by reason of their overwhelming defeat of Whitman college here yesterday, 40 to 13. Whitman was crushed by a slashing attack as the Willamette backs, led by Erickson and French and Fullback Lange went through the Whitman line almost at will, while Tackles Jones and Carpenter played havoc with Whitman's offense. Erickson was the best groundbreaker for the Willamette valley aggregation in a game that was a real exhibition of open field running. Five out of six of the victor's touchdowns were made from passes. With Rogers and Holgren playing their best games for Whitman, out standing on defense, the Missionaries made both of their touchdowns by the overhead route.

A crowd of 22,000 witnessed the game, which was played in exceptionally warm weather for this time of year.

**Ucla Out of Cellar**  
LOS ANGELES, Nov. 28.—UCLA, having the football season with a 14 to 0 Thanksgiving victory over the Washington Grizzlies, the Bruins of the University of California, are celebrating their eleventh consecutive victory from the cellar position in the Pacific coast conference. This defeat left Montana tied with Washington for the bottom line in the 1929 standings.

A series of brilliant forward passes in the third and fourth periods spelled disaster for the invading Grizzlies. Early in the third frame Edward Solomon tossed a long one to Leonard Wohlendorf who raced 23 yards for the first marker. A few minutes later Captain Carl Brown got on the receiving end of one of Solomon's passes and crossed the line for a second touchdown. Norman Duncan converted both times.

**Car Total Wreck**  
The force of the collision tore the automobile into bits, parts being scattered for 200 feet in all directions. The witnesses saw a fire thrown through the air for nearly 150 feet.

Mrs. Carl Ender, who resides beside the crossing, saw the collision, and called to her husband, a local auto salesman, who was one of the first to reach the scene. Custer was found lying near the car, against a bumper, while Bell and Stimpson had been thrown for several feet in the direction of the Standard Oil plant.

A call was immediately sent in for ambulances, and the vehicles from the Roseburg Undertaking company responded and brought the two injured men to the hospital. Coroner H. C. Stearns and Sheriff V. E. Jackson immediately started an investigation, which will be continued tonight at an inquest to be held at the courthouse at 7:30 o'clock. A coroner's jury composed of C. W. Lawson, S. S. Morrison, Percy A. Webb, S. J. Jones, H. E. Muldridge and Carl Ohman, was impaneled this morning and viewed the wreckage and the bodies. They will hear the testimony of witnesses tonight.

**Victims Eaten by Residents**  
Both of the death victims of the accident were residents of Edenbower. Mr. Custer had been on his way to work at the time of the collision. He was a native of Edenbower, and had been in the city since that time. Besides the wife, he leaves a son, Merle W. Custer, a resident of Portland, two brothers, Charles E. Custer of Sheridan, Wyo., and Frank W. Custer of Vernal, Neb., also two sisters, Lilly, Brainerd of Waverly, Neb., and Mattie Allen, whose address is not known.

The body was taken to the Roseburg Undertaking parlors and is being prepared for shipment to Portland, where the funeral services will be held.

Mr. Bell was born December 15, 1894, at McDonald, Pennsylvania, and came to Oregon in 1920. He was married in 1922 at Riverside, California, to Helen Wood, who was a former resident of Roseburg. After a short time spent in California, they returned to Roseburg, and have been living at Edenbower for the past 3 years. Mr. Bell leaves the widow and one small daughter, Nancy Mae, and two brothers, W. L. Bell of Jewett, Ohio, and Harry Bell of Elbert, Texas. Funeral arrangements will not be made until after the arrival of the brother from Texas.

## SPOUTING TEXAN AND CAL HERMAN AGAIN MATCHED

Wrestling at Armory Next  
Tuesday Bars Nothing;  
Card Will Include  
Boxing Bouts.

"Texas Teddy" Waters, welter-weight wrestler, who has aroused much of his popularity by his tactics, is to be featured Tuesday in a return match with Cal Herman, local wrestler-brawler. Waters came into prominence in the state by the use of his "wrist hold," with which he defeated Herman in their recent match at the local gymnasium.

The whole hold is exceedingly unusual. Waters came out from his corner with his mouth full of water. As he seized his opponent he spat the water in Herman's face, followed with an open-hand blow to the body, then drove Herman to the mat and locked the hold down for the first fall. The same tactics were used in a match at Eugene, where another victory was obtained.

Fans were so aroused here that the spectators threatened the referee who had to be escorted from the arena by the police. An Eugene regular did follow the bout, and Waters was slightly man-handled by the crowd.

