

CITIZENSHIP IS DENIED PACIST OF YALE SCHOOL

(Associated Press Special Wire)
NEW HAVEN, Conn., Jan. 9.—The application of Professor Douglas Clyde Macintosh, native of Scotland, of the Yale divinity school, for United States citizenship, was formally denied in papers filed by Judge Warren H. Thurston with the clerk of the United States district court.

The denial was based on Prof. Macintosh's refusal to swear that he would bear arms in defense of the United States. The professor said at the time of the court hearing on the question of granting him naturalization papers that he felt constrained that refusal to bear arms was morally justifiable. He said his first allegiance is to God.

The court hearing was last June and formal decision on his application was delayed, after the nature of it had been indicated, that Prof. Macintosh's attorney might prepare for an appeal to the United States supreme court. As no action has been taken the court filed the decision today. In the World war he was a chaplain, and on the second trip overseas he was a Y. M. C. A. worker with the A. E. F.

shivering under sub-normal temperatures today.

Except in mountainous regions and in southern California, the prevalent cold wave was expected to continue without snow or rain for the next 24 hours. Zero and sub-freezing temperatures were predicted by the weather bureau for the northwest states and some parts of California, where yesterday rain turned to snow and disrupted highway and railroad travel.

Traffic Stalled
While danger in southern California citrus districts was averted by the rain and snow, the elements caused temporary discomfort elsewhere in the region. On the ridge route north of Los Angeles, fifty motorists were released by snow plows after being marooned near Sandberg.

The Union Pacific railroad had snow plows working soon after the snowfall became heavy and at midnight the crews were augmented as the tracks became covered. At Summit in Cajon pass 20 inches as reported.

Citrus Belt Aided
Fruit fell intermittently over southern California. Half an hour of rain, followed by lightning, descended on Los Angeles at dusk. Lowering temperatures in citrus groves were boosted well beyond the danger mark by the precipitation.

Other California districts reported abundant snow and rain. Everywhere in the high Sierra the snowfall was reported heavy with near zero temperatures prevailing. From Modesto came reports of measurable snow in Stanislaus county for the first time in fourteen years. Summit had nearly five feet on the ground and Strawberry more than two feet.

Further north leading, Yreka and Chico received varying quantities of snow with Oroville receiving the first real fall in 17 years. Points in the Sacramento valley and in the upper San Joaquin valley also were whitened by the fall.

Northwest Conditions
Throughout the northwest, the weather continued cold and clear with ice-coated highways making travel hazardous.

Oregon was covered with a blanket of snow, hiding in depth from one half inch in the Willamette valley to four and five feet in the highlands. Temperatures ranged from sub-zero in eastern sections.

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OIL TANKER GOES DOWN AFTER CRASH WITH RIVER HULK

MARCUS HOOK, Penn., Jan. 9.—The oil tanker Sunbeam, operated by the Sun Oil company, sank yesterday at the company's Delaware river harbor here after having her forehatch damaged several hours earlier when she struck

a submerged wreck in the river off Wilmington, Del.

None of the crew was injured and all left the tanker before she went down. She was not completely submerged as the water at the pier is comparatively shallow.

Captain H. D. Hedlund said the Sunbeam, from San Pedro, Calif., to Marcus Hook freed herself from the submerged wreck off Wilmington after maneuvering for some time and proceeded to Marcus Hook with pumps working. After making port, however, the pumps were unable to keep ahead of the incoming water.

The Sunbeam struck the submerged United States government dredge Manhattan which was sunk about two months ago in a collision with the tanker Bessemer. The Sunbeam had a cargo of 90,000 gallons of gasoline, most of which was lost.

FIFTEEN SCHOOLS ENTERED IN COUNTY HOOPSTER LEAGUE

PRESIDENT HOOVER NAMES TWO ENVOYS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—G. H. Baker, Stockton, of Florida, today was nominated by President Hoover to be minister to Australia.

Stockton served under President Hoover in the American relief administration in 1919 and 1920 and has been in the real estate business in Jacksonville. He was director of finance of the Florida democratic committee in 1924.

He will succeed Albert Henry Washburn, of Boston, who has been minister to Austria since 1922.

Abraham C. Rathesky, a Boston banker, named minister to Czechoslovakia, will succeed Lewis Elmslein. He is 65 years old, a former member of the Massachusetts senate and founder of the A. C. Rathesky charity foundation.
