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SHIRES' TROUBLES INCREASED BY NEW "FIXING" CHARGE

"Dangerous Dan" Daly Says His Supposed Knockout by the Great One Was Frameup.

(Associated Press Local Wire)
CHICAGO, Jan. 6.—The only interest Charles Arthur (The Great) Shires had in the boxing business today was to clear himself of charges of having participated in a fixed fight and attempting to fix another.

The Great One, with a yearning to sign a contract to play first base for the White Sox and withdraw from boxing, awaited a summons from the Illinois State athletic commission to give him an explanation of charges that "Dangerous" Dan Daly of Cleveland, had "taken a dive" for him in Shires' first professional fight at the White city arena December 9.

Already under the ban of the Michigan boxing commission and the National Boxing association, pending investigation of a charge that a representative of his had attempted to fix his scheduled engagement with one "Batling" Criss, at Detroit last week, the Great One's misery was increased by a claim purported to have been made by Daly that the latter had taken a dive.

The latest charge was made by Daly, according to an interview printed in the Ohio State Journal of Columbus, O., yesterday. Daly, the story said, had "gone into the tank" for Shires, because he feared being "taken for a ride" if he failed to yield to a request made by a Shires representative.

Promoter Jim Mullen, Shires, and Eddie Meade, of Cleveland, who brought Daly to Chicago for the fight, all vigorously denied knowing anything about attempts to fix the bout.

Shires agreed that Daly had taken a dive, but insisted it was not voluntary, having been induced by a stout right to the chin.

"I never imagined I'd be willing to fight again for nothing," Shires said, "but if I ever meet Daly or Gerry or whatever his name is, I'll slap him down without mercy and there won't be any admission charge."

Major General John J. Clinnin, chairman of the Illinois state athletic commission, indicated life suspension for the promoter, fighters and managers involved in the at-

tempting to fix the bout.

Shires, who lives in Cow Creek canyon near tunnel 6 where he engages in placer mining when there is sufficient water for sluicing.

THREE PLANES ON HUNT FOR EIELSON ARE FORCED DOWN

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 6.—Charles B. Moores, 80, Oregon pioneer and for more than a half century active in political, historical and educational circles of the state, died at the family residence yesterday.

He was born in Benton county, Missouri, August 6, 1849, and was brought to Oregon in a covered wagon by his father in 1852.

Moores was graduated from Willamette university in 1870 and then studied law at the University of Michigan, where he received his degree of bachelor of law. He returned to Salem to practice and became a trustee of the Willamette university, a position he held 53 years.

He was chairman of the Republican central committee from 1912 until 1914 and during that time was manager of President Taft's campaign in Oregon. In 1880 he served as chief clerk in the Oregon house of representatives and two years later was appointed private secretary to Governor Moody.

For 16 years he was director and vice president of the Oregon Historical society.

Besides his widow he is survived by one daughter, three sons and a brother, A. N. Moores, of Salem.

NIAGARA RIVER SWIMMER OF 35 YEARS PAST DIES

LONDON, Jan. 6.—Sir Montague Shearns, who swam the Niagara river below the falls when he was 24 years old, died here today, aged 62. He had been in ill health for some time.

He figured prominently in Oxford university athletic life in his time.

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Jan. 6.—Adverse luck, running hand in hand with Alaskan storms, today continued to mock the efforts of northern aviators to stage an aerial hunt for their lost comrades, Carl Ben Eielson and Earl Borland, who have been missing for nearly two months.

Three powerful cabin planes, rushed here from Seattle and put at the disposal of Arctic-hardened Canadian pilots, were down, one wrecked, one apparently lost, and the other weather bound at Nulato, half-way point between here and Nome.

Two open cockpit planes operated by Pilots Joe Crosson and Harold Gillingham, American fliers, who managed to reach North Cape, Siberia, from Nome recently, also were held down because the weather of northeastern Siberia made flying impossible.

Eielson and Borland disappeared last November 9 while flying from Teller to the fur trading ship Nanuk. The Nanuk is frozen in the ice near North Cape and now serves as the Siberian base for rescue operations.

With one of the cabin planes already smashed up as the result of an attempted takeoff from Nome several days ago, the two others left here Saturday but also failed to reach Nome.

Arriving over the mouth of the Koryuk river, at the head of Norton bay, the two planes ran into a blinding blizzard and became separated. The one piloted by Matt Nieminen and carrying Major H. C. Dechant and Mechanic Sam Cacanley retraced its course back over the treacherous Tundra to Nulato and landed. The other, pi-

loted by Pat Reid and carrying Mechanic William Hughes and Jim Hutchinson, failed to show up either at Nome or Nulato.

Although Reid's plane was believed to be down in the wild stretch of country between Nulato and Nome, no great apprehension was felt for the three men aboard, assuming that they had landed without mishap. The plane was well provisioned and the men equipped with heavy clothing.

Frank Dorbandt, Eielson's flying companion, who a few days ago was withdrawn from the rescue work and ordered to take a rest, took off from Nome yesterday and flew 200 miles inland, hoping to sight Reid's plane. Late last night, from Solomon, 26 miles from here, where he was forced down, Dorbandt reported he had not sighted the overdue plane.

Nieminen made ready at Nulato to go in search of Reid at the first opportunity.

VON PORAT MEETS UZZUDUN; FIELDS ON TWO PROGRAMS

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—Otto von Porat's ten-round encounter with Paulino Uzcudun, Basque heavyweight, at Madison Square Garden Friday night leads the national boxing schedule for this week.

Jackie Fields, welterweight champion, meets Alf Ros, of Spain, in a ten-rounder at the Philadelphia arena tonight and encounters Tony Vaccarelli of New York at the Chicago stadium on Friday. His title will not be at stake in either bout.

Other bouts on the national schedule include: At Portland, Ore., Tuesday: Young Firpo, Burke, Idaho, vs. Ray Pelky, Oakland, light heavyweights, ten rounds; Mickey Dolan, Portland, vs. Don Dority, St. Paul, lightweights, ten rounds.

She is the youngest student registered at the university. She was graduated from the Eugene high school when she was 14.

ST. HELENS.—Worry over the disappearance of his father, E. G. Scarberg, who was lost in the Lewis river district of Clark county, Wash., December 3, was compounded by a contributory cause to the death of Eric Scarberg, 21, eldest son of the family Saturday. The father and R. H. Delin, another St. Helens business man, have never been found.
