OREGON RECEIVES \$265,000 SHARE OF FORESTRY MONEY

(Associated Press Local Wire)
SALEM, Ore., Dec. 11.—The sum of \$265,025.97 has been received by the state treasurer from the comptroller general at Washington, D. C., which is 25 per cent of the receipts from national forests in Oregon during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1929. Receipts for 1928 were \$171,651.73. The fund consists of all moneys received from forest reserve rentals, sales of timber and other sources. The receipts from each federal forest reserve with the state are apportioned by the secretary of state to the several counties in the proportion which the area of the particular forest reserve within the county bears to the total forest reserve area in the state. The moneys so received by each county are divided in the proportion of 75 per cent to the county road fund for bond retirement and sinking fund purposes, and 25 per cent to the county school fund for the payment of the bonded and warrant indebtedness of school districts incurred prior to January 1, 1925.

EX-TREASURER OF GLADSTONE SAID TO BE \$7,000 SHORT

OREGON CITY, Ore., Dec. 11.—Authorities at Gladstone, Ore., awaited complete audit of the books conducted by E. E. Steeples as city treasurer today before taking criminal action against the treasurer who resigned last week after an alleged shortage of \$7,000 had been uncovered. The alleged shortage, which has been traced back to last February, is said to have been discovered when an auditor was ordered to check the city books following People's resignation at a council meeting. When confronted with an accusation of embezzlement, Teeple is said to have admitted taking the money and said it had been "loaned to friends." The former treasurer, who is under \$5,000 of surety bonds, has decided to leave Gladstone as a means of protecting the city.

RAILROADS WILL SPEND HEAVILY IN NORTHWEST

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 11.—Railroads of the Pacific northwest will spend millions of dollars in Oregon during 1930, according to reports issued today. While the Union Pacific budget for 1930 still is being studied by Carl R. Gray, president of the road, the northwest's share is expected to exceed the \$28,000,000 budget of 1929. Of the \$50,000,000 which Paul Shorn, president of the Southern Pacific, will spend on new investments in 1930, about \$2,500,000 is to be spent in Oregon.

PAROLED TO LAWYER

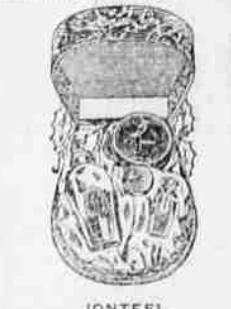
