

PETE VICTOR OVER BARACKMAN WITH AIRPLANE SPIN

An airplane spin applied by Wildcat Pete of Eugene upon Myrtle Barackman of Olympia, Wash., at the Roseburg armory last night ended as wild a mat battle as local fans ever witnessed. It was the only fall of the match and came after 14 minutes. The struggle was scheduled for two out of three falls with a two-hour time limit, but Barackman was too badly punished to return to the mat. Referee Cal Herman thereupon performed the formality of declaring Pete the winner. It was afterwards learned that Barackman's left shoulder was badly bruised and that ligaments were torn.

The struggle fulfilled all expectations of a bare-knuckle character, gouging, slugging, elbowing and foot-kicking were plentiful enough to satisfy the most primitive spirit of the spectators. Several times the fierceness of the grappling carried the principals through or over the ropes. Twice Referee Herman had difficulty getting the men to break, and on another occasion he took a header trying to halt an outburst of punching.

After various holds had failed to bring victory, the grapplers started a duel of headlocks that eventually hurled them through the ropes. Brought back inside the ring, Barackman paused to give a hitch to his trunk and that act was his undoing. Pete, with a movement consistent with his fighting moniker, grabbed Barackman in the mid-section, hoisted him over his head, swung him around at least a dozen times and then crashed him to the mat with terrific force. It was all over. Barackman was out for a minute or more. When he tried to leave the ring he was so dizzy he couldn't stand and had to be helped to the dressing room.

This was the third meeting of the men within the past half year. Each of the previous bouts lasted three falls. Pete won the first match, at Eugene, and Barackman took the second, at Albany.

Weights were not announced last night, but the referee of course did not neglect in his introductory remarks to include titles claimed by the combatants. Pete was heralded as junior middleweight champion of the world and Barackman was labeled light heavyweight champion of Washington.

Each weighed apparently around 155 pounds.

It was announced that a boxing card would be held on Friday, January 17.

In the preliminary wrestling last night Bob Jacobson of Corvallis easily defeated Glenn Myers of Roseburg, taking two straight falls in nine minutes.

Barackman's trained bear "Billy" did his wrestling stunt against three local lads and furnished plenty of amusement for the on-lookers, about 200 in number.

The speaker called attention to the annual report of the chamber of commerce, speaking with regard to some of the activities of the past year.

One of the most outstanding pieces of work, he declared, was the assistance given the pear growers in marketing their crop.

"It is the duty of a town," Mr. Jenkins declared, "to sell the produce of the surrounding community. If the merchants of Roseburg or any other town attempt to do nothing but sell their own goods, they will soon go broke. If a merchant wants to sell his goods to the people of the city and the neighboring community, he must first see that the people have money with which to buy. Too often we get the idea that a town exists only to sell its own goods, but that idea is wrong. A city can exist only by service. The

Good Book says that it is more blessed to give than to receive, but I maintain that we must give if we are going to receive. If Roseburg is going to survive it must provide a market for the goods from the surrounding communities."

Tourist Revenue Lost

Active support for the Diamond Lake road was urged by the speaker.

"Tourists in Oregon left 25 million dollars in this state last year," Mr. Jenkins said. "Survey made by the state highway commission show that the bulk of the tourist travel is from California. Sixty per cent of the traffic from California goes north of Roseburg. What does that mean? It means that there is a stream of gold flowing past our door. You have all seen the Umpqua river in the winter time, muddy and yellow with silt. As long as the stream is flowing it carries its silt with it, but when its progress is checked it deposits its silt. The same thing is true of the stream of tourists. As long as it runs fast it drops none of its wealth, but when its progress is slow it leaves its deposit of gold. If you can secure the completion of the Diamond Lake road it will check the progress of that gold-laden stream. All along the coast tourists in planning their trips will arrange to go to Crater and Diamond lakes. Crater Lake is awe inspiring, but it does not induce a desire to remain, but Diamond Lake, nestled between the towering snow-capped Mt. Thielsen and Mt. Bailey, causes a person to want to remain as long as possible.

"The tourist trade in California last year amounted to more than 100 million dollars—more than all the other states combined. The tourist trade in Oregon was valued at 25 million, yet Oregon has far more attraction for tourists than has California. Why is this? May be these figures will give some idea about the cause of this wide difference.

