WRESTLERS HERE TOMORROW AFTER TITULAR CHANGE

An all-wrestling card, featuring Mervin Barackman of Olympia, Washington, against Cal Herman, of Roseburg, in a two out of three fall match with a two-hour time limit, is to be presented Friday night at the armory under the auspices of the Roseburg boxing commission. These two wrestlers are both contenders for the junior welterweight championship, now held by Wilfred Pete of Eugene, and are endeavoring to work through the elimination matches now in progress in order to secure the title. They wrestled for the full two hours to a draw in Olympia about six weeks ago, but both are in better condition at this time and a harder match is anticipated.

Barackman is the owner of a wrestling bear which is to be featured in a unique exhibition against three local opponents. The bear creates a great deal of amusement wherever he appears in the ring, and is quite an attraction in the Olympia district, where he frequently is shown in exhibition matches.

HANSEN REVENGES SELF IN RETURN GO WITH CANTONWINE

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 2.—Charles Hansen, Nebraska, took revenge on Howard Cantonwine, local here last night, when he spilled the Iowa grappler two straight falls in a vicious match. Hansen knocked Cantonwine cold after one hour eleven minutes of wrestling to take the first fall with a body blow and head-first slam to the mat. Cantonwine had to be carried to his dressing room and asked an additional five minutes which Hansen refused. He tottered back in a weakened condition and Hansen made short work of it with several busy rabbit punches. In their previous match Hansen was knocked out when thrown from the ring by Cantonwine.

At Karasick and Tarro Miyake, the Japanese wrestler, went one hour to a draw in the preliminary. Miyake won the first fall in 24 minutes 10 seconds with a Japanese Jui Jitsu hammerlock. Karasick took the second fall in 11 minutes with a series of flying reverse headlocks.

TROJANS DEFEAT PITT IN THE ROSE BOWL GAME, 47-14

PASADENA, Calif., Jan. 2.—Battered with a decisive 47 to 14 trouncing handed them as a New Year's day evening, from the mighty Trojans of the University of Southern California, Pittsburg's grid squad today prepared a return to its native heather, victim of the most decisive defeat ever voted out in the fourteen years of tournament of roses competition, and their first defeat of the season. Beginning with the initial touchdown, which came only a few moments after the 70,000 persons had filled the stadium, the men of Troy found scoring possible in four of their seven halves because of unerring aerial work. A fifth counter was indirectly the result of a long pass and the other was the result of plunging, driving football.

The victory of the Trojans was their second in tournament of roses play. In 1923 U. S. C. handed Penn State a 14 to 3 beating.

KETCHELL SHADES RATZLAFF; JUBB IS LOSER OF VERDICT

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 2.—Wesley Ketchell, San Francisco boxer, took a close and unpopular decision from Herman Ratzlaff, Minor, S. D. German "iron man," before a big massed crowd here yesterday, after ten rounds of slugging. Ketchell topped Ratzlaff in the fourth round with a straight right to the face quickly followed by a lightning uppercut under the chin. Ratzlaff bobbed up with only a shake of his head with the count of one and from that time on carried the battle to the former Portlander. The tenth round was a slugging duel, with both trying hard for a knockout. The crowd believed Ratzlaff entitled to at least a draw.

The six-round semi-final between Bob Jubb, Portland, and Millie Gillis, a newcomer from the south, was the liveliest fight of the card. Both took plenty and gave it, with Millie having a change there was and he was given the decision.

TED THYE DUMPS RIVAL IN SEATTLE

SEATTLE, Jan. 2.—Ted Thye of Portland was an eight round wrestling match from Alvin Sopp of Seattle here last night to lay claim to the light heavyweight grappling championship of the world which he formerly held. It was announced before the match that the winner would claim the title which Thye lost to Clarence Ecklund in Australia several years ago, because the latter had re-

used to defend the championship for some time.

Sopp gained the first fall with a body slam in the third round but the Portlander came back with a vicious attack to win the second and third falls. Thye downed Sopp with a wrist lock in the fourth round and a body slam in the fifth.

ALL-STAR EASTERN GRIDDERS DEFEAT WESTERNERS, 19-7

(Associated Press Local Wire) SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 2.—Western enthusiasts were singing the praises of Jack Cannon, Notre Dame guard, Glasgow, Iowa half-back, and a host of other eastern performers today as they were recovering from the effects of seeing the all-star west team trounced 19 to 7 here yesterday by the all-star east team.

The decisiveness of the triumph led spectators at the contest to believe that the east team scored their first touchdown in the opening quarter on a 25-yard pass, added another in the second, and completed their scoring by means of two field goals by Frosty Peters of Illinois.

