MORE CONVENIENCES NEEDED

A GRANGE member yesterday brought to the News-Review office a copy of the Roseburg Review dated June 26, 1911 in which the following appeared in a prominent position on the front page:

GRANGE FAVORS ARMOY FOR GENERAL PURPOSES

"Pomona Grange, Roseburg Grange, No. 429; Lower Calapooia Grange, No. 435; Myrtle Creek Grange, No. 442, and South Deer Creek Grange, No. 446, have adopted the following resolution relative to the erection of an Armory in Roseburg, and in all probability the other granges of the county will do likewise.

"Resolved, That we, as a Grange, favor the erection of an Armory at Roseburg, under the conditions outlined by the executive committee of Douglas Pomona Grange and the Roseburg Commercial club, and accepted by that club, namely: That Douglas Pomona Grange and other public meetings of subordinate granges of Douglas county are to meet in such Armory, upon payment of lights and fuel; that a rest room be provided in such Armory for the use of the general public, with wash room and toilet facilities.

"A copy of the resolution was presented to the county court, the representatives of the various districts, and to the Roseburg Commercial club.

The granger who brought in the paper stated that country people in general are not pleased with conveniences offered them in Roseburg. It is felt, he said, that the armory does not now fill the need of country people for rest room facilities in this city.

Since Roseburg is the principal trading center of the county it is squarely up to us to extend to country people every possible convenience. The leasing and fitting up of appropriate quarters for a rest room would not involve such a large expense and would undoubtedly be greatly appreciated. It is a project that should be undertaken.

The Sutherlin Sun expresses deep surprise at the fact that the California fish commission recently shipped a crate of blue catfish, packed only in wet burlap sacks, to Portland for planting in Oregon streams. The moisture from the sacks, states the Sun, was the only water those fish had during their journey. If the editor of the Sun has ever seen any of the California "rivers" he might very easily express surprise at the fact that the catfish, shipped in burlap, came through without drowning.

been warring against mankind. If you are more interested in sports than in history, Christy Mathewson died of tuberculosis.

LET us go back, for the moment, to the National Tuberculosis association. It gets five per cent of the money spent for Christmas seals. With this five cents out of each dollar, it supervises nationally the fight against tuberculosis.

Here in Oregon, as elsewhere, we retain 95 cents out of each dollar of sales for anti-tuberculosis work in our own state.

THE counties retain from 40 to 60 per cent of the money which they raise, which brings up another interesting point in connection with the Christmas seal sale fund.

The counties keep 60 per cent of the money which they raise, for use in their own boundaries. If their sales go above SIX CENTS PER CAPITA.

From this you may see quite clearly the nature of this Christmas seal sale fund. It is made up by VERY SMALL CONTRIBUTIONS FROM LARGE NUMBERS OF PEOPLE.

IN the purchase of Christmas seals, you aren't asked to give till it hurts. You are asked to contribute very moderately. Surely there isn't a person in all this state of Oregon who can't afford to give SIX CENTS for himself and for each of his dependents in order to help on the fine and useful campaign of education which has been instrumental in cutting the tuberculosis death rate in half since 1904—or, in other words, reducing by half the menace of tuberculosis to his own children.

SO don't say "NO!" when you are asked to buy Christmas seals. At the very least, even if you are in actual need yourself, buy six cents' worth. If you are in comfortable circumstances, do far better than that. It is a good cause.

"Auto-Intoxication"

Dr. Copeland's Health Topic Today

Most People, Driven by the Bug-a-Boo of Time, Get into the Habit of Neglecting the Fundamental Principles of Good Health.

THERE are four chief sources of infection from within the body. They are teeth, sinuses, tonsils and intestines. "Auto-intoxication" might be produced by poisons from any one of these places. But the word is used mainly in connection with toxic poisoning from the intestines. Such poisons are conveyed to every nook and corner of the body by the blood stream. The condition is likely to be associated with constipation.

There are many causes for constipation. Among them are faulty diet, lack of exercise and fresh air, worry and habitual fatigue. It is important that our muscles be kept healthy and strong. The blood must rise in a long, upward ascent from the feet to the heart, putting added work on the heart muscle, the human pump. The waste matter in the large intestine must also rise upward, along the path of the "ascending colon."

Today our environment is far different from olden times. The business man or woman hurries to business at the very time in the morning when elimination from the bowels should be given attention. The natural time for this is about 15 minutes after breakfast. If there is neglect of punctuality in this matter, the result is constipation.

The most necessary thing in the world to do is to keep the human mechanism in good working order. But we are all so hard pressed for time, or think we are, that we neglect the fundamental principle of keeping ourselves in good health.

Water is a wonderful preventive and corrective agent. Drink a full glass or two before breakfast in the morning and before bedtime, that is, preferably when the stomach is empty. Six or eight glasses of water should be taken daily.

Walking is the best mild exercise for the abdominal muscles. It is unwise to walk so much as to become overtired, for this may create a condition favorable to toxic poisoning.

