DRAIN RAINFALL ALREADY EQUALS MONTHLY NORMAL

DRAIN, Dec. 16.—The rain storm which began here on Saturday, December 6, broke the longest continuous dry season that has been experienced here in many years.

According to record kept here for the U. S. weather bureau, the average rainfall for the three months, September, October and November, is 11.95 inches. The rainfall for these three months of this year was 1.26 inches; this average covering a period of twenty-seven years. It is noted that the deficiency is 10.69 inches. The present storm up to Friday evening has brought 6.44 inches, almost the exact average for the period of record has been kept. Whatever may fall during the remainder of the month will decrease the deficiency.

HOOVER ONCE \$40 PER MONTH WORKER

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Dec. 15.—When President Hoover worked as an assistant to the state geologist in Arkansas in 1893, he received a salary of \$40 a month and was carried on the state payroll as "Bert" Hoover.

This information was disclosed in State Auditor J. Oscar Humphrey's office when a voucher bearing his endorsement was uncovered in a search for records of that period.

President Hoover added Dr. John C. Branner, former state geologist, in making a mineral survey of various regions in northern Arkansas.

The president received a degree in geology at Stanford university in 1895.
