

TROJANS QUOTED AS FAVORITES TO DEFEAT PANTHERS

Superior Weight and Power
in Mass Attack Offset
to Pittsburgh's
Speedy Stars.

Seventy Thousand Expected
to See Intersectional
Struggle in Rose
Bowl Today.

PASADENA, Calif., Jan. 1.—On the historic greenward of the Rose Bowl, where annually is unfolded on New Year's day the drama of an intersectional contest for Golden supremacy, the Golden Panthers of Pittsburgh and the University of Southern California Trojans today assembled their forces for the fifteenth annual tournament of rose football classic.

Primed to the minute, these select eleven will pit their skill and cunning against each other before 70,000 enthusiasts in a jealous defense of the honor of the east and the Pacific seaboard. Despite a season's record marred by two defeats, Coach Howard Jones' Trojans were quoted as slight favorites to administer to Coach John Sutherland's combination its initial beating.

Weather Is Factor.
A much talked of climatic condition—warm weather—had a great deal to do with this partiality shown the coast aggregation. Predictions from official sources were that a clear warm day, which would see the mercury mount to 65 or 70 degrees, would be on the program.

Since the day back in 1916 when football stepped in to replace chariot races as the athletic attraction of the annual rose tournament, the west has collected five victories. Three games have ended in deadlock, while four are claimed by aggregations from east of the Mississippi river. This does not account for two games between service teams in 1918 and 1919, during the World war.

Pitt Outweighed.
For individual brilliancy, the Pitt team, with such all-American linemen as Octavius Hanna, Joe Bonness, Tom Parkinson and Jay Montgomery, holds the edge. The Southern California squad hopes to couple a boasted reserve power of untold proportions with such sparkling performers as Russell Saunders, Francis Tappan and Marshall Duffield.

Especially in the backfield, do the Troy warriors possess potential strength which all but eclipses that of the starting lineup, and the forward wall is not without its rugged supporting cast. Superior weight was expected to be claimed by the Coach Jones aggregation.

SCIENTIST WOULD PRODUCE LIGHT FOR NIGHT 'SUNSHINE'

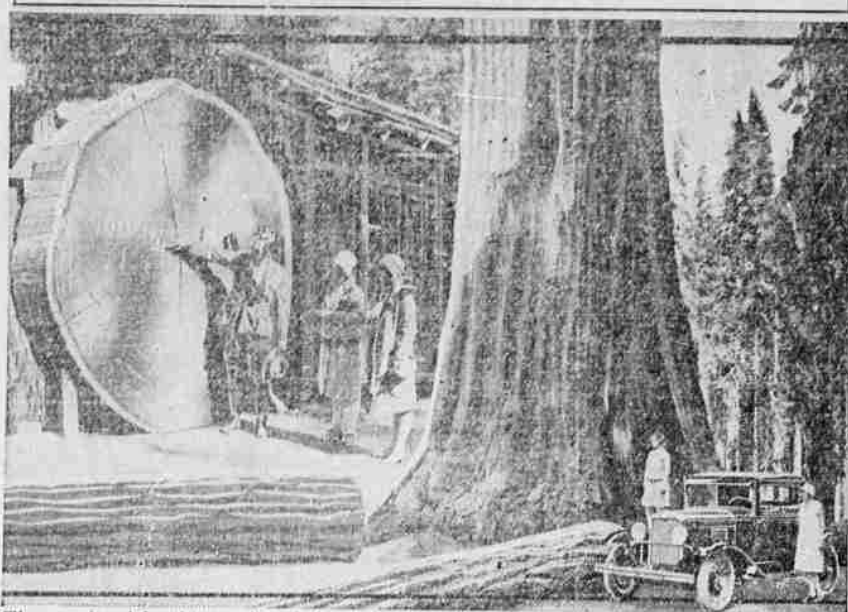

DES MOINES, Ia., Dec. 31.—A three-day week for machine workers through use of present available energy in artificial light is suggested to the American Association for the Advancement of Science as an industrial development of the future.

It is a by-product of a new field of scientific exploration which was explained to a general session of the association last night by Dr. W. T. Horie, formerly of Harvard medical school. It is based on observations which Dr. Horie said promise the possibility of producing an artificial light, a wide range of healthful and stimulating rays that are neutralized at present because not disintegrated from useless or harmful rays of the same light.

The idea of shorter working hours was suggested to him by a manufacturer and by his own observations that some workers would prefer night work if they might have as healthful conditions as in the day. With the equivalent of sunshine available, artificially it might be possible, he explained, to operate machinery 24 hours a day, saving the interest on capital now lost with idle time, and developing resources to give workers the shorter week.

Dr. Horie illustrated what he has learned about light with graphs showing sunburn produced by different kinds of light, some beneficial for health, the others apparently not so good.

Greater International Rivalry, Keener Competition at Home Are Promised in 1930 Sports Events

NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—The old year with all its thrills in sport fades today before the new, with the promise that 1930 will furnish greater international rivalry, keener competition for the ruling champions, larger crowds, bigger and better arguments.

At the outset, one of the main debates left over from 1929 for settlement in the east-west gridiron feud, the finishing thrusts of which will take place at San Francisco and Pasadena tomorrow, in these, the unbeaten University of Pittsburgh team and the eastern all-stars will seek to reverse the scores which already have been turned in the west's favor by Stanford's conquest of Army.

Two other items of unfinished business, bequeathed by the old year to the new, are the case of Iowa, outcast of the western conference, and the selection of a world's heavyweight boxing champion. The betting seems to be in favor of Iowa's ultimate rehabilitation and the elevation of the Boston sailor, Jack Sharkey, to the post vacated in the summer of 1928 by Gene Tunney and unoccupied since.

