

WILDCAT PETE AND BARACKMAN BILLED HERE JANUARY 10

A wrestling bout between Wildcat Pete of Eugene and Morrie Barackman of Olympia, Wash., for the junior welterweight wrestling championship will be held at the Roseburg armory Friday of this week, according to an announcement made today by Clyde Ward, local boxing promoter. Pete was in Roseburg yesterday on his way to Glendale to visit relatives and agreed to appear in Roseburg against Barackman on the 10th, that being his only open date this month.

Pete recently wrestled the junior welterweight title from "Texas Tiddy" Waters, and has been kept busy defending his new honors. Barackman is considered one of the foremost contenders for the belt, and his victory over Cal Heran last Friday night gives him a further right to the match.

Mr. Ward states that there will be an interesting preliminary in connection with the main event, and Billy, Barackman's wrestling bear, will also appear in the ring in an exhibition match against local opponents.

Barackman, who came from Olympia last week, is going to remain in Roseburg for a couple of months. He is the owner of a show which he presents in outlying communities, putting on an exhibition of strength, together with a demonstration of his wrestling bear, and also a smaller roller skating bear. In addition he has a motion picture entertainment dealing with wild life.

Mr. Barackman is the owner of several motion picture theatres in Washington, but prefers to devote the major portion of his time to the wrestling profession and his traveling show.

ed, but the worst trouble comes from the large number of cars, trying to travel without chains, that have become stalled and are blocking the road. It is necessary to pull them through with tractors.

Conditions over the Skitvons are also bad, as there is more than three feet of snow there.

Roseburg received one inch of snow early this morning, the snow remaining on the ground throughout the day. The temperature dropped to 32 degrees last night, and a continuation of occasional light snows and low temperatures is forecast by the weather bureau.

No Relief Promised

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 6.—Winter rumbled into Oregon today and today foretold in virtually every section of Oregon, sending mercury in thermometers down to new low levels for the season and blundered workers from repairing damage to telephone and telegraph wires in southern Oregon and delayed stage and rail transportation.

Snow and rain swept into the state on the heels of a high cold wind and by nightfall yesterday a heavy blanket of snow had been laid on the highways, mercury had plunged as much as 27 degrees and communication had been interrupted as far south as the California line.

Weather observers said today the state would be treated to a taste of real winter with the mercury plunging lower and a clear cold day tomorrow.

Oregon Conditions
Baker reported it clear and cold today, but no snow.

At Pendleton the mercury took a sudden drop during the night and went down to 19 degrees above zero. About three quarters of an inch of snow fell yesterday but did not remain on the ground. Today it was clear and cold.

A light snow fell in Salem, but had disappeared by morning. The surrounding hills were covered with a thin coating of white and the temperature stood at 38 above.

At La Grande the mercury did a nosedive of 27 degrees and touched a minimum of 10 above, the coldest since the start of winter season. Half an inch of snow fell. The cold wave brought to an end three weeks of spring like weather.

A light flurry of snow covered the ground at Eugene today. Snow fell throughout Sunday on McKenzie pass. About two feet of snow lay on the summit.

The cold wave brought zero weather to Wallawa county with an unofficial report of four below at Enterprise. Other temperatures reported are: Elgin, 8 above; Meacham, 5 above. Highways are in good condition.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 6.—King Winter spread his white mantle over the northwest states today as California looked up into clear skies after a general wetting yesterday that extended to southern California for the first time in four months.

Unsettled and colder weather was promised for the northwest today with a cold wave indicated for the eastern portion. Tuesday, more snow was predicted over the mountains of Idaho, Oregon and Washington with the ridge of high pressure extending eastward to Montana.

Wires Prostrated
In southern Oregon, a storm of blizzard-like proportions swept over the Cascade mountains and tore down miles of telephone and telegraph wires, interrupted rail and highway traffic and deposited a heavy blanket of snow in the highlands. Reports indicated the district between Glendale and Grants Pass, Ore., received the

brunt of the storm. Rain fell in Portland.

In Seattle, snow started falling late yesterday but ceased late at night after coating the streets with a two-inch blanket. Automobiles had difficulty but there was no interference with street railway travel.

A trace of snow fell in Tacoma, while communities north and northeast of there reported between three and four inches. Spokane and vicinity received a trace of snow while the mountains eastward received an abundant share.