Before signing for the local bout Waters demanded of Promoter Ward that police protection be provided to prevent any disturbance following the return match with Herman.

**Nothing Barred**  
The coming engagement is to be a finish match with no time limit and with nothing barred. The wrestlers will be free to use any holds or any tactics aside from gouging and slugging. Herman is a clean wrestler in his ordinary matches, but in the coming bout he prepared to match the Texas contender in anything he has to offer. It is expected that the match will be one of the roughest ever seen in the state.

In connection with the wrestling match, Mr. Ward is offering a good money boxing bout. The card is to be staged at the armory Tuesday night, December 3.

**Pete Keeps Title**

Have there will be but slight delay in the part of members to indicate in protracted debate.

The announcement today by Senator Smoot of Utah that he preferred to retain the chairmanship of the senate finance committee rather than take over the chairmanship of the senate appropriations committee, also was regarded as a favorable sign for action on the tax reduction.

Smoot long has been head of the finance group, which handles all revenue legislation in the senate. His remaining in that post will leave that committee ready to work on the measure as soon as it is sent over by the house. An earlier start will be impossible as yet.

## EX-PREMIER'S SON ACCUSED OF TAR AND FEATHERING

PENICTON, D. C., Nov. 28.—Charles E. Oliver, son of former Canadian Premier John Oliver, was at liberty today on bail charged with tarring and feathering Dr. V. E. Latimer, formerly of Brandon, Man., against whom Oliver had brought many charges, the nature of which police would not make public.

Police said Joseph Oliver, Vancouver lawyer and brother of the accused man, had also brought similar charges against Dr. Latimer and had been advised the police were powerless to act.

Dr. Latimer came into the provincial police station last night dripping tar and with the lower portion of his body covered with feathers and swore out a warrant for Oliver. He said he was telephoned early last night by a man giving the name of Harvey who wished to see the doctor in his office.

On reaching his office, Dr. Latimer said a man knocked him to the sidewalk and with the aid of two other men threw him into a car and drove off.

He said he recognized the voice of Oliver as one of the trio. Constable Allcott saw the speeding car and fired a shot at a rear tire which apparently did not take effect. Dr. Latimer said that on a lonely spot about two and one half miles from Penicton his trousers and underwear were removed, his feet tied with a thong and tar and feathers applied to his body. The three men drove off and the doctor was forced to walk back to the police station with only his overcoat for covering. A physician found him suffering from shock and a badly swollen jaw.

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## TELEPHONE CO. TO SPEND 333 MILLION NEXT FIVE YEARS

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 28.—Contemplated expenditure of \$333,000,000 in new construction in the next five years, \$25,000,000 of it in 1930, was announced here today by the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company.

H. D. Hilsbury of the company referred to the plans as the company's response to President Hoover's prosperity budget plan.

Expenditures on the five-year budget for the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company in California and Nevada will total \$140,000,000; in Washington, Oregon and western Idaho, \$85,000,000; in southern California, \$88,000,000.

The contemplated expenditures for 1930 and the four years succeeding will break all records for telephone construction, the announcement said.

"The company's new long distance network on the Pacific coast will cost \$100,000,000 in the next five years and will increase capacity 2,000 per cent," said the company's statement. "Over \$20,000,000 will be put into land and new buildings in Washington, Oregon and western Idaho, land and new buildings in the five-year period will cost \$5,000,000. In southern California the company will spend \$4,000,000 for land and new buildings."

The announcement said the \$65,000,000 expenditure for 1930 would be allocated: northern California and Nevada, \$10,000,000; Washington, Oregon and western Idaho, about \$16,000,000; southern California, about \$22,000,000.

"The new long distance network," the announcement continued, "includes the Canada to Mexico cable costing \$20,000,000. The cable will be 1,500 miles in length, long more than any now in existence in the world."

"The balance of the \$100,000,000 long distance budget will pay for thousands of miles of new network all over the coast. It will also pay for five new transcontinental routes. With three routes now in use the company will have eight transcontinental routes. It will also pay for five new transcontinental routes, available for Pacific coast business after five years."

Mr. Sproule, retired president of the Southern Pacific railway, made a speech to the Portland chamber of commerce not long ago.

She will get the \$24,000,000 annually and, if that plan of action is followed, the trains may some day stop in Portland only on signal.

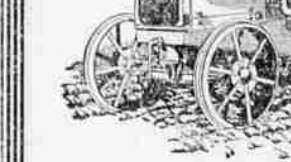
