GARDENS--and Other Things

For people who like gardens or who are fixing up their own home grounds no Christmas present goes to the spot more than a growing shrub or tree or plant. A flowering house plant is all right—a short life and a merry one, but the growing tree is a joy forever. It is a constant reminder of the one who gave it, a new mutual interest, and the friendship grows with the tree.

A garden seat or a bird bath is a wonderful present for a man if he is at all interested in a back yard garden. If you are his wife it would be all right to give him something that you wish he would give you. Speaking of presents for men, here is a word of profound wisdom. If you are going to give a present to a man give him something he doesn't need. Give him something he can play with. Sox and union suits are all right in their place and I wouldn't say a thing to discourage their use, but their place is not on the man's Christmas tree. They do not warm the cockles of the male heart at Christmas time.

The Massachusetts division of the Isaac Walton league, an organization of enthusiastic anglers, has just held a convention the main and very serious business of which was to urinate against the ancient law of the commonwealth which makes it illegal to fish on Sunday. If there were such a law as that here it would mean red-eyed insurrection. The theory of the Puritans probably was that if people couldn't fish they would be

more likely to go to church. It is doubtful whether the Massachusetts ban on Sunday fishing has ever put any invertebrate fisherman into a particularly worshipping state of mind. One great cause for Thanksgiving this year—we live in Oregon.

In an account of his visit to the United States in 1789 an English traveler tells of some experiments which were being made on a machine for propelling a boat up stream. He says the machine is very cumbersome, very expensive, and that there is too much friction to be really successful, yet he is inclined to think that if these obstacles could be overcome the machine might be useful in places where a tow-path is impossible and in a country where labor is scarce. He says the experimenters were quite cheered by his praise of the Americans to jeer at them as they do.

This account was not published till 1803. At the bottom of the page the editor put this illuminating footnote: "It is now some years since the steam boat has sunk into oblivion." This very year, 1803, the first steam boat was launched on the Seine river in France.

Wilbur Wright was jeered at by a good many Americans too, for his experiments with flying machines.

Here is an interesting clipping from a newspaper of 1867 about another impractical dream of the experimenters:

Joshua Coppersmith has been arrested for attempting to extort funds from ignorant and superstitious people by exhibiting a device which he says will convey the human voice any distance over metallic wires, so that it can be heard by listeners at the other end. Well informed people know that this is impossible and of no practical value. The authorities who apprehended the criminal are to be congratulated.

What this editor would have done if Joshua Coppersmith had attempted to sell him a radio set would have been plenty. We live in the age when the impossible things are being done. It is the age of miracles if ever there was one. That is another reason for being thankful at this season of the year.

In 1871 Ralph Waldo Emerson made what was then a remarkable journey to California, and while there he chanced to meet John Muir in the Sequoia forest, a plain woodsman, but the naturalist and author who did so much to make the country appreciate what a treasure it had in the giant redwoods of California and to preserve the sequoia forests for future generations. The interesting thing is that later, in his diary, Emerson wrote down what he called a list of "my men," men to whose abilities and greatness he bowed. And in this list, with Thomas Carlyle, Louis Agassiz, James Russell Lowell, Bronson Alcott, Oliver Wendell Holmes and others, was the name John Muir. The man who loves nature, who takes hold of city beautification work or highway beautification work or who plants a tree or builds a garden shall have his name on the list of "my men." He is a public spirited citizen who sees beyond the dollar, and may his tribe increase!