Keep toned up to meet the daily demands of the brain or nervous system. Running, jumping, climbing the hills or swimming are all movements ideally suited to right muscular action. Keep yourself in a happy frame of mind. Refuse to worry. And having done all these things, the nuclear of constipation will be yours no more.

There is great danger in the use of cathartics. Thousands of persons are slaves to them. They irritate and inflame the delicate membrane of the intestines. They are only temporarily useful in assisting elimination of body wastes.

Answers to Health Queries

T. E. A. Q.—What should a boy twenty-one, five feet ten inches tall, weigh; also a boy ten seventeen, five feet eight inches tall, and a girl fifteen, five feet four inches tall.

A.—They should weigh respectively 153, 132, 118 and 48 pounds.

P. H. Q.—What should a boy of eighteen, five feet eight inches tall, weigh?

A.—How can I gain weight?

A.—He should weigh about 140 pounds.

2.—Eat plenty of good nourishing food, including milk, eggs, fruits and vegetables. Practice deep breathing. Get regular hours of sleep and avoid constipation.

D. L. B. Q.—What should a girl of fifteen, four feet nine inches tall, weigh?

A.—How can I increase my height and develop generally?

2.—What should a girl of fourteen, five feet two inches tall, weigh?

A.—You should weigh about 105 pounds.

2.—Try taking daily stretching and bending exercises. Join a gymnasium. You will continue to grow and develop until you reach the age of twenty-one.

2.—You should weigh about 112 pounds.

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Good Manners

The Wedding Musical Programme DEAR MRS. DECKMAN:

I am to have a short programme in church when I am married. Is it correct to have it before or after the wedding march?

2. I am to have a maid of honor, two bridesmaids, a best man and two ushers, one flower girl and ring-bearer. In what order should we come in the church?

SUCH a musical programme is played before the wedding march, when the guests are as seating and are waiting for the bride to arrive.

2. First, the two ushers walking together. Then the two bridesmaids, walking together. Then the ring-bearer, walking alone. Then the maid of honor, walking alone. Next, the flower girl, walking alone. Then you and your father or whatever is to present you in marriage.

In regard to Wedding Gifts DEAR MRS. DECKMAN:

1. When announcing her daughter's marriage, how should a mother, who has been divorced, and who does not wish to use her husband's name, use her name in the announcement.

2. Also, is it correct to send announcements of a marriage a day or two before the marriage occurs, when the young couple expect to marry in a town a long distance from their home, and do not wish to have anyone present except the family? Of course, by the time the announcements are received, the marriage will have taken place.

3. Will an announcement of this kind call for a present? And will the announcement of an engagement call for a present if the marriage will occur a few days later, and no announcements of the marriage are sent?

READER.

THE name that a divorced woman would use on the invitations and announcements of her daughter's marriage would be the former name that she has taken. That is, if she adopts the form that is considered the best—the use of the last name of her maiden name with the last name of her former husband's name—this is the correct form for use in this most formal of occasions. If, however, Mary Smithson marries and divorces Henry Allen, she would, if she adopts the best name-form, use Mrs. Smithson Allen on

her daughter's wedding invitations.

2. No; this is not correct. An announcement, since they are intended to carry the news that the ceremony has taken place, must not be mailed until the ceremony has taken place. They may be prepared for mailing, engraved, addressed, stamped and may be mailed directly after the ceremony is over.

3. Announcements of an engagement do not call for a present, and usually only the family and very close friends give engagement presents. Announcements of a wedding also are not considered as "calling for presents," as many people regard wedding invitations. However, such "announcements" resolve in to the fact that one gives presents, wedding or otherwise, if one wishes to, or doesn't, and if he so chooses. It is all really a matter of personal interest.

If He's Interested, He'll Write DEAR MRS. DECKMAN: A girl knows a young man for two years and leaves on a vacation. Is it the rule in twentieth century etiquette that the one leaving the other should write first? In this case the girl requested the boy to write first, but he claims she must write first.

PUZZLED.

ON this point the etiquette of the twentieth century is precisely what the etiquette of the other centuries has been—and that is, that the man ask for the privilege of writing to the woman and that he write first. CHURCHES SHARE IN \$170,000 DOLE

L. A. GRANDE, Ore., Dec. 5.—The will of Mrs. Anna Hounan, admitted to probate here, distributes \$170,000 in the United States, Canada and Great Britain among churches, organizations and friends.

The Catholic church here will receive \$25,000 to be used in erecting a Catholic hospital here. Park Place Orphanage of Portland will receive \$10,000; the local Episcopal church will receive several thousand; the remainder of the estate after other claims, and taxes have been paid.

Among the bequests are the following: Rev. Upton H. Gibbs, Estacada, Ore., \$2,000; Bishop Robert L. Padlock, \$5,000; local Catholic church \$2,000; Mrs. Mary Lewis, New York City, \$10,000; George Lewis, Newport, N. Y., \$5,000; Margaret O'Connor, Ottawa, Canada, \$2,000.

COSTLY FOREST FIRES
