ALLEGED MURDERER COMMITS SUICIDE

(Associated Press Leased Wire) INDEPENDENCE, Mo., Jan. 7.—The body of George Hostetter, former trapper and prospector, and alleged slayer of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Weddle, farmers, was found today in a barn 12 miles northeast of here. Hostetter was alleged to have killed Mr. and Mrs. Weddle with a shotgun the night of November 2, because they opposed his intended marriage to Mrs. May June Hunter, 42, a cousin of Mrs. Weddle. A bullet wound near the man's heart indicated he had taken his own life. Dr. C. E.
