LIQUOR CHARGES
TRAIL MURDER OF GROOM BY YOUTH

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Dec. 3.—Solved by three days' hunt behind jail bars, Anthony Varga, 16, high school youth, struggled with emotions today as he steered himself to hear a formal charge of murder placed against him in connection with the death of Robert Ingalls, young Wilderville farmer.

Ingalls was shot as he stepped from his door to talk with Varga at a delayed wedding celebration. Liquor, according to evidence presented at the coroner's jury hearing last night, flowed freely at the celebration. Varga blamed liquor today for his predicament.

From out of the wedding celebration today said other charges probably would be laid before the grand jury. Two Grants Pass high school girls are said to have been drinking liquor at the party with older men and women. Anthony Varga, Sr., father of the youth, is a member of the grand jury.

Mrs. Ingalls, who was in a hospital seriously ill following the shooting, is said to have recovered sufficiently to attend the funeral of her husband which was held today. Varga expressed a desire to attend the funeral and was taken to the church under guard.

The pair quarreled when Varga changed his mind over a land deal which he was negotiating with Ingalls.

Officers immediately made a search for the grave of Urtsun in order to exhumate the body and check on Ingalls' confession that death had resulted from a bullet which entered the skull. Official county records of the inquest over the body, which was discovered 41 days after death, gave a fractured neck as the cause of death and contained bits of testimony that Urtsun had been hit with a blunt instrument. Ingalls last night insisted that no blow had been struck.

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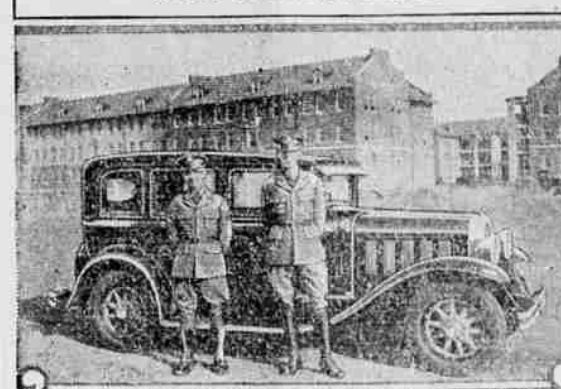
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Chicago Snyder-Gray Case Brings Arrest of Wife and Salesman

SLAYER, AFTER 14 YEARS, GIVES HIS VERSION OF FIGHT

FRESNO, Calif., Dec. 3.—Resistant of inference that he had stabbed Cipriano Urtsun with a shovel on a road near Conlinia in 1915, and then buried his senseless victim, Indore Indart, Basque shepherd, last night surprised Fresno county officers with a confession that Urtsun had been accidentally killed by him in a revolver.

He added that he had been frightened by the happening, had buried Urtsun in a lonely spot on the desert and fled.

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LONSDALE REFUSES MANAGEMENT OF NEW GRAIN BOARD

Kansas City Man Declares Market Plan Outlined Will Not Result in Benefit.

KANSAS CITY, Dec. 3.—Because he believes the plan of the Farmers' National Grain corporation, as it is outlined at present, will result in failure, Charles W. Lonsdale of Kansas City has declined to accept appointment as general manager of the new marketing organization.

Mr. Lonsdale wired his refusal of the office to Alexander Legge, chairman of the federal farm board. The Kansas City grain man previously had rejected the offer for business reasons, but was asked to reconsider.

"While I am wholly sympathetic toward all sound effort to improve the relative economic position of agriculture," Mr. Lonsdale said, "I believe there are certain fundamentals which cannot be safely violated, and I am compelled to refuse the tender of responsibility as director of the Farmers' National Grain corporation because of my sincere conviction that the plan, as at present outlined, will fail."

Characterizing the agricultural marketing act in its application to the grain trade as "an indictment of the efficiency and economy of the present economic system of grain handling," Lonsdale said it proposes ultimately to destroy this system and to set up in its stead cooperative grower control with the dual objectives of accomplishing economies in handling and bringing about price "stabilization" by what is called "orderly marketing."

Commenting on the first of these objectives, Mr. Lonsdale explained that while there may be wastes in country handling of grain, cooperative country elevators have not proved their efficiency in reducing these wastes.

"The second object, that of influencing or controlling the price," he continued, "is to be attained through ultimate scrapping of present marketing machinery."

Mr. Lonsdale continued, "All experience proves such a scheme cannot ultimately be profitable to the grower in the price received by him while quasi government direction is almost certain to be economically more expensive than commercial methods with their competitively-enforced economies."
