

PROPOSED WATER BOND ISSUE FOR GLENDALE \$16,000

At a meeting of the city council of Glendale last night, an ordinance was adopted calling a special election for Monday, February 10, for the purpose of voting on a bond issue in the sum of \$16,000 for the purpose of providing an improved water system for the municipality. The council originally proposed that the bond issue should be in the sum of \$16,000, but opinion expressed at the meeting was that such an amount should be provided to allow an additional supply of water; hence an increase was made in the amount.

A large group of representative citizens present at the meeting were unanimous in their expressions to the council that the bond issue should be made at least \$16,000 to take care of the probable needs of the project.

The Glendale water system is more than 20 years old, and the pipes are nearly gone. The water supply from Sexton creek is not sufficient to supply the needs of the city, so that in addition to replacing and extending the mains it is proposed either to further develop the source of supply at Sexton creek or to develop a new and additional supply from Fall creek. The existing system will be replaced by new and larger mains, and the pipes will be extended into sections of the city not now supplied. Ample provision will also be made for more adequate fire protection.

Attorney A. N. Orenti of Roseburg was consulted by the council in preparing for the bond issue and drew up the ordinance which was adopted at last night's meeting.

Italy's Greeting

ROME, Jan. 7.—Four thousand provincial Italians dressed in their native garb paraded this afternoon in front of the woman who some day will be their queen, Marie Jose, princess of Belgium, and Prince Humbert, whom she tomorrow will marry watched delightedly from a balcony of the Quirinal palace.

Grouped around them were their parents, the kings and queens of Italy and Belgium, the king of Bulgaria, and princes of the blood of various countries. It was an imposing spectacle before an imposing array of royalty as post-war Europe has seen. The Duke of York represented Great Britain.

The natives were accompanied by carts and wagons containing the produce of their region and objects of manufacture ranging from vegetables to a five ton chunk of Carara marble. The wagons were drawn by the peasants, native beasts of burden, oxen, camels, donkeys and the like.

Particularly large were the delegations from Tripoli, Tunis, Syria and the provinces and cities annexed after the war. This gave the parade a political flavor, as being perhaps an instrument toward welding of the newly acquired

territory.

Robberies and holdups were reported in various parts of Chicago at the rate of three every hour between 5 p. m. and midnight last night. Two burglars were shot and captured in two separate forays of the police to check the outbreak of crime which they have predicted would result from the reduction of the police man-power, necessitated by the reduced appropriation for salaries.

Slightly more than two and seven-tenths inches of snow lay on the ground at Klamath Falls after two days of constant storming. A large rotary plow was clearing the highway today through the Siskiyou.

Autoists Set Record

For the first time in history of Klamath county, an automobile was able to reach the Lake of the Woods, nestled at the foot of Mt.

McLaughlin, in January when Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Rogers, residents here, made the 45 mile trip through a snowstorm Sunday in two and one-half hours.

A light car jumped the curb at Klamath Falls and dropped over a six-foot bank after skidding on a hill. The machine landed right side up on four wheels undamaged.

The coldest weather of the winter hit the Rogue river, according to Medford reports, and the mercury slipped down to 15 degrees above after two days of intermittent snow.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 7.—Freezing temperatures in the far west followed today in the wake of the general storm which swept down out of the north in a fury of rain, hail and snow yesterday to give even California a taste of real winter weather.

That the storm would pass today, except in southern California, was the prediction of the weather bureau here which forecast abnormally low temperatures for the region west of the Mississippi river. Snow in Nevada and the Sierra with fair weather in the remainder of the far western states was predicted.

At midnight a general drop in temperatures was reported beginning in eastern Washington, northern Idaho and western Montana and extending through Oregon into southern California.

Northwest Shivers

In Helena, Mont., the temperature dropped 54 degrees to 16 below zero in 48 hours. Snow was reported heavy in Yellowstone park where the mercury hovered between zero and four degrees above.

The lowest temperature in Washington was registered at Republic where it was 44 degrees below zero. Spokane shivered under a fresh wind laden with dust-like snow.

Seattle was colder than Nome, Alaska, where four degrees above freezing temperature prevailed. Minimum temperature in Seattle was 25 and maximum of 29 degrees.

Wires Out 10 Hours

Heavy snows kept crews working to clear north and southbound highways in southern Oregon where heavy damage was suffered in the vicinity of Grants Pass. Wires were out for 10 hours before communication was reestablished. Many trees fell and in one instance, slightly injured a Josephine county farmer. Portland reported a sub-freezing temperature while Enterprise, in the northwest part of the state, recorded four degrees below zero.

Extreme cold and snow in places where it is seldom seen were features of the storm in California. Redding, in Siskiyou county, reported the heaviest snowfall in five years. Kennett had five inches. Yreka and Weed two inches. The Siskiyou divide reported 18 inches with more falling steadily. Highways in that region were kept clear with snowplows.

Sleet and snow, accompanied by a high wind, put telephone and telegraph wires out of commission in northern California. Eureka was isolated from outside communication lines when a tree fell across wires between South Fork and Fort Seward. Repairs were being rushed and communication was expected to be reestablished today.

In the Truckee region snow was from 10 to 40 inches deep. Yosemite had five inches of snow with more falling.

Farther south, Mt. Tamalpais, Mt. Diablo, Old Baldy in the San Bernardino range and other highlands were white-capped.

Hail Lashes Frisco

Where it was not snowing, the storm drenched the rest of the state. San Francisco underwent a heavy hail storm.

In Marin county three inches fell bringing the seasonal rainfall to 8.89 inches.

The Susanville district was without electric service for some time when a rain and snow storm unroofed barns, toppled over granaries and sent trees crashing over highways and telephone and power wires.

Modesto received more than two inches of rain and the Sierra foothills were snow covered.

Glendale Has Trouble

(News-Review Douglas County Special)

GLENDALE, Jan. 7.—The worst snow storm since 1922 hit Glendale Saturday and Sunday nights. Sunday morning there were six inches of snow and by Monday morning there were 18 inches. Local indications Monday evening were for more snow unless the weather turned colder.

The lines of the California Oregon Power company, serving this city with light and power, went down Saturday evening between this city and Grants Pass, and Glendale has been without lights and power since. The company had expected to have the lines in working order Sunday evening but continued snowfall was causing trouble faster than it could be located and repaired. Most of the trouble is being experienced near and on Sexton mountain where the snow is from 20 to 30 inches deep. The power company has every available lineman from Glendale to Medford making emergency repairs and removing fallen trees from the lines. Representatives of the company are making every effort to restore the service and expect to have the lines in working order sometime Tuesday unless more snow falls in the meantime.

Other Difficulties

The Southern Pacific train is operating about on time and the railroad company has had but little trouble with its telegraph lines south of here and through the canyon, although they were out for a short time Sunday, but linemen were able to repair them with very little delay.

The long distance and local telephone lines are in a somewhat crippled condition as the result of the storm but there was hope of having long distance service resumed late Monday.

The Glendale schools opened Monday after a two-days vacation, with about 25 per cent of normal attendance. The school buses

gripped in the teeth of the most severe cold weather in many years.

The temperature here stood at 5 degrees below zero at 6 o'clock tonight. Many destitute persons have been found frozen to death.
