MARSHALL DANA, of Portland, traveling in the South Seas, has found a 96-year-old who is the champion mangel grower of New Zealand, having raised 129 tons of this succulent cow food on one acre this year.

This near centenarian relates that in spite of his rather advanced age he feels as spry as a cricket and expects to live far past the hundred mark.

HERE is his recipe for health and long life: "I work hard and don't worry and am very fond of my friends."

Perhaps YOU can beat that as a rule for long life and happiness. This writer can't. Work hard, don't worry and be fond of your friends and, even if you don't live to be 96, you will have a lot of fun during the years you do live.

MARSHALL DANA, by the way, has been sent to New Zealand by the Journal to see if he can find out some things about dairying to bring back to Oregon for the aid of the dairying industry here.

Here are some things we could do for dairying in Oregon, without going to New Zealand to find them out: "Get better cows. Grow cheaper feeds. Keep the good heifer calves, instead of killing them for veal."

THE curse of the dairy industry of Oregon is the poor cow. Experts tell us that a cow should produce at least 240 pounds of butterfat per year in order to show a profit for her owner, but the average production of cows in Oregon is under 200 pounds per year.

ONE OF the great shortcomings of the dairying industry west of the Cascades is lack of proper feeds—especially proper hay. We need more legumes, particularly alfalfa.

Trying to run dairy cows without proper feeds is like trying to run automobiles with kerosene instead of gasoline.

PEOPLE who know what they are talking about tell us we are killing too many heifer calves for veal, instead of raising them and selling them to dairy buyers from other states.

We complain from time to time that buyers come up from California and buy all our good dairy cows, leaving us none with which to carry on our industry.

Instead of complaining, we ought to be raising dairy cows to sell to these California buyers.

HERE is one reason why there is a steady market for dairy cows in California:

Down there they keep their cows up in a dry lot, feeding them heavily for intensive production. Cows don't last long under this kind of handling, so the supply has to be constantly renewed.

That is one reason why California buyers are constantly scouring Oregon for cows. If we are wise, we will raise the cows to sell to them.

CONGRESS AT WORK AGAIN AFTER REST

Prohibition and Tariff to Demand Most Attention; Representative of Tammany Quits.

"Obscene" Broadcasting of Station at Shreveport Brings Request for Official Ban.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—Faced with the incomplete tariff bill, the controversy over prohibition and a host of other questions that may necessitate their remaining at work until summer, the house and senate reconvened today after a recess over the Christmas-New Year holiday season.

The tariff bill was the unfinished business in the senate and leaders apparently were determined to press its consideration at every opportunity.

In the house, a few minutes after Speaker Longworth's gavel called the chamber to order, the appropriations committee formally reported the annual army supply bill proposing maintenance for the next fiscal year of the present standing army which has an enlisted strength of 118,700 men.

The house then received the resignation of Representative John Carey, for years leader in the house of the New York Tammany delegation, who has accepted appointment by Governor Roosevelt to the New York state supreme bench.

In 14 minutes from the time it convened, the house adjourned out of respect to the late Representative Leatherstocking, republican, Utah.

Broadcast Under Fire The federal radio commission and the attorney general were asked in the senate today by Senator Dill of Washington to stop the broadcasting of "obscene language" by station KWKH at Shreveport, La.

Dill had read a telegram from L. J. Watrous of Minneapolis, Minn., in which a complaint against the station was made, and then expressed the opinion that if the radio commission believed it had no authority to prosecute, the attorney general had such power under the penal provisions of the radio act.

"It would seem," the Washington senator said, "that public interest alone would justify the stopping of this broadcasting. The law makes it a crime to use profanity on the air."

The station is operated by W. K. Henderson, who is an outspoken opponent of chain stores.

Bills to create a new federal reserve cooperative banking system, to prohibit short selling on stock and grain exchanges and to license corporations engaged in interstate commerce, were introduced today by Senator Brookhart, republican, Iowa.

Pro-India Bill WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—A resolution asking early recognition of the independence of India by the United States was introduced today by Senator Blaine, republican, Wisconsin.