Pugdog Prospects.
The first 1930 test for Sharkey is slated in Miami, Feb. 27, with Tuffy Griffiths as a likely opponent. The final test, for the winner of this engagement, probably will be against Max Schmeling in June or September, but there is still some fear that the eliminations again may eliminate all the contenders.

By far the most spectacular outlook for the new year centers about the revival of international classics in golf, polo, yacht-racing and horse-racing, in addition to such hardy annuals as the Davis cup contest.

The picturesque touches, the challenge of the famous Irish sportsman, Sir Thomas Lipton, for the America cup tops the list. This million-dollar venture will find Lipton's Shamrock V seeking the classic for the first time in ten years in a series of races against the American Defender to be sailed off Newport, starting September 13.

Tennis and Golf.
In competitive interest, the invasion of Britain's links again by Bobby Jones will be one of the year's high spots. Besides leading the American Walker cup team, Jones will campaign all along the English golfing front, seeking to repeat his triumphs of 1926 and 1927 in the British open as well as to win the British amateur for the first time. At home, the great Georgian will defend the national open and try to regain the amateur title now held by "Timmy" Johnston, in one of the most strenuous seasons of the Jones era.

The Davis cup war, so far as the United States is concerned, will be fought without Big Bill Tilden for the first time in ten years. Tilden's retirement leaves to youth the battle against France's well-fortified tennis ramparts. The French won without Lacoite in 1928 and they figure to keep the historic trophy for at least another year.

As Helen Wills Moody, the American queen of the world's courts, is expected to continue her

tournament career, and Tilden, even though out of tennis play, will be a factor once more in the men's championships of France, England and the United States.

Mackmen May Repeat.
Connie Mack's Athletics, having crashed through to the world's championship of baseball after a long wait, figure to stay around the top in 1930. The Mackmen have the talent and equipment for a prolonged term at the peak but the dethroned New York Yankees will be primed for a come-back under their new manager, Bob Shawkey. In the National league, the Chicago Cubs face formidable challenges for the pennant from Pittsburgh and New York. Altogether, 1930 should be an interesting year in the management of eight of the 16 big-league clubs.

The youthful talent was not quite good enough in 1929 to break down the barriers erected by many of the old timers; not quite accomplished enough to remove the crowns adorning the aged brows of Ruth, Tilden, Walker, Hornsby, Hagen, Diel and others. Few of the main titles changed hands in the closing year but the campaign of 1930 will see the old guard against keener competition, under higher pressure from the youthful brigade.

Nineteen-twenty-nine closed the bright gridiron chapter of Red Cagle of the Army but the storybook career of Albie Booth of Yale has just begun. With all the sprightly grace of little Albie, Kid 1930 picks up the battle where Old Man 1929 left off.

NEW YEAR'S EVE PARTY TERMINATES IN FATAL AFFRAY

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 1.—One alleged gangster was shot and killed and his murderer probably fatally stabbed and beaten by infuriated friends of the dead man, as the climax of a New Year's eve party while it ushered in 1930 early today, Mammie Herrera, the police reported, was shot through the head in a quarrel over his wife, by Pasquale Bruno, alleged liquor racketeer. Bruno, in turn, was stabbed and probably fatally beaten about the head with the gun that fired the fatal shot into Herrera. The police said that Bruno was one of the gangsters suspected of the murder a year ago of Angelo Lombardo, bootlegger. He was questioned and released.

The shooting took place on North Figueroa street, at the home of Herrera's mother-in-law, where a party was being staged. Connie Herrera, 18-year-old daughter of the slain man, told the police that Bruno had been paying attentions to her mother, and that he had threatened the life of her father previously. She declared Bruno invited her father into the street to

fight, and that he then whipped out the gun, firing point blank. Herrera was killed by a bullet through the head, while three others hit him in the chest, leg and left shoulder. Police reported that other members of the party rushed from the house, attacking Bruno, and that he was beaten down with his own gun.

REWARD IN TEXAS FOR DEAD BANDITS CURBS ROBBERIES

DALLAS, Texas, Jan. 1.—Bank robberies in Texas have shown such a marked decrease since the Texas Bankers' association offered a \$5,000 reward for every "dead bank bandit" that the reward offer will be held open.

Texas had 38 daylight bank robberies in one year and 24 in the eight weeks before the reward was announced in November, 1927. Since then there have been only nine daylight holdups, in which five robbers were killed and rewards paid their slayers.

Insurance companies were threatening to increase premiums or withdraw insurance when the reward was announced. In the 24 robberies immediately before the reward was offered, not a shot was fired, not a robber captured, and not a cent of money recovered.

CONGRESS IN INDIA AUTHORIZES REVOLT AGAINST ENGLAND

LAHORE, India, Dec. 31.—A resolution introduced by Mahatma Gandhi, nationalist leader, declaring that the India congress creed shall in the future mean complete independence, was adopted by the congress by an overwhelming majority today.

The resolution authorized the all-India congress committee, whenever it deems the moment fit to launch a program of civil disobedience. This phrase embraces non-payment of taxes and similar measures of resistance to British rule. The committee was given carte blanche in fixing the conditions under which the campaign shall be conducted.

The resolution also called upon national members of central provincial legislatures to resign from those bodies and proclaimed a general boycott of such assemblies.

It stated, too, that no good purpose could be served by being represented at the proposed round-table conference in London. That gathering is to be called to discuss constitutional reform for India in the light of the coming Simon commission report and the relations between the native states and British India. The congress held that such a discussion would be futile in view of India's need for complete independence.

The only thing approaching an olive branch in the resolution was a paragraph appreciating the efforts of Lord Irwin, viceroy of India, to effect a peaceful settlement of the governmental problem.

bring the liquor question up for general consideration.
