M. R. BROWN WINS SUIT AGAINST HIM OVER AUTO DEAL

A verdict in favor of M. R. Brown, defendant, was returned last night by the jury in the case of Stanley Brothers against Brown, a suit to collect on a promissory note of \$110. Mr. Brown set up a counter claim, declaring that a car on which the note was given as first payment, was not as represented and that he returned it to the dealers. He asked for a judgment in the sum of \$112.32 representing the value of an old car traded in and payments made on the new auto. His claim was allowed in full.

The jury today took up the case of E. K. Melendron against Wm. Boudin, a suit to collect \$500 real estate commission. Melendron claims that he negotiated a deal for the trade of the Boudin property with George Turner of Cow creek, that he was to have received a commission for the deal and that all negotiations were completed.

U. S. CHAMBER OF COMMERCE HEAD IS ASKED TO TESTIFY

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—Julius H. Barnes, president of the U. S. chamber of commerce, was summoned today by the senate lobby committee to appear Friday for questioning in regard to his activities in connection with the federal farm board.

Barnes, a former grain operator on the Chicago board of trade, is reported to have opposed the farm board's grain marketing policy and Chairman Caraway of the lobby committee announced that he wished to inquire into the matter. Many commission grain dealers are known to be opposed to the board's grain marketing policy and notice was taken of the situation in the senate by Senator Nye, republican, North Dakota, who defended the board's policy and asserted it had "come to grips with a farm foe of great strength and influence."

CONDIT TESTIFIES LIQUOR GIVEN TO JUSTICE M'BRIDE

(Associated Press Special Wire)

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 10.—That on many occasions he furnished intoxicating liquor to Chief Justice McBride of the state supreme court, that he heard pending cases in the supreme court freely discussed between McBride and Thomas Mannix, and that McBride promised him a victory in his divorce case were statements made on the witness stand today by Elvin C. Condit of Portland, a defense witness in the George Joseph disbarment trial.

Condit made his statements on direct examination in detail and reiterated them in part on cross-examination by W. Lafe Thompson, one of the prosecuting attorneys. Thompson succeeded in causing the witness to become evasive in regard to the time he heard pending cases discussed as related to the time they were actually in court.

Condit was the first witness called by the defense, the prosecution having rested after calling two witnesses, Arthur S. Benson, clerk of the supreme court, and Albert B. Ridgeway, former secretary of the Multnomah bar association. The prosecution made a fight against introduction of Condit's testimony relative to liquor, contending that the case should be held strictly to the fact that the case of Condit against Noppach

and Mannix had been filed in court, with Joseph as attorney, for Condit, the prosecution's contention being that this in itself was a malicious attack on a member of the supreme court and was cause for disbarment. The referee ruled that it should be admitted as far as it pertained to McBride, but that otherwise the case should not be discussed.

"It is competent testimony. No matter who it hurts, let the chips fall where they may," was the stern ruling of Presiding referee Chipworth.

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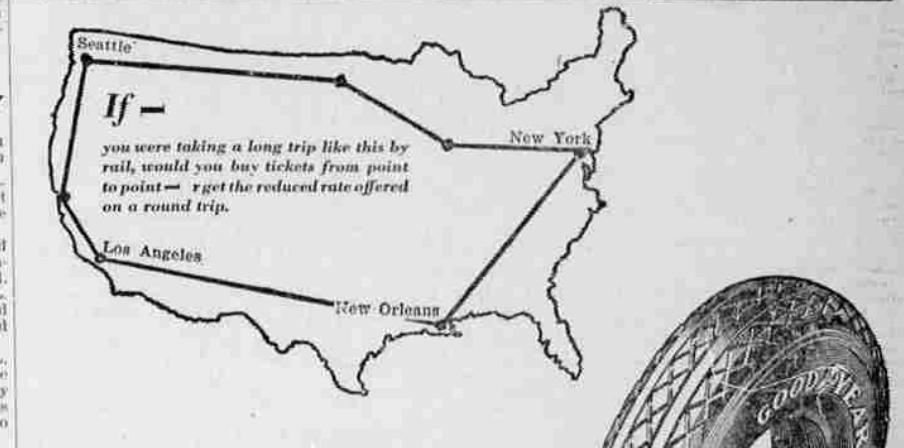