POISON TAKEN BY ERROR KILLS NURSE ALBANY, Ore., Jan. 6.—A nurse who mistook poison for a mouthwash Friday night died in the hospital of which she was superintendent here last night.

Miss Alice Peddicord, 43, superintendent of Albany General hospital and a native of Wasco, Ore., thought she was taking a mouthwash, hospital authorities said, but took a strong poison instead.

She was graduated from a Seattle nurses' training school and has been superintendent here since 1924. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. P. P. Peddicord, reside in Corvallis.

WOMAN SUICIDES BY DRINKING LYE (Associated Press Leased Wire) PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 6.—Mrs. Cordelia Schofield, 53, who resided on a farm near Forest Grove, ended her life Saturday by drinking a quantity of lye. Information received here today indicated.

Her health and despondency were advanced as causes.

REBUKED GIRL, 15, SWALLOWS POISON PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 6.—A 15-year-old Portland girl yesterday rebuked by her father when she refused to attend church, walked into the bathroom at her home and gulped a quantity of poison, police said today. They refused to divulge her name.

The police surgeon said she would recover.

AUTOMOBILE PYRE OF MURDERED MAN

Blazing Body Found in Suburb of Chicago Believed That of Boozie War Victim.

(Associated Press Leased Wire) STEGER, Ill., Jan. 6.—The liquor racket was blamed today for the death of a youth whose burning body was found yesterday sprawled inside a flaming automobile.

Two highway policemen, patrolling a road near Steger, a Chicago suburb, heard an explosion and saw the glow from the pyre, half a mile across the countryside. Hastening they found the crematory fire outside Hawthood, the estate of Joseph B. Hawes, Chicago manufacturer.

Inside the sedan was the body, piled on eight five-gallon cans; rivulets of flaming alcohol trickled from the can across the roadway.

Identification of the body was impossible as the head and shoulders were burned nearly crisp; of the clothing the youth wore, only a remnant of a denim overall was left. Clues were few—six keys on a ring and an engine number provided police with the best chances to solve the mystery.

Police believe the youth was dead before burned; they pointed to his cremation as intended to be a warning to others who might encroach on the gangland preserves of rivals.

A post-mortem disclosed a bullet wound in the back of the head while in the roadway, close behind the car, was a match of blood. In reconstructing the bizarre crime, police believe the youth was pulled from the car by his rivals and shot to death; then the car and clothing were saturated with gasoline and alcohol and the body tossed onto the back seat of the sedan.

The explosion was attributed to the alcohol still in the cans when the pyre was set ablaze.

GLLENDALE PLANS BONDS TO BETTER WATER SYSTEM (News-Review-Douglas County Special)

GLENNDALE, Ore., Jan. 6.—An ordinance proposing a special election on the question of issuing \$13,000 worth of bonds for the improvement of the municipal water system is scheduled for consideration by the city council tonight.

The ordinance, drafted by Attorney A. N. Orent of Roseburg, for immediate reconsideration of the system submitted by a committee recently appointed by Mayor J. H. Brown and comprised of I. H. Smith, Chas. Kafer, J. E. Nelson, R. M. Moore and William Wansch.

It is proposed to re-lay much of the present system with new and larger pipe and to make repairs and several extensions to outlying units. The proposed flotation of \$13,000 worth of bonds covers no plan for additional water supply, the committee regarding this as a secondary matter and not urgent at present.

The bonding proposition to be submitted to the electorate provides for retirement of the debt at the rate of \$1,000 annually after three years, completing liquidation within 15 years. The city at the present time has \$3,000.00 outstanding on sewer bonds that are being retired at the rate of \$1,000 per year. By issuing water bonds that can be paid off at the rate of \$1,000 per year with the first payment to commence when the sewer bonds have been paid off three years hence, the present rate of tax levy will remain practically unchanged by the cost of the proposed water system improvements.

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STUDENT IN INSANITY FIT KILLS FATHER

Borrowed Gun Also Turned on Mother, Who Is Shot Twice Before She Disarms Son.

Mental Derangement Laid to Over-Study; Queer Actions Bear on Religions.

