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NEW FORD BODY

Types will be here Tuesday

News Briefs

Presentation Tuesday of new and smaller body types and a group of new colors of the Model A car was announced today by C. A. Woodward, local Ford dealer, who emphasized the fact that no mechanical change is contemplated in the car because of the thorough satisfactory performance it has been giving.

He described the car as follows: "Redesigned along ultra modern lines, the new bodies will have a distinctly refreshing appearance with all the beauty and charm of contour, line and proportion usually associated only with custom coachwork and large cars."

"The entire front of the Model A is raised and in beautiful proportion to the new body types. A new treatment is used, and the car is more generous in dimensions, showing with the lines of the car. A new treatment in the contour and sweep of the bodies, with a graceful forward lean, gives the impression of lightness."

"Every line from the flat radiator cap to the tip of the low, graceful curve of the rear fenders is new, clear cut and extremely smart."

"Rustless steel will be used for radiator shell, headlamps, hub caps—all are bright and shining, and will stay so, for in this rustless steel the corrosion is not on the outside, like a thin veneer, but is alloyed with the iron. Moisture, whether from water, steam, ice or snow will not rust it."

"Perhaps the most striking change to catch the eye is the new radiator. Still retaining the Ford identity, the contour of the shell is extremely attractive, blending beautifully with the new fender lines and other changes."

"This effect is heightened by a sturdy tie rod, finished in black enamel, which rises in a graceful arc from each fender. It supports the license bracket, and the headlights, which are higher than before."

"Additional strength has been built into the body by the construction of the cowl, the sides of which extend in one piece up along the windshield pillar to the roof line. Not only does this save space, but it reduces the possibility of squeaks. White cow lights are standard equipment only on the town sedan and cabriolet, all body types have been wired for them, and they may be installed at small cost."

"A sturdy, compact design of the wheels has been produced. They are smaller in diameter and consequently nearer the road. As before, they are made complete, in one piece, all of the steel spokes being electrically welded to the axle shell and rim. The angle at which the spokes are placed helps to distribute the force of road shocks and gives greater strength."

"In general, I want to emphasize that the new bodies will not be mounted on a new model car. Mechanically Model A will remain essentially as it is, but great beauty will be added by the new bodies and colors."

"The Ford Model A will now have, including features it already possesses, new body lines and colors, rustless steel trimmings, sturdy steel construction, a fully enclosed all-weather system, four Houdaille hydraulic double-acting shock absorbers, Triplex shatter-proof glass windshield, quick acceleration, ease of control, and 55 to 65 miles an hour, if wanted."

EL DORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Dec. 29.—Fanned by a high wind, fire of undetermined origin yesterday destroyed the Eldorado Springs dance hall, bath house and to summer homes before it was brought under control. WALLA WALLA, Wash., Dec. 28.—Ben F. Hill, recently elected for a third term, mayor of Walla Walla and prominent in state politics for many years, died at his home here yesterday from the effects of a paraly
