

HOOVER'S NAME IN INQUIRY OF LOBBY ON SUGAR TARIFF

(Associated Press United Wire)

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—A letter read today before the senate lobby committee said W. C. D'Arcy, lobbyist, has a personal method of approach to Hoover and is going to present to Hoover a full but concise data on the sugar subject.

The reference was contained in a letter written by H. H. Pike, Jr., Wall street sugar broker, to P. A. Staples, of Cuba, who is connected with the Central American company.

Pike, who was on the witness stand, testified his information was received "from some one," but he said he had forgotten who it was.

Senator Robinson of Indiana, the only regular member of the committee, asserted that the letter indicated D'Arcy has "some back stairs way of getting to" the president.

When Pike said he did not know who gave him the information Robinson shouted:

"Then you ought to have kept quiet; this is the purest kind of lobbying."

"I can tell everything now that I know then," Pike replied.

Robinson asserted that the reference was unfair to the president but Pike said he understood all that was meant was that D'Arcy either knew Mr. Hoover or could reach him through a friend.

Pike had previously testified that he was directing a fight against a higher duty on sugar for the Hershey company and the Coca Cola company. He said the companies had arranged to spend as much as \$25,000 each in their effort to have a higher duty on being placed on sugar.

family for the occasion. At the altar rail waiting for her stood the crown prince, resplendent in the full dress of a colonel of infantry, and wearing the collar of the Annunziata, Italy's highest decoration, about his neck.

Dark of high stature, handsome, and with a pleasing smile, he presented a colorful figure in his gray uniform relieved by silver epaulettes with their long fringes, the plaques and medals, and the blue sash which caught the eye under the sword at his left.

The bride wore a cream white velvet gown of ankle length with a mantle of the same material, seven yards long, and embroidered with ermine. The queen of Italy wore cloth of gold with pearls and a golden mantle five yards long. Princesses Yolanda, Matilda and Maria wore royal mantles of the House of Savoy blue, bordered in gold.

Cardinal Maffei, smiling benevolently, approached the royal couple, and they went forward to the altar. The ceremony was before the altar. His cassock of red was surmounted by a rucchetto of red old lace, and on his head was the cardinal's red beretta. His episcopal ring, studded with a brilliant amethyst, glittered on his finger.

Only One Ceremony

The road first the terms of the Italian code governing marriages, since by virtue of the constitution of the Lateran treaties of last February 11 the priest officiating at a wedding assumes the functions of a civil officer of the Italian state. Had the couple been married before the signing of the Lateran treaties they would have had to go through two ceremonies, one civil, the other religious.

Witnesses for the bride were her brothers, the Duke of Brabant and the Count of Flanders, and for the bridegroom the Duke of Aosta and the Count of Turin. They held the veil over the heads of the two until they responded with "Si," and then they let it fall.

Before answering the cardinal's questions each turned toward parents for consent, which was given with a nod of the head.

Cardinal Maffei then blessed the rings of the two and they exchanged them. The choir sang "Gloria Pro Principibus Nostri—Let Us Pray for Our Prince." The cardinal pronounced them man and wife and the mass went on unattended with other bits of music. At its conclusion the cardinal read them the terms of the pope's letter of special benediction to the young people.

Multitude Cheers

Then arm-and-arm they marched down the central aisle of the chapel, bowing and smiling to the right and left, the future king and queen of Italy. They went through the palace to the balcony where they were accorded a tremendous ovation by the crowd gathered below. They were cheered to the echo by the multitude, which included fascist organizations drawn up in military formation.

The ceremony over, the bride and groom went directly to the Vatican for a private audience with Pope Pius XI.

Pope Pius smiled benignantly when they were ushered into his presence. He dismissed their excuses for their tardiness with a

The trip from Portland to Oakland has been made in shorter time, as the planes had a tail wind to help them along, but the new record for northbound flying was made against the wind.

WILD FOWL LIMIT CUT

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 8.—The biological survey announced today that because of the excessive dry spells during 1929 which made an alarming reduction in migratory birds, the bag limit included in federal regulations had been changed. Effective during the hunting season of 1930, the limit on ducks will be cut from 25 to 15 and on geese from 8 to 4 a day. A possession limit of 30 ducks and 8 geese is prescribed.

Smudge to Save Fruit

Orchardists used smudges in many parts of the state. Riverside growers had been warned of an impending low temperature of 25 degrees. At Ventura, where a five-minute snowstorm was reported yesterday, continued cold was expected. Clear and cold was the prediction at San Jose and generally throughout the interior valley. Rain fell in San Diego and foothills near the city were covered by snow.

Snowing in Portland

Continued clear and cold was the prediction in Oregon. Portland had a low temperature of 24 degrees during the last 24 hours. Sunshine flooding the city hall all day failed to drive the mercury above the 34 degree mark. Medford reported a low of 15, Pendleton 16, and Eugene 24. Airmail service suffered little.

Snow began falling in Portland early this morning.

Seattle, Wash., expected no more snow today but temperatures continued to hover below the freezing mark. Spokane and adjacent territory reported cold and snow all day yesterday. The mercury was one above zero at Wilbur. Heavy snows were falling higher up in eastern Washington and north Idaho and it was generally colder throughout western Montana.

Bright sunshine warmed Tacoma during the afternoon yesterday. The temperature at no time was above 40 degrees and reached a low of 23.

Citrus Crops Safe

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Jan. 8.—Frost whitened the ground in many parts of Los Angeles and southern California early today, but government agricultural services reported that citrus crops escaped damage. Resort to smudge pots was made in but a few dangerous spots, the wet ground of Sunday and Monday rains having provided a blanket of dampness.

Oregon Bureau Busy

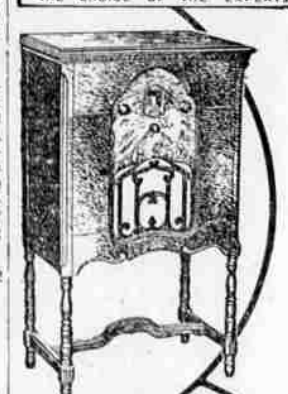
SALEM, Ore., Jan. 8.—Agents of the state prohibition department destroyed 3059 gallons of mash and 1193 gallons of liquor during the month of December, says a report filed with Governor Norblad by Prohibition Commissioner Alexander. The agents participated in 93 arrests. Fines totaling \$9560 and jail sentences totaling 2355 days were imposed. Ten stills and three automobiles were seized.