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 6.—Obsessed with a desire to kill, Alan R. Schumm, 17-year-old University of Illinois freshman, shot his father, William Schumm, 42, to death and wounded his mother, Mrs. Fayette Schumm, 46, in their home here early yesterday. Police believe he was under temporary mental derangement caused by over-absorption in his studies. He is being held in the observation ward at city hospital.

Returning home from a party at the home of Miss Elsa Winkler, 16, Schumm retired to a bathroom. He stayed so long, his father asked him if he was sick. The elder Schumm had just returned to bed after his son answered in the negative when the youthful student asked his parents to come into the living room.

Tells Victims to Pray "Do you believe in God?" Alan asked.

"Certainly," his father answered. "I'm a Mason. Naturally I believe there is a supreme being."

"Then pray," the son commanded.

His parents, puzzled by his extraordinary remarks, did not comply and the son drew a revolver and began shooting.

The elder Schumm died almost instantly but the youth's mother ran into the kitchen and her son followed her. She disarmed him and tossed the pistol away, running to a neighbor's apartment where she found she had been wounded twice in the hip.

The student called a family friend, told him what he had done, and then picked up the revolver and left in his father's automobile. He tossed the weapon into the Mississippi river and went to the friend's house, where he was persuaded to await police.

Queer Actions Noted Questioned about the slaying, Schumm said he was dominated by the thought of killing and was determined to slay his parents and anyone else who attempted to interfere. He borrowed the weapon from Miss Winkler, saying he wanted it for target practice. It belonged to her father.

His mother, from her hospital bed, told police Alan had been acting queerly recently and had shown a strange interest in the religious beliefs of persons he knew.

He was regarded as a "model" student at Illinois while he had been an honor one at the local high school, where he graduated last June.

TILLAMOOK HARBOR APPROPRIATION OF \$672,000 FAVORED (Associated Press Leased Wire)

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—Secretary of War Hurley today recommended to congress the creation of an 18-foot entrance channel at Tillamook bay, Oregon, at an estimated cost of \$672,000, with \$45,000 annually for maintenance.

The recommendation provides for the extension of the north jetty to full project length, 5,700 feet. This extension, with some necessary dredging, will provide a channel depth of 18 feet compared with the present 12 feet.

The report recommended that local interests should not be called upon to assume the cost of interior channels until the entrance channel of full project dimensions had been assured.

It asked for no improvement of bay and entrance, other than as authorized by the existing project and said the timber resources of the Tillamook area are of great extent and value. The locality, according to the report, has large potentialities and the channel improvement should be maintained at project dimensions.

THREE PERISH WHEN FLYING BOAT DIVES (Associated Press Leased Wire)

MELBOURNE, Australia, Jan. 6.—Captain Hugh Grosvenor and two companions were killed today when a flying boat in which they were traveling made a nose dive into Port Phillip bay.

Captain Grosvenor was heir and only son of Lord Stairbridge. He was aboard-ship to the governor of South Australia.

It had been recently announced that the young man and two pilots intended to make a flight from Australia to England in an effort to break the record of Captain Charles Kingsford-Smith.

Eliminant of Fatal Monoxide Gas Discovered

(Associated Press Leased Wire) BALTIMORE, Jan. 6.—A practical means of eliminating carbon monoxide, the gas that takes an annual toll of hundreds of lives when automobile engines are left running in closed garages, is claimed in the discovery of a Johns Hopkins university professor, announced today.

Dr. J. C. W. Frazer, and R. N. Baker professor of chemistry at the university, made the announcement that tests had shown a motor equipped with his device could run indefinitely in a closed garage without liberating carbon monoxide. Offensive odors from automobile exhausts, which abound in heavy traffic can be suppressed by the chemical action and smoke also will be entirely consumed.

Frazer added: Carbon monoxide is produced by incomplete combustion, and the scientist's discovery is a chemical catalyst which, when the exhaust vapors pass over it mixed with air, converts the monoxide to harmless carbon dioxide. A device to accomplish this has been made and operated successfully in road tests under all kinds of driving conditions, he said, but the present objective is to simplify the apparatus and Prof. Frazer believes accomplishment of this end is in sight.

