PETE GIVES WEIGHT
IN NON-TITLE BOUT
WITH BARACKMAN
Merwin Barackman and his wrestling bear "Billy" worked out at the Roseburg gymnasium last night before a large audience of local sport fans. Barackman, who holds the light heavyweight championship of Washington, does a great deal of his training by wrestling with his 250-pound bear, thereby gaining much experience and ability in handling weight. The bear is well trained in wrestling tactics and makes an excellent training partner. He gets much enjoyment out of wrestling and enters into a match with real zest. Clyde Ward, local promoter, announced today that the junior middleweight championship belt held by Wildcat Pete will not be at stake in the match Friday, as Barackman will not be able to make the weight. The wrestlers are meeting on a catch-weight basis, so that the title will not be involved. Both of the wrestlers are rough in their tactics, and a wild match is assured. In addition to the main event, which is to be for the best two out of three falls, with a two hour time limit, there will be an exhibition by the wrestling bear against three successive opponents, and a fifteen minute preliminary between Glenn Myers of Roseburg and Roy Jacobs of Corvallis.
