COUNTERFEITING OUTFIT FOUND IN RAID IN SPOKANE

(Associated Press Special Wire) SPOKANE, Wash., Jan. 9.—With the seizure of moulds for counterfeiting half dollars and the arrest of Clyde Hilton, 33, police and federal investigators today believed they might be on the trail of a ring of spurious coin manufacturers.

Hilton, who had been under suspicion since last fall when a raid on a residence produced only manufacturing equipment and well copied 50-cent pieces, did not have any of the coins with him when taken. Hilton, police detectives said, lived a few doors from the house raided, and his subsequent activities directed suspicion to him.

BILL SUSPENDS DUES ON IRRIGATED TRACTS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—The Leavitt bill to suspend payment of all construction charges against lands in federal reclamation projects classified as temporarily unproductive until the property is adjudged productive, was approved today by the house reclamation committee.

The measure also would provide that during the period in which payments on construction charges are suspended any payments previously made on such areas would be credited to the construction charge on productive areas.