Dr. Frazer's discovery resulted indirectly from his work in the chemical warfare service during the World war to protect operating guns in closed tunnels.

TRIPLE MURDER BY HUSBAND, 20, ENDS FAMILY DISCORD (Associated Press Leased Wire)

FARMINGTON, Utah, Jan. 6.—Preston Thatcher, prosecuting attorney of Davis county, today prepared to file first degree murder charges against Delbert Green, 20, for the slaying of his young wife, her mother and stepfather late Saturday night.

Green, who fled from the scene of the killings while officers from three counties combed the valley for him, was arrested in bed at his Ogden, Utah, apartment a few hours later and admitted the slayings, officers said. He said family troubles "drove me to do it."

The shooting took place on a farm east of Layton, Utah, six miles north of here, where Green's wife had gone to see her mother after a family quarrel. When Delbert Green arrived, his wife, 18, was in bed with Mrs. James Green, her mother. James Green, Delbert's uncle, and Mrs. Delbert Green's stepfather, was in the kitchen.

Delbert Green first talked to his wife but she refused a reconciliation, he said, and then he went to the kitchen and shot James Green. He then went into the bedroom and shot each woman once. James Green ran for help but died in the street a short distance away. Mrs. Hannah Green, 70, mother of James Green, and Lois Green, 10, daughter of James Green, fled from the house but returned for the infant daughter of Delbert Green. Lois Green pleaded with her half sister's husband before leaving but he again entered the bedroom and shot both women a second time.

The slayer told officers he planned to kill himself but the gun jammed.

Delbert Green served three months in the state prison in 1925 for assault with intent to commit murder but was paroled. He was convicted of shooting a cousin of his wife.

MATCH PLANT HIT BY \$500,000 FIRE (Associated Press Leased Wire)

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 6.—Fire of undetermined origin caused damage estimated at \$500,000 to the plant of the Universal Match company at Ferguson, near here today.

Thousands of boxes of paper matches and large stocks of paper and pasteboard were destroyed.

WOMAN MISSIONER OF 63 MURDERED (Associated Press Leased Wire)

NAIROBI, Kenya Colony, Jan. 6.—Kenya colony police today pressed investigation of the death of Miss Hilda Stumpf, American missionary whose body was found in a house of the Africa inland mission station at Kilishe, 50 miles away. She is believed to have been murdered.

There was evidence the woman had been assaulted. Authorities said she apparently had suffocated after the attack. They believe her assailant to have been a native. Search for him in nearby villages has been instituted.

Charles Kingsford-Smith. Her age was given here as 63.

NEW TURKEY POOL BRINGS GOOD PRICES

Contract Figures Range Up to 32 Cents on Seven Carloads of Fowls From Douglas.

Assembling Period January 9 to 14—Instructions Issued to Members of Cooperative.

Sale of a turkey pool expected to amount to about seven carloads was announced today by Herbert Beyers, manager of the Douglas Cooperative Turkey Growers. The pool will be made up at Eugene, January 9; Yoncalla, January 10; Oakland, January 11 and Roseburg, January 13 and 14. Prices, net to the grower, on government grades, will be prime young toms, 32 cents, prime young hens, 30 cents, choice young toms 29 cents, choice young hens 27 cents, medium 23 cents, old toms 25 cents, and common 18 cents. The turkeys were purchased by Frawley, Clark and company of Portland and the California Produce company of San Francisco.

The deal was made through Herman Schosso, of Yoncalla, active turkey buyer in this county, who acted as agent for the purchasing concern. The offer submitted by Mr. Schosso was about one cent higher on all grades than any other proposals received, according to Mr. Beyers.

It is expected that the bulk of the birds will be shipped to the eastern markets and will be held for storage stock.

Instructions issued Cans are being mailed to members of the association today, announcing the plans for receiving the birds. Loading points in each place will be the same as used previously.

In Roseburg, because of the large number of birds expected to come in here, growers are being asked to observe certain times for bringing in their turkeys, so that there will be no congestion. Growers living east of Roseburg are asked to bring in their birds on the morning of the 13th, those north of Roseburg on the afternoon of that day. Growers south of Roseburg are asked to deliver on the morning of the 14th and those living west, the afternoon of the 14th.