Telegraphic communication between eastern Canada and Vancouver, B. C., was disrupted by a sleet, snow and rain storm in Fraser valley, east of Vancouver.

California Outlook

Except in the extreme north portion and in the Sierra Nevada, California was promised generally fair and colder weather. Local frosts in the San Joaquin, Sacramento and Santa Clara valleys were predicted but it was not believed smudge pots would be necessary to protect orchards. The weather bureau expected unsettled conditions to prevail in extreme northern California and promised snow for the Sierra Nevada where temperatures were falling. Southern California, which received its first wetting in four months, recorded precipitation ranging from one half to 1.21 inches. The rain storm moved eastward during the night, however, and sunny skies again were promised by the weather bureau. The rain extended as far south as the mountain summits west of the Imperial valley, giving San Diego one half inch of precipitation.

At Truckee, Calif., snow plows were put into use as the blizzard which deposited more than a foot of snow continued unabated.

In the Yosemite valley, the first snow of the season fell, closing roads but marking the opening of winter sports.

All roads in the vicinity of Tahoe City, Calif., were blocked by heavy snows. Sixteen inches of snow fell overnight.

CHICAGO SENDS NEW LEAD TO SOLUTION OF TAYLOR MURDER

CHICAGO, Jan. 6.—Details of a conversation in a Los Angeles jail between two cellmates—one a Chinese—that may have a connection with the murder of William Desmond Taylor, movie director, were sent to Los Angeles police today by Coroner Herman N. Bunden.

Recently a Chicago business man declared to the coroner that one of his employees was the cellmate of the Chinese. He gave the employee's statement to the coroner.

"The Chinese was called out for questioning and when he was returned he was relieved. He said he thought the police were going to question him about the Taylor murder, but they only asked him about being caught, carrying a revolver. He told me he had been charged in Taylor's home to let him know Taylor had difficulties with narcotic interests. The Chinese said he was connected with the opium traffic and he was paid \$1,000 to kill Taylor."

The employee, who was in jail on a liquor charge at the time, said he believed the name of the Chinese was Harry Lee, alias Harry Young and said he had heard since that Lee was in the San Quentin penitentiary.

Coroner Bunden said he sent the information for what it is worth in the investigation into the Taylor slaying, still a mystery after several years.

His recital will be the first public concert on the memorial organ, which was a gift to the church from Wilbur C. Perkins of Chicago, aside from the dedication and regular church services.

FRIENDSHIP OF 6 YEARS ENDED BY MURDER, SUICIDE

DES MOINES, Iowa, Jan. 6.—The six year friendship of Fayle Belnap, 23, and John Desalvo, 28, today was broken by murder and suicide. Their bodies were found last night in an automobile in Desalvo's garage.

Police declared their deaths to be the climax of a long-standing quarrel. Investigators were told that Desalvo had thrust his attention on the girl after she had attempted to break relations with him.

After shooting the girl Desalvo took his life by shooting himself through the back of the head.

TWO STATES CANNOT TAX SAME PROPERTY, HIGH COURT RULES

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—Minnesota was declared by the supreme court today to be without authority to impose an inheritance tax on bonds issued by it and St. Paul and Minneapolis, and held in New York by Henry R. Taylor, at the time of his death there.

The case attracted wide attention as testing the right of states to place an inheritance tax on bonds and other forms of state and municipal indebtedness held outside their borders.

Minnesota argued that as the debt represented by the bonds was to be settled under the laws of Minnesota it had the right to tax the bonds. The fact that New York might tax them, Minnesota held, did not affect its rights.

Justice McReynolds in delivering the opinion stated that the issue was of great importance to the states and that the supreme court, overruling previous decisions, now held that property, both tangible and intangible, was taxable only by the domicile of the owner and that two states could not tax the same property.

Justice Holmes and Brandeis dissented taking the view that Minnesota could impose inheritance taxes on the bonds although New York, where the owner died, also could tax.

Mrs. Naomi Hall Brady, young bride and sister of Dorothy, and a baby, Samuel Hall, also received fatal injuries in the blast. The nakes, early wrapped, was left at the home of a neighbor for Mrs. Brady and, thinking it was a belated Christmas package, members of the family gathered around as she opened it.
