J., Jan. 6.—Edward Patrick Walker, best known as Mickey Walker, the boxer, was accused of being drunk, cruel and abusive in a suit for divorce filed in municipal court today by Margaret Kelly Water. Mrs. Walker asked for an absolute divorce, alimony and custody of Michael Walker, 5, and an expected child. Her papers alleged Walker earned \$300,000 a year ago. Among the allegations were that the boxer drank from an ice box in drunk tank, and that he threw the dinner tray in the chauffeur and then fell in to the dog.