This is expected to be the only shipment during the month of January, unless an attractive offer is received. Mr. Beyers states in view of present market conditions it is believed that the price being offered is extremely good.

It is planned to make another shipment in February, at which time it is hoped to include all of the birds in the county ready for market.

THREE HIT AND RUN TRAGEDIES OCCUPY PORTLAND POLICE

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 6.—While police were searching one end of the city last night for the hit and run motorist who struck and probably fatally injured Sam Filmer, 71, another motorist, Paul Zieschmidt, 22, struck and killed Mrs. Susan Whelan, 70, in the opposite section of the town.

Zieschmidt was held without bail on a charge of manslaughter. He was first held on a charge of reckless driving and driving with defective brakes.

Eyewitnesses to the accident in which Filmer was injured said the motorist paused momentarily and then drove away from the spot where the man lay on the pavement, at a furious pace.

Despite another highly thrilling yesterday, Joe Packer, 22, arrested Saturday as the hit and run suspect in the killing of Herman Brandt, 60, nightwatchman, refused to admit he was responsible and that he had any connection with the case.

Packer was arrested at the home of Miss Vera Carlson, 17, where police found an automobile which tallied with the description of the one which killed Brandt. Miss Carlson and Packer were held on a Mann act charge, while authorities said they discovered Packer and the girl remained in a Seattle hotel overnight following the accident.

CANADAY RENAMED TO LAND OFFICE (Associated Press Leased Wire)

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—The nomination of H. A. Canaday to succeed himself as register of the United States land office at Roseburg, Oregon, was sent to the senate today. Other registers nominated were G. Johnson, Blackfoot, Idaho; and Dr. James W. Donnelly of The Dalles, Oregon.

WARBERG RESIGNS FROM JUNIOR HIGH

Coach-Instructor at Roseburg School Quits For Better Pay at Tekoa, Wash.

George Warberg, athletic coach and instructor in vocational guidance and junior business, at the Junior high school, has tendered his resignation to take immediate effect and is leaving tonight for Tekoa, Washington, where he has accepted a similar position. The new place carries a considerably larger salary. Mr. Warberg states, and in view of the opportunity, thus offered for better remuneration, his request for release was granted at a special meeting of the school board.

The coach at Tekoa tendered his resignation during the Christmas holidays, and the position was offered to Mr. Warberg, whose wife is a teacher in the Tekoa high school. Mr. Warberg, in addition to his work as athletic coach, will teach sociology and geometry.

During his two years in Roseburg Mr. Warberg has had excellent success in his coaching, and has developed fine football and basketball teams, turning out some brilliant and well-trained players.

His place here is to be taken by Scott Williams, a graduate of Month normal and O. S. C. He has had one year of special work in vocational guidance at the state college to apply on his master's degree. He is a former Jefferson high school football and basketball star.

EX-CONVICT AND PAL ACCUSED OF ROSEBURG CRIME

Harry Barr, 21, and Wm. Kinney, 24, were arrested at Eugene yesterday and were brought to Roseburg last night charged with burglary. They are accused of forcing an entrance into the Western Auto Supply store early Sunday morning.

City Officer Ray Rausch, while driving through the alley back of the Western Auto Supply store, about 1:15 Sunday morning, saw a man lurking in the bushes which overhang the fence back of the public library. He immediately stopped his car, and as the officer jumped out the man started to run. He eluded the officer by running back of the Perkins building, and Rausch immediately returned to the store. The doors were locked, and the officer climbed on to the roof, but could find nothing wrong. He started looking for the man who had escaped from him, returning to the store several times to see if he could find anything wrong.

About 3:15 a. m. the night man at the Rose garage saw a man come out of the alley to be picked up at the Rose hotel in a Chrysler roadster. He immediately notified Mr. Rausch, who found that the door to the store was then open. G. M. Kroll, the manager of the store, was called, and an examination of the interior showed that the stock had not been touched. Entrance had been gained through a skylight, and a knotted rope and iron bar were left in the store.

