WHO WILL RUN?

SUPPOSE George Neuner should decide to run for governor in the May primaries. What factors he is weighing before giving his decision are, of course, not known. They are personal matters. Mr. Neuner is a successful man, a fairly young man. He might even be weighing the worthwhileness of being governor of Oregon as it would influence the future of his career. Without being egotistical at all, a young man has to give full consideration to such things. The governorship of a state is by no means the pinnacle of personal achievement for a man in middle life. That this is true is no reflection on the honor of the position for its honor, particularly in a Pacific coast state is very great. The difficulty is that a middle aged man, after having served his time as governor finds himself, at the age of his greatest personal power, an ex-governor. Ex-President Coolidge finds himself in pretty much that position and he is perhaps having difficulty in finding a satisfactory personal adjustment. With so many other elements involved in the present situation it is not likely that Mr. Neuner is bothered about this particular personal problem, nevertheless, he will have to give it consideration in making his final decision.

Who else will run for the nomination? Only one announcement has been definitely made, that of Governor Norblad. It is assumed that Charles Hall of Marshfield will run as will Bennett of Multnomah county. These are in the column of certainties. In the doubtful column along with Neuner, are Phil Metschan of Portland and Harry Corbett of Portland, C. E. Gates of Medford and perhaps one or two others. The so-called republican "machine" can not function in the primaries under the circumstances but Portland republicans have long wanted a successful Multnomah county candidate. Neuner has ample support in Multnomah that is not of the "machine" type. This particular support is probably personal and because of its nature could not be delivered intact to any other person. Neuner is not typically a politician and if he decided not to enter the race, would probably take no part or interest in the election.

To an outsider it looks as though Multnomah politicians would come nearer to achieving their ambition of seeing a Multnomah man on the board of control, by encouraging Neuner. The present situation is, however, one that gives a legitimate chance for any citizen to gratify a personal ambition to run for governor without incurring party wrath so right now one guess is just as good as another. All of this leads only to one definite conclusion and that is that the coming race for the republican nomination for the office of governor of Oregon is more interesting to the rank and file of voters than any primary race has been for a long time.
