TROJANS SELECTED AS WESTERN TEAM NEW YEAR'S DAY

Foe for Annual Rose Bowl Game Resting Between 2 Eastern and Two Southern Clubs.

(Associated Press Local Wire)
LOS ANGELES, Dec. 5.—The University of Southern California will represent the west in the annual New Year's day football classic in the Rose bowl, Pasadena. It was announced last night.

U. S. C. ended the season tied for the championship of the Pacific coast with Stanford, California and Oregon, but with an edge over the others in the percentage column because it had played and won one more game with conference members.

All the rumors, which had been spread over both west and east, concerning selection of teams to participate today were concentrated in the east. Purdue, big ten champion and undefeated, Pittsburgh, with an equally remarkable record in the east, Tulane, a southern team with an unspotted record, and Southern Methodist university of Texas were the focal points.

The Trojan officials said they received the invitation Tuesday after the University of California had eliminated itself from the running because of a defeat at the hands of Stanford a week ago Saturday and had not had time to consider what school in the east would be invited. They said, however, negotiations would be started immediately but carefully avoided saying with whom.

ATLANTA, Dec. 5.—Two touch-down tests, one of international prominence and the other a bitter battle of years' standing, listed on the final football program of 1929, provide a double harvest of climax for Dixie's gridiron season.

These Saturday meetings are Oregon's engagement with the University of Florida at Miami
