

BILL BURR GIVEN HIGH PRAISE AS ATHLETIC COACH

Bill Burr, former Roseburg high school athlete star, now Pacific coast basketball star at Oregon State college, who is now coaching athletics at Sedro-Woolley high school, is enjoying confidence of the student body and the school patrons, according to information from that city. A recent article in the school paper contained a picture of the football team with the following note:

"Speaking for the student body as a whole, words can't express our feelings toward our coach, Mr. Burr, so we'll just say he's all right. Anyone trying to add any more praise to this would founder for expressions."

"Coach Burr came to us from Oregon State college where he handled inter-group athletics. Although his team didn't win the championship, they stopped several others from copying it, and with only five lettermen as a nucleus, he made a team that has kept all other contenders stepping fast."

"Coach Burr is going to handle basketball and probably baseball, and if he does as well in these as he did in football the student body won't have any kick coming."

"The reason likes him and his patient, sincere way of doing things on the field or in the building. We owe him a lot of thanks and now is the time to express them."

PRISONS NOW LIKE COSY CLUBS, SAYS CRIMINOLOGIST

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 6.—Members of the San Francisco civic center had some harsh words about prisons from Duncan Matheson, former chief of detectives here and former president of the American institute of criminal law and criminology.

"Prisons are coming to be like comfortable clubs, with no initiation fees and no dues for residence, conducted for the purpose of making roommates," said Matheson.

"The safest place in the world to commit murder is within the walls of a prison, because the convicts protect each other. They dare not give out either advance information or information afterward, for fear of being killed themselves."

"The riots in prison are not general but are confined to small groups of the prisoners and to the younger ones. The older convicts, in fact, should be separated from the younger ones as it is the latter who are the real mischief makers."

TELEPHONE RATES WILL BE REDUCED ON JANUARY 1ST

Reduction in telephone charges, throughout Oregon announced by the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company and approved by the public service commission will become effective January 1, 1930, according to J. R. Farrington, the manager for the company here.

Under the new schedule, the charges for connection of service will be entirely eliminated in one case and reduced from fourteen to over fifty per cent in other cases. Monthly rates for extension telephones will also be cut from twenty to twenty-three and one-half per cent.

The \$1.50 charge for connecting service, commonly known as the change of name charge, will be eliminated.

Other reductions for connecting service are as follows: The service connection charge for business and residence extension telephones will be \$1.50. The former rate was \$2.00.

for private branch exchange telephones will be \$1.50. The former rate was \$3.50. The service connection charge for residence telephones will be \$3.00. The former rate was \$3.50.

Reductions in the monthly rental rate for extension telephones apply to wall and desk sets and are as follows: reductions of 25 cents a month for business and residence flat rate extensions; reductions of 25 cents a month for extension telephones without a coin box or coin box service.

FRENCH WOMAN BECOMES WIFE OF PRINCE OF INDIA

AIX LES BAINS, France, Dec. 7.—Aga Khan, powerful Indian ruler, descendant of the prophet and supreme religious head of millions of small mosques, was married to Andre Josephine Caron, young French business woman, at a simple ceremony here today.

Mayor Henri Clere performed the civil ceremony and two monks from the Benedictine abbey of Aga Khan's hand into that of the French girl, who now becomes the consort of one of the wealthiest Indian princes in the world.

"I am really very happy and especially delighted at the prospect of going to India next spring," said the bride. "It should be very interesting." Before leaving the city hall the bride dropped a check into the poor box later said to be equivalent to \$10,000.

Aga Khan and his bride plan to live in a chateau on the shores of Lake Bourgn, between Chambéry and Aix.

A few days ago Mlle. Caron answered newspaper comment that she looked like she was 21 years old with the statement she really was 31. She formerly ran a small candy shop in Paris.

Despite efforts of Aga Khan, who is a famous owner of race horses, to keep such details secret, it became known she was to receive about a million francs (about \$40,000) before the ceremony took place. He recently gave her a \$500,000 diamond ring for a present.
