SALEM, Ore., Dec. 28.—The Oregon Stages system will on January 1 take over the operation of the Pacific stages (not run from Portland to Newport, Tillamook and Forest Grove). This will put under the operation of the Oregon Stages system the operation of all major lines in Oregon. The application to take over the Pacific line has not yet been filed with the public service commission but will be shortly, it became known here today.

MISSING TICKET AGENT IS NABBED

PORTLAND, Dec. 28.—Charles E. Warren, former agent of the Consolidated Railroad Ticket office here, was under arrest in San Francisco today, charged with larceny by bailee. He is alleged to have taken \$1500 of company funds and was indicted by the county grand jury here in March, 1928. He disappeared in August 1924.

According to statement told to the district attorney, Warren would accept money from foreigners who had relatives in Europe and who planned to bring them to Oregon. Large sums were paid by the foreigners and they were given receipts for the cash. The European relatives, however, failed to arrive.

Soon there began a checking of the office books and one morning Warren was not present. A search was made in Alaska and in Canada.

When arrested he was working as a steno-grapher.
