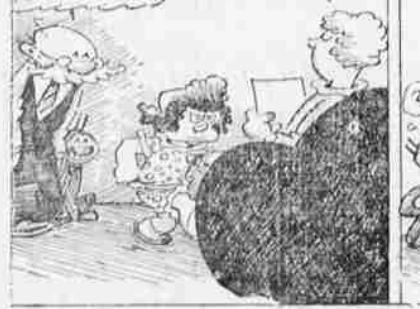

Come Into The Kitchen

Christmas Cakes
"Twas the night before Christmas, When ever you look, were stacked of dirty dishes. Ah—there is the Cook! As the same foolish virgin. But fanny of you, this cook who most always thought all from the store, in a last minute flutter. Was mixing her cake, 'cause hully hazled. His wife should have—a grand "Prince of Wales" affair. Like his mother had done—way back in his boyhood—
Oh—ain't we got fun?
There—that isn't very elegant we know, but it just expresses our sentiments!

Merry Christmas with never a clean dish in the house, dripping egg beaters, flour from floor to nose of a crumbly young cook, and a building uncertain creation in the battered rusty old oven! Is it any wonder the spicy flavors of our grandmother's cake remain only a memory?

One of these nice rainy mornings when the mist is on the hilltops and a tiny little breeze made clean by a pattering rain, rustles steadily around the house when Friend Husband won't be home to lunch and garrulous Mrs. Next-door neighbor is visiting her step-son in Milwaukee and slip into a starched apron, unearth the family cookbook, and go to it. A song in your cake is better than soda, altho' we don't advise omitting the latter when it's invited to the cake-making. (Only for good-natured cake—and that of your cake—treat soda as if it were gold and use not a speck over. You will have a yellow batter-mass which is fit only for those with murderous intentions.

Did you ever make a—
Prince of Wales Cake?
(A worthy tribute to the charming young man.)

Cream one-half a cup shortening and one cup of brown sugar until the sugar is dissolved and the mixture is velvety smooth. Add gradually two table spoons of dark molasses, working this in thoroughly, and then beat in the unbeaten yolks of three eggs. Sift into two cups of flour one teaspoon of ground cloves, 1 teaspoon soda, 12 teaspoon salt and one tablespoon of cinnamon. Add 4 cup sour milk by degrees, to the creamed mixture, egg yolks and sugar alternately, with the sifted flour and spices—adding a little of the flour first and using the milk only when the batter becomes too stiff. Along with the last of the dry ingredients add one cup of chopped, stoned raisins or a mixture of raisins and currants. The fruit may be omitted at your pleasure. Pour in a deep pan, well greased and floured, with oiled paper in the bottom. Bake at 250° moderate oven for 45 minutes.

While cooking, prepare the second part of this cake as follows:
Cream one-half cup shortening and add one cup of granulated sugar. Sift together two cups of flour, 12 teaspoon salt and 12 teaspoon baking powder. Add this to the first mixture alternately, with one-half a cup of sweet milk and lastly add 12 teaspoon vanilla and fold in the very stiffly beaten whites of the three eggs. When the first part of the cake has baked for thirty minutes at an hour, pour the second part over it, and continue baking until this is done. The cake may be covered with any desired frosting, although a plain butter frosting is the best.

Butter Frosting
Butter frosting is about the only thing we do "by guess." We take a small amount of liquid—perhaps 2 cup of milk, cream, maple syrup, coffee, fruit juice or even water, and melt it in a lump of butter, and depending upon how sweet we want it, add sugar, and pour into a bowl of powdered sugar, and mix thoroughly, and then add it into the frosting spread on cold cake. This is easily used in a pastry tube, also.
