

## X-RAY OBSERVES VARIOUS EMOTIONS IN HUMAN STOMACH

Experiments Conducted on  
300 Students Reflect  
Temperaments and  
Reactions.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Jan. 2.—For a long time the human stomach has been known as a bad actor, which talks back and speaks out of turn generally.

Now two scientists at Western Reserve university here have given this little organ the same treatment which Hollywood tradition, registering fear, dismay and happiness.

Nearly 300 healthy students, in various stages of excitement, were examined in this study by Prof. T. Wingate Todd and William Kuenzel. Among other important traits they discovered reactions analogous to facial expressions.

"When a student first submits to an examination he usually has a sinking sensation," Miss Kuenzel relates. "The lower part of the stomach reflects this feeling and has sunk, in some instances, until it presents a picture of an elongated tube with the lower end resting upon the very rim of the pelvis. But at the next examination the student is braver and the stomach appears to have risen."

"If we happen to know that the student is dreading an examination in one of his classes, or fear some other future event, the stomach again will present this sunken, lethargic appearance."

It requires three or four examinations before the stomach returns normally.

The stomach also reflects in a manner the temperament of the person examined.

In a person whose reactions are quick, who moves and speaks rapidly, the stomach also is more active than in a person who is stolid and talks and moves slowly," she said.

But, Miss Kuenzel points out, all foods in the stomach, are at least suspended in fluid swallowed or gastric juice.

Buttermilk will make even a lethargic stomach kick into action. Milk seems to soothe it, for the response is quite gentle. After a drink of water the stomach is quite vigorous.

A hot water bottle on the abdomen will make the stomach more vigorous and an ice pack will do the same but the effect is much more temporary.

Miss Kuenzel suggests that hot coffee follow the ice cream in order to carry on its food work stimulating stomach activity. The chocolate peppermint has the same effect, at least in students.

Probably this is the reason why so many physicians have found the addition of peppermint to a stomachic medicine of real service.

The hot water bottle, as comforting to a "pain in the tummy," acts as a regulator of stomach movement and restores a tranquil activity to an over-wrought organ.

## LINDY PREDICTS OCEAN AIR MAIL IN FIVE YEARS

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Jan. 2.—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh and Mrs. Lindbergh, who are accompanying her husband on an inspection trip over lines of the Transcontinental Air Transport, arrived here today from St. Louis.

In an interview before he left, his second diving his visit here, Colonel Lindbergh predicted that

trans-Atlantic airmail lines will be a regular operation within five years. "Trans-Atlantic passenger flying will become commonplace after the mail lines have been established," he said. "And the mail planes will be the first to cross the ocean on regular schedule. Large seaplanes will be used. But there is really no reason why a plane cannot cross without artificial landing facilities. It's not so far after all."

Asked if he might fly the Atlantic again, the noted aviator was uncertain, but said he had no plans for such a flight.

## TWIN FALLS MAY ACCOMMODATE LASS LONGING FOR JAIL

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 2.—Portland police said today they would do all in their power to aid Capitola Cooper, 21-year-old, reported to be in jail somewhere, but they said Twin Falls, Idaho, would be the best place for her to apply.

The girl, held in San Francisco on a charge of masquerading as a man, told bay city authorities she was wanted in Salem, Ore., for passing fictitious checks. Salem officials referred her to San Francisco police to Silverton, Ore., where it is said Capitola gave a printer a bad check for publishing a book of her poems.

Portland authorities said Miss Cooper walked into the police station here several weeks ago and notified them she was wanted at Twin Falls for passing bad checks totaling \$250. Idaho police said they did not want her, but if she reappeared later, authorities said, that Twin Falls had preferred charges against her on four counts.

Miss Cooper was convicted on a charge of vagrancy here, but was allowed to leave town attired in boy's clothing.

## GENERAL WEYGAND NAMED CHIEF OF ARMY OF FRANCE

PARIS, Jan. 2.—General Maxime Weygand, considered the military heir of Marshal Foch, was today officially named chief of the French army general staff.

His promotion has been generally known since last March. Weygand was considered by Foch the ablest active military chief in France. Not long before his death Foch said in a conversation "when I am no longer here, if a military peril menaces France, call on Weygand and you can be tranquil."

General Weygand was Marshal Foch's chief of staff after 1915 and was a member of the French delegation to the Washington conference in 1921.

He is famous for his Polish campaign in 1920 when he took command of the Polish army at the gates of Warsaw and drove back the Russians. He was born in Bromberg in 1867 and entered the French army as second lieutenant in a regiment of dragons in 1891.

**STUDENTS' SOILED  
TROUSERS DECRIED**
