DAIRY HERDS OF DOUGLAS COUNTY WILL BE TESTED

Through the efforts of the Douglas County Dairymen's association arrangements have been made to test the dairy herds of the county for contagious abortion. This dread disease has financially ruined many dairymen, and its existence in any herd means not only a very heavy loss in offspring, but also in milk production.

Douglas county is one of the few counties of the state that is practically free from this disease. It is believed by the dairymen that by frequent and careful testing it will be possible to keep the disease from gaining any spread in this county through outside sources.

Herds belonging to Cohn Brothers, Fred Goff, Vincent, Freshern and J. F. Bonebrake have been recently tested and have been passed as being entirely free from the disease.

Dr. George Nicholas, county veterinarian, is continuing the tests and the association hopes that not only all of its own herds but other dairymen as well will take advantage of the opportunity to have their cows tested.

As a special rate of 35 cents per head is made to members of the association, test officers are urging additional memberships for the organization, the membership fee being only 50 cents. The association is not only keeping up a fight against disease but is also working to secure better breeding stock and receiving valuable assistance through the county agents' office and the college specialists in such problems as judging, testing, feeding and other such matters.

CHRISTIAN CHURCH PIPE ORGAN TO BE READY NEXT WEEK

Installation of the memorial pipe organ, given to the First Christian church by Wilbur C. Perkins, Chicago radio manufacturer in memory of his mother, a former member of the local congregation, is nearing completion. It is expected that the organ will be ready for use early next week. Plans are being made to hold the dedication service on the afternoon of Sunday, December 23, at which time an appropriate program will be presented. The organ is to be used for public worship at the evening service on that date, according to present plans, and several of the other congregations of the city are preparing to unite with the Christian church for the service.

The organ was purchased through the Robert Morton company of Van Nuys, California, and is being installed by L. H. Proctor, of the Balcorn-Proctor company, organ builders, of Seattle.
