

LARGE UNITS FOR OREGON SCHOOLS. SPEAKER'S URGE

Standardized Mental Tests Also Recommended by Dr. G. W. Frasier at Teachers' Meet.

Regulation Seeks Shifting Tax Burden: Change in Plan of Grade Schools Asked.

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 27.—Dr. George W. Frasier, president of the Oregon State Teachers' association, speaking at the annual meeting of the Oregon State Teachers' association, urged the adoption of large units for educational supervision before delegates to the convention today.

His second speech was based on two points: (1) the question of the units particularly with reference to educational advantages; (2) the question of the shifting of the tax burden to the state and county schools.

Dr. Frasier said, "and one of the best aids to administration is the standardized educational and mental tests. In the county that is organized as one school system an expert is employed to have charge of the testing program. He has several assistants and this department is one of the educational weaknesses of the system."

It is sometimes said that a good teacher does not need supervision, he continued. "To a certain extent this is true, but this argument is very much in favor of the large units of administration. There is a positive correlation between the size of the unit of administration and the average salary of the teacher employed."

It seems to be evident that supervision is possible in the large units of administration while it is entirely impossible with an organization made up of small scattered units. The supervisor helps to keep a uniform method of approach to various subjects.

In the third place the supervisor is a great help to inexperienced teachers. All inexperienced teachers are in need of counsel. Another function of a supervisor would be to help perpetuate good teaching. A teacher may develop many bad habits of teaching and never know concerning the lack of ability of the method until an expert in the field explains how the subject should be taught."

Dr. Frasier concluded his statement by saying that when the regulation plans are completed, or a large statewide committee of influential men and women and organize also county committees from the same group.

Tax Relief Advocated
Oregon is not getting as much as it should from its school dollars, Dr. J. R. Jewett, Oregon State college, declared in discussing several phases of a new program. "When debts and interest on old debts are figured up, many of our school buildings have cost two and three times their estimated cost."

Regulations toward a "wiser expenditure" as presented by a committee headed by C. A. Rice, Portland, chairman, included the relief of the burden upon the property by levying a school tax from other sources along the lines of wealth, not state legislation; change in plans of distribution of funds which will place small districts at a greater advantage; removal of

the six per cent limitation on school levies. Consolidation of rural districts also was urged.

Side by side with this goes a plan for reorganization of the general school system which will be submitted to the board of education for approval. Under the new plan an elementary school of six years will be instituted, followed by three years of junior high school for the adolescent child, where special attention will be paid to discovering its aptitudes. A three year senior high school course with training in chosen fields emphasized, will conclude the program of secondary education.

Increase in preparation required for elementary teachers is recommended. By 1931 this would amount to a required three years of training beyond high school graduation, and four years' training beyond high school graduation by 1937.

Education as to the effects of indulgence in narcotics and alcoholic liquors was advocated in all high school courses in civics, sociology and physiology.

CHRISTMAS SEAL SALES CONTINUE IN THIS COUNTY

Crashes on the stock market and similar catastrophes are not allowed by the generous people of this county and throughout Oregon to hinder them in their support of recognized philanthropic and educational projects such as the health conservation program of the Oregon tuberculosis association and its 26 affiliated county public health associations which are financed by the sale of Christmas seals, according to those in charge of the 22nd annual seal sale which is now slowly growing to a successful close.

All that it will take to make this year's sale of Christmas health seals the greatest in the history of the state and to insure an extensive program of disease prevention throughout Oregon in 1930 is the purchase of a few of the health seals that appear on the seals, by those who will send out New Year's greetings.

It is pointed out that for the first time in the 22 years that the seals have been sold that the design this year permits them to be used quite as appropriately for New Year's greetings as for Christmas mail.

Those who were unable to purchase them for Christmas use any day now by getting in touch with the seal sale chairman in his community and thus add to the fund that finances the year-round battle against disease in this county.

The required budget for the Oregon tuberculosis association program for 1930 and for its 26 affiliated county public health associations is \$25,000. Of this amount \$23,000 is expected of Portland.

All persons in this county who helped sell the seals this year are asked to make a complete report to the chairman at the earliest possible moment in order that she may make her report to the state association before the first of the year.

WASHINGTON STATE DEFEATS HONOLULU