The west made their lone score in the third quarter when Stoner of Nebraska, crashed through for a touchdown after a march down the field.

Cannon undoubtedly played the most spectacular game of his colorful gridiron career. The fifty thousand spectators hailed him as one of the greatest of all guards to put in an appearance in this section.

It was the second consecutive defeat for the west in the annual Shrine classic. Last year's contest also was won by the east with a score of 20 to 0.

The west's attack in yesterday's game was broken early when the eastern squad unleashed an offensive led by the charging "Bronko" Nagurski of Minnesota who covered all most of the territory. Hal Dornia of Dartmouth boomed the attack of the easterners when he went over for the first touchdown. The second touchdown was scored by Glasgow.

COUGARS TROUCE HAWAII, 28 TO 7

HONOLULU, Jan. 2.—Victorious over the University of Hawaii football eleven by a score of 28 to 7, the Washington State college grid-iron today made ready to return home.

The opposing eleven fought through a scoreless first period here yesterday in the final inter-sectional game of the season in Hawaii. Then Washington State broke through the Hawaiian line to score three touchdowns in the second period.

Hawaii made its only score in the third on a series of end runs and off-tackle plays, converting for an extra point. The visitors made their final touchdown in the last period.

MYRTLE CREEK WINS FROM YONCALLA IN HOOPER BATTLE

The Myrtle Creek high school basketball team defeated Yoncalla high New Year's eve by a score of 29 to 22. The game was played at Myrtle Creek and was close, Yoncalla taking the lead and holding it until the second half, when fast team work put Myrtle Creek in the lead.

Myrtle Creek plays Oakland Friday night, and Yoncalla plays Spencer's Roseburg team at Yoncalla on the same date, coming to Roseburg for a return game the following Wednesday.

OFFICERS GUILTY IN IDAHO LIQUOR CASE WON'T QUIT

COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho, Jan. 1.—With the first act of the north Idaho "whiskey rebellion" closed with the conviction and sentencing of 21 men and women, the scene suddenly shifted today to Wallace, to a new rebellion.

Sheriff R. E. Weniger, of Shoshone county, who was sentenced to serve two years in prison and to pay \$1,000 fine, was the principal character and the plot revolved around the state's efforts to remove him from office.

The second act, performed by Hoyt E. Ray, United States district attorney, leader of the crusade against liquor violations in the Coeur d'Alene mining region, was the trial of Weniger. Mayor Herman J. Rosst, of Wallace, and other officials on charges of conspiracy similar to those pressed in the case of Mullin. The date for this trial had not been set.

Under Idaho laws, conviction of a felony automatically removes an officer and in this case Coroner H. C. Mowery was next in line of succession to the sheriff's office but Weniger was reported to have refused to vacate and Mowery said: "I do not care to become a party to this conflict." Sheriff Weniger, he said, "refused point blank" to vacate until a appeal to the United States circuit court of appeals has been disposed of.

In the meantime, in Boise, W. D. Gillis, attorney general, was of the opinion that the office was vacant, and he was reported to have said that ouster proceedings would be started at once against Weniger, his deputy, Charles Bloom, and Mullin city officials all of whom were convicted by a federal jury here Sunday night.

MOTORIST KILLS PEDESTRIAN, FIXES LIGHT, SPEEDS ON

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 2.—A state-wide search for the hit-and-run motorist whose savage brutality and wanton heedlessness was responsible for the death of Herman Brandt, 60, Portland pedestrian, last night was in progress today.

After crashing into Brandt, the motorist, accompanied by a woman and boy, stepped from his machine, adjusted the headlight of his car and sped onward.

The woman and boy walked back 75 feet to view the body of Brandt, authorities were told.

Both the woman and driver endeavored to silence the youth, police learned, when he came back to the machine crying "he's dead."

Authorities said Brandt was crossing Foster road and the automobile which inflicted fatal injuries to his head was traveling fast. Three witnesses told various versions of the accident, but none obtained the license number of the automobile.

The death constituted the first auto fatality of the new year.

LAST PIPES PLACED IN MEMORIAL ORGAN

Final installation work on the memorial pipe organ at the First Christian church is being done today by E. L. Vaughn, representative of the Robert Morton Organ company. While the organ has been in use for the past week, two sets of pipes were lacking, as the factory had not completed them. The last shipment was received yesterday and Mr. Vaughn arrived last night to complete the work. There are eleven sets of pipes in the organ, each containing 75 pipes. The above and dulciana sets are being installed today, and as both of these are used in solo work, they will be important additions.
