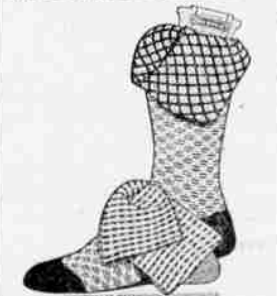

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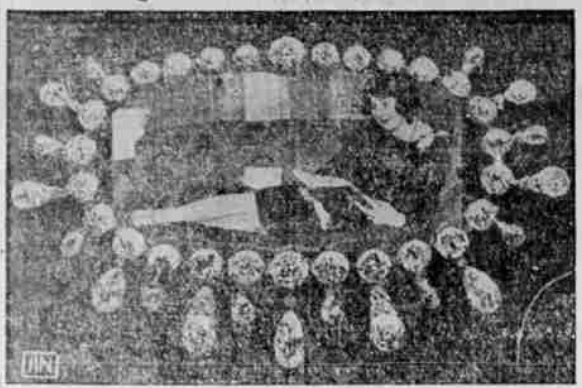
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Is This Napoleon's Necklace? Given to Queen Maria Louise in 1811

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CHOCOLATE BEATS DOMINIC PETRONE

(Associated Press Local Wire) NEW YORK, Dec. 19.—Kid Chocolate, dusky Cuban featherweight, now can go back home for Christmas with the knowledge that he has met and overcome his strongest opponent since he disposed of Al Singer last spring. He also has attracted some 20,000 fans as contributors to the Christmas fund of the Fifth avenue boys' association.

The Cuban Kid met some stiff opposition from Dominic Petrone of New York, the biggest and toughest opponent he has encountered in some time, last night.