Apparently one of the men had been in the building at the time the officer frightened away his confederate, and remained in hiding until he thought the field was clear.

Officer Rausch telephoned officers both north and south, and the car was halted at Eugene.

The two men were brought back to Roseburg last night by Sheriff Jackson, one of them being identified by Officer Rausch as the man who had escaped him, while the other was identified by the night man at the Rose garage as the one he saw coming out of the alley. Both deny the crime, stating that they drove down Saturday from Portland, and turned back late at night from Winston, after finding considerable snow on the road. They said that they walked around the streets for several hours before leaving town for the north.

Two very similar robberies, both in Western Auto Supply company stores, have been reported by Portland and Salem, and it is believed that the two men might have also been implicated in those crimes. An effort is being made to determine whether the car which they were driving was stolen.

Kinney is an ex-convict, having served a term in the state penitentiary for auto theft.

DRUNKEN DRIVER JAILED AND FINED

George Bailey, a resident of Glendale, arrested Friday charged with driving a car while intoxicated, was brought to Roseburg Saturday by Deputy Sheriff George Olinghouse and was arraigned before Justice of the Peace C. F. Houlton. He entered a plea of guilty to the charge and was fined \$100 and given 90 days in jail. His driver's license was revoked for a period of one year.

WINTER LAYS ICY HAND ON NORTHWEST

White Blanket Covers Wide Area, With Forecast of More Snow; Clear in California.

District Between Roseburg and Grants Pass Worst Hit; Difficulties Beseet Traffic.

Storm conditions that interrupted traffic yesterday between Glendale and Grants Pass were reported somewhat improved today. With nearly two feet of snow on Sexton mountain, highway traffic was badly jammed all day yesterday. Northbound stages were four to five hours behind schedule, due largely to the fact that the highway was blocked by light cars that were stalled on the icy-covered grades of Sexton mountain. Southbound motorists today were warned to put chains on their cars at Canyonville. There was about five inches of snow on the road between Canyonville and Glendale, with increasing snow in the Wolf Creek district. Glendale reported about fifteen inches of snow this morning.

Wire Service Impaired Telephone and telegraph lines went out yesterday between Glendale and Grants Pass. Interim communication was restored Sunday evening about 5 o'clock, but continued trouble throughout the night and today prevented steady service. Large crews are being maintained by the telephone and telegraph company.

Railroad telegraph wires were put out of commission in the vicinity of Wolf Creek.

Northbound Shasta Sunday was four hours behind schedule, as a result of being held up near tunnel No. 6, where a snow-covered tpe fell across the tracks.

The power lines were kept up today despite the snow. The prospect line went out Sunday morning for a few minutes, apparently by a falling tree which grazed the wires. The line evidently was not carried down, however, as the trouble cleared of its own accord in a few minutes.

Glendale Without Lights Glendale is in complete darkness, due to a break in the Copco line between Grants Pass and Wolf Creek. All rural telephone lines in the vicinity of Glendale are out of commission.

The brunt of the storms appears to have hit the mountain district between Glendale and Grants Pass, as no difficulties were experienced north of Glendale, although there is a light snowfall reported all over the state.

The highway commission has sent down and tractors working in the Sexton mountain district and are making a determined effort to get the highway cleared today with the hope of restoring normal traffic this afternoon. The snow condition can be met, it is believed.

KIDNAPING SAID TO AVOID CONTEST OF DIVORCE SUIT

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 6.—D. L. Howard, 35, who three weeks ago was struck by a hit and run motorist who never was apprehended, was in an Oregon City hospital today suffering from exposure after he is said to have been kidnapped from his apartment and found on a road near Milwaukie early today.

Police said Howard, who was paralyzed as the result of the auto accident, accused "Bud" Matson of entering his apartment and forcing him to accompany him. Howard, police said, accused Matson of alienating the affections of Mrs. Howard.

Authorities said they believed Howard was the victim of a marital tangle involving several triangles and that he was kidnapped to keep him from contesting the divorce action brought by his wife, Doris Howard. Time for filing an answer to the suit expired today.

Howard was found on the road, clad in pajamas, by a newspaper truck driver and taken to Oregon City.
