

MELLON UPHOLDS KILLING OF TRIO OF RUM RUNNERS

Coast Guards Within Right Prescribed by Statute, Declares Head of U. S. Treasury.

Transfer of Dry Bureau to Justice Department Is Favored—No Reply Made to Critics.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—Secretary Mellon today asserted that the coast guard had done nothing that was not justified and authorized under the law in firing on the liquor smuggling boat, Black Duck, which resulted in the death of three men.

Mr. Mellon's statement was in line with those previously made by Rear Admiral Bullard, coast guard commander, and Assistant Secretary Lamm, both of whom had defended the coast guard.

The secretary of the treasury said that as much as the shooting was regretted, reports to him indicated that the coast guard was acting "entirely within their instructions and observing their duty in what they did."

They gave warning, the boat was endeavoring to escape and they could not do less than they did," he added.

Legal Duty Performed

The secretary said that the coast guard had information that the smugglers were attempting to run liquor into the United States, and concentrated coast guard boats in that vicinity. The Black Duck, he said, was near the coast of Newport.

"The coast guard," Mr. Mellon said, "is authorized under the law to use force to stop boats. If they could not shoot they could not carry out their instructions. They give warnings and pursue and if a boat does not stop it is necessary to use force, in these cases the men were violators of the law. They were smuggling liquor and it was the coast guard's duty to capture them."

Asserting that all reports of the coast guard indicated that "everything was regular and that they were justified in what they were doing," Mr. Mellon added, "our men only use force where it is absolutely necessary."

Transfer Favored

Discussing enforcement in general, the secretary said that he favored the transfer of the entire prohibition unit from the jurisdiction of the department of justice. He pointed out that at present the department of justice prosecutes the cases that are developed by the prohibition enforcement divisions, but the belief that better cooperation could be obtained if both divisions were under the same department.

The secretary said the treasury was having an independent investigation made into the shooting of the smugglers merely to bring out anything that had not as yet been learned.

Mr. Mellon declined to discuss any of the attacks upon him made by members of congress or any of the statements regarding prohibition enforcement from the same source. He asserted the personnel of the prohibition enforcement divisions was using every effort to enforce the prohibition law.

One of the major problems now confronting enforcement, he said, was the smuggling of liquor into this country from Canada and from nearby foreign possessions, adding that progress had been made in preventing diversion of industrial alcohol for bootleg purposes.

Borah Makes Denial

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—Senator Borah, of Idaho, today denied widely published reports that Mrs. Mabel Walker Willebrandt, former assistant attorney general in charge of prohibition cases, was the source of his information on prohibition conditions throughout the country.

"Mrs. Willebrandt should not be drawn into this matter," said Senator Borah. "She has had nothing to do with it."

Decree Asked

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—The department of justice today asked the supreme court to hold that a purchaser is guilty of conspiracy when he orders liquor from a bootlegger knowing that its delivery will involve illegal transportation.

Mob Protest in Boston

BOSTON, Jan. 3.—Crowds gathered in front of the Boston commonwealth house today and destroyed yesterday shortly after a meeting in Faneuil hall in protest of killing of three rum runners off Newport, R. I., Sunday by coast guardsmen was concluded. The petty officer in charge of the recruiting station was unable to cope with the demonstrators.

The crowd approached the station and before Chief Water Trench, George Briggs could do anything to prevent them, they tore the posters from the metal standards upon which they were posted and trampled them into the ground. They then kicked the metal frames about the sidewalk.

Briggs, when the demonstrators had finished, picked up the remains of the standards and hurried with them to eastern division coast guard headquarters at the customs house where he reported the details of the incident to his superiors.

A resolution unanimously adopted previously by a meeting which taxed the capacity of Faneuil hall asked President Hoover to order an investigation of the killing of the three rum runners and the investigation to be made "by somebody not connected with the coast guard or the treasury department. Officers of the Liberal Civic

league, which called the meeting, presented a report of their investigation into the shooting of the three rum runners, an investigation which they said proved "flagrant violation of the law on the part of the government agents."

C. W. Crocker, general counsel for the league, denied the rum runners were attempting to escape when they were killed.

Secret Code Alleged

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Jan. 2.—Charges that radio messages, in secret code, were being used by rum smuggling ships of the southern California coast to receive orders and warnings from their alleged owners in Canada, were made by the government today in prosecuting a libel suit against the weekend cabin cruiser, Chiquita.

The suit through which the government seeks forfeiture of the asserted rum running boat was being heard by United States Commissioner Davis Head. The Chiquita was captured by coast guard boats several weeks ago after a sun battle that lasted nearly an hour off Magu lagoons. No liquor was found on board but coast guardsmen alleged that in crew throw overboard a large number of sacks.

Emmett Dougherty, assistant United States attorney, testified that, through the mystery radio, rum ships were in constant communication with their owners. He declared the government had determined the identity of the rum runner's radio operator through peculiar characteristics of his sending. Dougherty argued that these peculiarities were admissible for identification the same as hand writing traits.

New Worry for Drys

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—A tremendous increase in the production of corn sugar which can be used in making bootleg liquor is causing concern both of the prohibition bureau and the enforcement officers.

Prohibition Commissioner Doran said today that his agents were reporting the seizure of an increasing number of corn sugar distilleries and a decreasing number of plants for converting industrial alcohol. He cited figures furnished by the department of commerce showing that producing of corn sugar had increased from 152,000,000 pounds in 1921 to 968,000,000 pounds in the 1928 fiscal year.

Commissioner Doran in the past has said that the plan adopted two years ago of limiting the manufacture of industrial alcohol to the amount required by the country in its industries had caused the diversion to bootleg channels to drop from a major to a minor question in the enforcement of the prohibition law.

Secretary Mellon in his annual report a month ago told congress that the diversion of denatured alcohol for beverage purposes had "practically ceased."

PAPER ON WAVES WELDING UNIVERSE WINS \$1,000 PRIZE

DES MOINES, Ia., Jan. 2.—A new proof of the peculiar wave motion, believed by some scientists to cement the universe today was awarded the highest honor of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the \$1,000 reward for "an outstanding paper."

The author was A. J. Dempster, physicist of the University of Chicago.

Dempster demonstrated in direct but visible evidence of the wave motion of very tiny bits of hydrogen. They were nearly full sized atoms, 2,000 times heavier than anything in which this odd motion previously has been conclusively shown.

According to one of the latest sensations in science, called wave-mechanics, there is thought to be a wave motion of the particles in all substances. It is believed that this motion in some manner effects the very nature of material substance.

Extremists have gone so far as to suggest that everything which exists is in the last analysis merely some form of wave motion.

Tangible proof of this motion is regarded with great interest. Only a few physicists have attempted demonstrations and it was barely two years ago that Davison and Germer of New York obtained one of the first evidences. That was of wave motion in electrons, particles far lighter than the bits of hydrogen used by Dempster. One or two other physicists have reported evidence of the hydrogen motion, and the award to Dempster was made on account of the convincing nature of his demonstration.

In a vacuum tube he stripped a stream of hydrogen atoms of their electrons. He had left nearly full sized atoms which he directed in a tiny stream against a calcite crystal. In the manner in which these atoms rebounded off the crystal surface he showed that they were hitting it with a wave motion.

Mr. Dempster is known among scientists for work on vacuum tubes and for analysis of isotopes, which are minute differences in weight of elements that do not affect their chemical actions.
