

LAGUARDIA THINKS AMERICA RIPE FOR DRY LAW CHANGE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—An effort to organize the wet bloc of the house, on the premise that prohibition is a failure and modification imperative, was yesterday's contribution to the controversy which has raged in Washington since the Christmas holidays began.

A meeting of house members not in sympathy with the prohibition law was called for, marking one of the first coherent moves by congressional wets to present a united front in their attempts to repeal the Volstead law.

"This country," said Representative Laguardia, republican, New York, one of the wet leaders, "has gone through the same thing that Canada and other countries which had prohibition have gone through. Canada and the other countries have changed their laws and now only this country and Finland remain."

"Conditions speak for themselves," he continued, and the wets are "taking conditions as we find them and putting them into the record."

"The dries are defeated. Prohibition has reached its peak. Our problem is to deal with the subject and put it to the vote—the one solution is putting the alcoholic liquor traffic under proper regulation. The states that want it should have it."

"Dry champions are now in dispute among themselves as to the facts and the country is alive to the fact that prohibition has one last lease on life; transfer of administration from the treasury to the department of justice. If enforcement of prohibition fails there, that is the end of it."

15 CARLOADS OF TURKEYS GOING TO MARKET THIS WEEK

Fifteen carloads of turkeys are expected to be moved out of the Umpqua valley this week. Two carloads are being packed out of Roseburg today by independent dealers, and the association is loading at Yoncalla, where two or three more carloads are anticipated. The association will load at Oakland and at Roseburg Monday and Tuesday.

BAD WEATHER POSTPONES LAW OFFICERS' MEETING

The meeting of the Southern Oregon Law Enforcement Officers' association, scheduled to be held at Klamath Falls Saturday, has been postponed, according to information received here this morning. The executive committee made a largely of Medford officers notified Guy Gordon, Douglas county district attorney and president of the association, that the directors believed it best to postpone the meeting due to storm conditions prevailing in southern Oregon, and he was asked to give official notice of the postponement. The meeting will be held at a later date, which has not yet been fixed, and the full program, as arranged for this meeting, will be given at that time, Mr. Gordon stated.

Announcement was made today that the Imperial Cleaners have taken the local agency for the Washington Velvet Rug company of Seattle. Representatives of the company have been introducing their product in this city for the past few days, and have arranged with the local cleaning and pressing establishment to represent them in this city, as considerable business is anticipated in this section and it is proposed to have an agency where all affairs can be transacted. The rugs are made from old material sent in by the customer utilizing old rugs, carpets and wool clothing. Similar branches are being established in all of the northwestern states.

WHY WOMEN BUY

A survey was recently conducted among a large group of women shoppers asking them very definite questions as to the effect that retail store advertising had upon them. The investigator found out that—

- 82% came in response to the previous two days' advertisements.
- 14% were just shopping without having advertised values in mind.
- 27% came in because of the copy in the morning paper.
- 56% were attracted by the advertisement of the previous afternoon.
- 37% were accompanied by female friends.
- 11% made engagements to meet friends at the store.
- 79% said they read the store's advertisements every day.
- 11% read the advertisements very frequently.
- 10% read them only now and then.

These figures indicate that women as a whole follow a store's advertising very carefully and that they realize that business conditions change from day to day just as the news of the world changes and that goods which were offered in advertisements last week will not be sold at the same prices today or may not even be on hand at a store tomorrow. 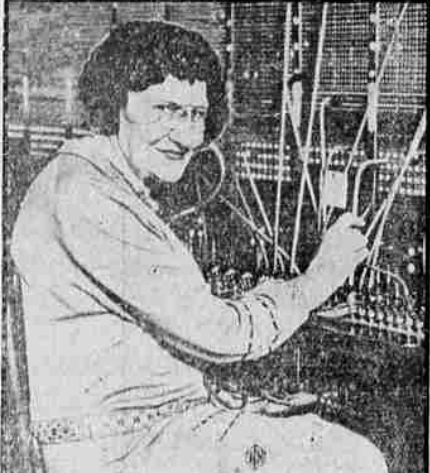
BOMB IN CHRISTMAS GIFT KILLS BRIDE

(Associated Press Local Wire) WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—Reed Smoot, of Utah, dean of republicans in the senate and indefatigable worker, celebrated his 68th birthday with these words:

"I am drawing dividends on the life I have lived since my boyhood. I've never, never drank liquor in my life. I've never smoked. I've always eaten good, plain food and led work. I never was lazy and never saw a time when I didn't have plenty to do."

"I've wronged nobody. I was fortunate in marrying as perfect a young woman as ever lived. My children have had a marvelous mother, a superb homemaker. Of all the blessings received by me she was the greatest."

Senator Smoot added the last with a touch of feeling. His wife, who was Alpha May Fredredge, died November 7, 1928.

ORDERS ON FORD CONCERN SHOW HEALTHY CONDITION

WADE H. DAVIS ON S. P. PENSION AFTER 25 YEARS' SERVICE

Wade H. Davis is one of the Roseburg railroad people who receive prominent mention in the current issue of the Southern Pacific Bulletin, according to J. E. Clark, local agent for the company.

Davis, who is a locomotive engineer, is retired on pension after 25 years of service with the railroad. All of his service was spent on the company's lines in central Oregon. He started as a section laborer at Harrisburg. Later he was a timekeeper, fireman on pile driver and locomotive fireman. Since August, 1915, he had been an engineer operating out of Roseburg.

Engineer O. O. Jennings and Fireman M. S. Westcott are among the twenty men who made the best records of any Oregonians during the past month in saving fuel while operating their locomotives. Fuel saving is one of the most important activities carried on among railroad employees and there is keen competition for the rewards made monthly and annually. The two local men won distinction to competition with the other 276 engineers and 215 firemen on this division of the railroad.

RECORD SALE OF U. S. TIMBER MEANS MILLS IN ALASKA

(Associated Press Local Wire) PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 10.—B. F. Heinzelman, assistant district forester for Alaska, enroute to San Francisco, today outlined plans for the sale of 19 billion board feet of spruce and hemlock timber in Alaska to the Zellbach corporation and the San Francisco Examiner and Los Angeles Times.

The deal, which the district forester said was the largest in the history of the government forestry service, includes the establishment of newspaper mills and the cutting of timber on a 50-year program under the reforestation system.
