This amount represents the proceeds from the benefit party sponsored by the auxiliary, and the United Spanish American War Veterans' auxiliary. The fund was held until this time in order to study the needs and tastes of the veterans and to give time to assemble and catalogue all reading material which was donated.

A report covering partial returns from the Red Cross roll call indicated that splendid work is being done this year. The first report came from Mrs. Evelyn Asam, chairman at Glide, and showed that 51 memberships were secured in that section. Oakland reported 69; Reedsport 43; Glendale 26; Drain 28; and Elkton 36.

Several letters of appreciation were read from those who received Thanksgiving baskets from the unit.

Mrs. Ned Dixon was appointed flower chairman to replace Mrs. Jay A. Fulcher, who asked to be relieved because of other duties. Mrs. Fulcher has taken care of this work most efficiently for several years.

After the meeting the auxiliary unit joined the legion unit for the apron and overall party at the
