Visiting in this City—Arthur Moore, of Grants Pass, is spending several days in this city as the house guest of S. P. Moore.

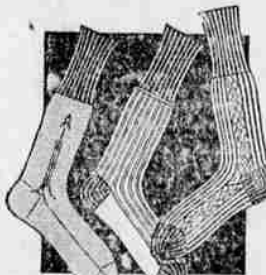
Dillard Couple in Town—Mr. and Mrs. I. B. Thompson, of Dillard, spent Thursday in Roseburg visiting friends and transacting business.
