Third Plane Unscathed

Jacob Treibwasser, parachute jumper, who had expected to risk his life in a hazardous leap into the sea, had not yet entered the scene when the third plane crashed.

He and his pilot, Lt. Col. Rose Turner, and two companions, Fred Osborne and Bert White, motion picture technicians, scoured away unscathed, their plane not yet having been maneuvered into line with the camera ships.

Treibwasser was poised for his jump, waiting for the word from White, who was responsible for the timing of the leap, was watching the camera planes, when a thin cry wafted through the roar of the motors.

"They're crashing!"

Turner, five hundred feet below the doomed camera planes, wheeled his ship well into the clear before the shrieking, fire-stricken wreckage plunged by.

Story of Witnesses

"I saw the planes," White said, "one of which was settling, came together. Their wing tips touched. Then the wings telescoped, and the cabins crashed together. There was an explosive flash, and bodies were hurled out. The flaming ships began to fall like plumes into the sea."

"No one could have lived in those planes before they struck the water. They were enveloped in fire. They fell apart as they struck the surface of the ocean."

E. W. O'Connell, head cameraman of the Fox Film corporation, for whom the picture was being made, was stationed in a speed boat on the water under the planes, prepared to pick Treibwasser up after his jump.

"It was all over in a minute," he said. "I saw one of the camera planes swing toward the other. Their wing tips caught and they came to a head-on collision. They burst into flames and seemed to hang in midair for a moment."

"They then plunged down, still locked together. They still were burning when they struck."

O'Connell used his boat to the water and looked up the bodies of Gold, Wells and Franklin. No water was found in their lungs, indicating they had died in the crash.

Mary Astor was prostrated when she finally was told of her husband's death, after the tragic news had been withheld from her until every vestige of hope was gone. She is under the care of her physician in her Hollywood home.

Whim Saves Life

Howard Hawks, brother of Kenneth and brother-in-law of Norma Shearer, screen actress, escaped death because a whim caused him to change his mind, after he had come to Clover field with the intention of accompanying Kenneth on the flight.

W. G. Hawks, another brother of the dead director, recently married Deane Love, film actress.

J. G. Hall, inspector of the aeronautics branch of the department of commerce, is starting an investigation today. He is stationed at Clover field, the airport from which the planes took off.

Patterson became governor he got the authority of the legislature to place a superintendent at the head of the prison. Meyers was appointed to this office. James W. Lewis, who had served as warden under Governor Olcott, was again made warden and E. C. Kelley was appointed deputy warden. These three have been in charge of the prison for the last three years.

Harmony and Morale

"Perfect harmony exists among the prison officials," Meyers said today, "and as now constituted, I don't see what improvement could be made in what the society of penal information calls leadership. As for morale among inmates I need only point to the fact that we have lost only one man by escape in three years."

Meyers does not agree with the society's criticism of the prison "bull pen," which is the place where inmates are locked up. It is admitted that the cells in this part of the prison are not heated, but the superintendent declares they are kept in a sanitary condition.

The bull pen is one of the most useful prison adjuncts," Meyers said. "Solitary confinement is not sufficient punishment for incurables, as this society seems to think. To have the desired effect the bull pen must be a place that the prisoners will wish to avoid."

He added that the dungeon, the lash, the hose and other forms of punishment used some years ago have been abolished.

It is admitted that the prison is not on a par with many others in facilities for the education of inmates. Meyers said a vocational

Conditions Assailed

NEW YORK, Jan. 3.—Overcrowded conditions in the state prison at Salem, Ore., and the fire hazards in the prison hospital are criticized in the forthcoming third issue of the handbook of the American prison society, the national society of penal information announced today.

The book contains results of a survey of the society of penal institutions throughout the country. It states that frequent changes in wardens at Salem—average term about one year for the last decade—prevents the development of the application of any consistent policy.

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BOUNTY TO SUGAR GROWERS PLANNED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—Senator Borah of Idaho disclosed today that senate republican independent committee are seriously considering supporting a sugar bounty to appear alone as an amendment to the pending tariff bill.

The Idaho senator is preparing the bounty amendment but is not ready to say what figure will be proposed. He said its purpose would be to extend benefit to American producers and for that reason Philippine sugar growers would be excluded.

The sugar schedule in the tariff bill probably will be reached soon after the senate resumes debate next week.
