CHURCH BUILDING BOUGHT BY GRANGE OF MYRTLE CREEK

A deal is being consummated between the Myrtle Creek grange and the Presbyterian church whereby the grange is purchasing the church building for a grange hall. The church has been idle for several years, as the presbytery of southwestern Oregon felt that with two churches operating in Myrtle Creek that it was not necessary to support another congregation, and the property has not been used for religious purposes. The grange, which was organized recently, has been renting the building and made an offer to buy the edifice. The proposal has been accepted by the presbytery.

The men of the grange are meeting this afternoon and are making repairs to the building, cleaning up the yard and doing other such work, while the women are cleaning the interior, putting up cupboards and making changes that will permit installation of a kitchen and dining room.

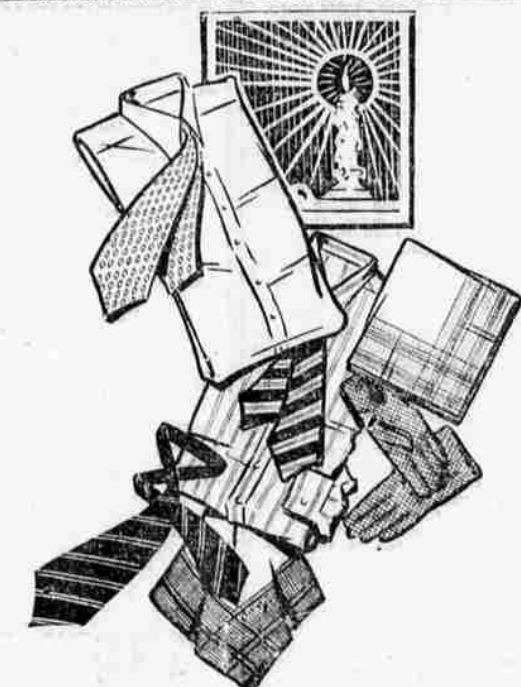
