NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—Foreign entanglements in the form of the long skirts decreed by Paris style dictators have been denounced by New York city women.

After hearing the skirt debate at length yesterday at a meeting sponsored by the New York state federation of club women, the 400 delegates indicated by applause their approval of a statement that "American women cannot be dictated to by a small coterie of maverick Frenchmen in Paris."

Six models, three dressed in the short skirts of last year and three in the new longer style, were called to the platform. The short skirts won a popularity vote from the audience.

Gertrude Lawrence, English actress, wearing a skirt 12 inches from the floor, defended long skirts. She said:

"The new styles with their long graceful lines are more aesthetic. They are easier to look at and that should be a determining reason for us. They make tall women look less like bean poles, short women look taller and fat women look more slender."

"Under the old style limbs had become legs, knees were no longer joints, but institutions, and common charity demanded that the legs of some women should be covered. Even beautiful legs become ill by the new styles, because suggestion is always better than revelation."

"They say the short style makes women more free. I think the new style makes women more free because it is more feminine. Femininity is not 'how' you wear 'how' you look."

AMERICAN LEGION AUXILIARY ACTIVITIES

A recent dispatch from Washington, D. C., states that records in the veterans' bureau indicate that a great number of World war veterans, as well as dependents of deceased veterans, who are also eligible, have not yet made application for benefits under the adjusted compensation act. In order to be valid, applications must be filed not later than January 2nd, 1930, which is the final time limit fixed by law.

Briefly, the act grants to every ex-service man or woman, or to the dependents of deceased veterans, a paid-up endowment insurance policy maturing in twenty years, and the amount of insurance granted in each individual case is based on the time served in the World war.

Members of the auxiliary can do a real service by urging all eligible persons, who have not already made application, to do so without delay.
