YONCALLA WOMAN, WHO DIED THIS WEEK, NATIVE OF STATE

YONCALLA, Nov. 30.—Luella Roberts, who died at her home in Skeelley November 29, was born in Roseburg June 16, 1871. Her father, John Berry Wright, was a native son of Illinois, and afterwards located in Roseburg. He passed away December 29, 1930. His mother, Marie Wright, was born in Iowa, and died November 10, 1917. Mrs. Roberts was married to Benjamin H. Miller November 18, 1888, and to this union six children were born, as follows: Luella Emma, who died in infancy; Walter Miller of Yoncalla, James A. Miller of Albany, Ida M. Jones and Fletcher Miller of Oroville, Calif., and Rachel Kruse of Yoncalla. Benjamin Miller passed away April 16, 1900.

April 22, 1903, Mrs. Roberts was married to William A. Roberts of Yoncalla, Oregon, and they made their home at Skeelley for more than 25 years.

Besides the children mentioned, and the widow, William Roberts, she leaves one brother, Charles Wright of Chico, Calif., and two sisters, Mrs. Martha Staley of Roseburg and Mrs. Marie Buckner of Benicia, Calif., also, eleven grandchildren and other relatives.

EXPLOSION FATAL TO SEVEN ILLINOIS MINERS
WEST FRANKFORT, Ill., Dec. 2.—The charred bodies of six coal

miners killed in an explosion yesterday in Old Ben Mine No. 8, near here, had been recovered today, but rescuers still sought the body of a seventh victim, who, mine officials said, was certain to have perished.

The explosion was localized in one drift by safety devices which automatically released shale dust to extinguish flames, and this is believed by officials to have saved the lives of fifteen other miners, the remainder of a crew that was tearing up tracks in the north part of the mine preparatory to abandonment.

VENISON SERVED BY RESTAURANT ON THANKSGIVING

GLENDAL, Nov. 30.—A part of the Thanksgiving menu at one of Portland's high class restaurants Thursday was fresh venison that came from the Sether Brothers ranch near this city.

A fine buck that weighed 100 pounds dressed was shipped to Portland the first of the week by Omer Sether. This buck had been raised under special state permit from the game commission and special shipping permit was also required. Mr. Sether will probably make another shipment at Christmas time.

Raising venison for the market is not profitable according to Mr. Sether when done in the limited manner carried on at the Sether ranch. If done on a large scale, with at least 100 acres enclosed, giving plenty of browse, raising venison for the markets might pay, according to Mr. Sether. The deer are much similar to sheep in their food requirements.

The buck shipped to Portland was a three year old and brought 50 cents per pound to the raiser.