Promotion Fund Low

"California last year spent 50 cents per capita in advertising. Twenty-five cents was raised by direct taxation, and the remainder was secured by subscription. Last year Oregon by a great effort prevailed upon the legislature for an appropriation of \$5,000 for state advertising, or the great sum of 23 cents per capita. To this was added 5 cents per capita making a total of 28 cents per person as compared with 50 cents per person spent in California for advertising the state to tourists. Yet we crab because California secures the bulk of the immigration. The time will come when Oregon will raise 50 cents per capita for advertising and a like sum by subscription.

"A few years ago I made the statement that Oregon would be developed by California capital, and I was laughed at for making that declaration. Yet today our records show that one-half of the new settlers in Oregon are coming from California. They are selling their high-priced land in that state and are coming to Oregon to buy cheap land, where they can continue to grow products with which they are more or less familiar. As 50 per cent of the traffic from California does not get north of Roseburg, southern Oregon is the first, to benefit. We are going to see new settlers coming from the south in greatly increasing numbers during the next few years.

Mr. Jenkins highly praised the effort of the chamber of commerce to standardize products and market all crops under the Indian head label. "There is no limit to the markets that may be reached if dependable quality is maintained."

Why Oregon Lags

Oregon, the speaker said, has everything that either Washington or California has to offer. California and Washington, it is true, he stated, owe much to their early advancement to gold, and California has benefited from oil production, but in all other respects Oregon can equal anything these states have. Yet Oregon, it must be admitted, is lagging behind these neighboring states in development.

He presented some startling figures and facts to clinch this argument. Last year, he said, California shipped 1,680 carloads of eggs after feeding her own population, and Washington shipped 1,662 carloads after supplying the local demand. Oregon with a far smaller population than either of these states to supply, shipped only 371 carloads of eggs. Yet Oregon was the first state to set a record for a 300-egg hen and the first state to have a 300-egg flock. Egg production in Oregon in proportion is far higher than in either Washington or California, yet Oregon is lagging far behind both of the neighboring states in volume. Market and transportation conditions are identical yet these two states each have five carloads of eggs for every one in Oregon.

Oregon, he stated, is the outstanding Jersey state of the union. It holds 75 per cent of all records for production from Jersey cows, yet Oregon is insignificant as a dairy state.

Mental State Blamed

"Why," the speaker asked, "has not Oregon grown as rapidly as California or Washington? There is only one answer," he declared, "and that is a state of mind."

"We have a habit in this state of saying a thing cannot be done, convincing ourselves of that fact and sitting idly by while the adjoining states go ahead and do it."

What Has Been Done

"Douglas county's courthouse is a building of which you are all proud. It is one of the finest courthouses in the state. Ten years ago E. J. Adams said that the government ought to pay taxes on the O. and C. timber. He was laughed to scorn. Everyone said it couldn't be done. Nothing was done until a few years ago a movement was started and it was found out that it could be done, and now you have a beautiful new courthouse as a result, and all over the state we have better roads and improved conditions."

"A few years ago H. H. Corey

was looking over the old Harriman railroad map which assigned to Oregon a railroad system equal to Washington and California. He said that Oregon should have that system. Immediately there went up the guffaws of the crowd, and again came that chorus 'It can't be done.' But he insisted it could be done and only a few days ago the interstate highway commission ordered the Union Pacific to build an east and west railroad through Oregon. Again somebody wouldn't believe that it couldn't be done.

"We are told that Oregon can match Washington and California in development, and immediately we hear that chorus, 'How, how, how, it can't be done.' Whenever we hear that chorus we ought to grab a club and get busy."

"The first step in Oregon's development must be a change of mind and of spirit. We must realize that the thing that can't be done is the thing we are going to do."

Wide advertising of Oregon was stressed by the speaker as one of the first requisites to overcome the great ignorance regarding the state. He urged the creation of a state department of agriculture to be backed with rigid grading laws, to provide uniform and dependable quality of all produce. Then he urged leadership and a willingness on the part of the people of the state to follow such leaders.

He concluded with the statement that each community must keep in mind the development of the entire state, as permanent progress can be made only by keeping pace with the development of Oregon as a whole.

ductive to the careful, patient, scientific research which the country has a right to expect and demand of that tribunal. That a deliberate effort is being made to hamstring the commission and discredit its work is the only fair conclusion to be drawn from the untimely, bitter attacks now being made upon it in advance of its report."

The law enforcement commission's statement went into great detail in describing its activities and its organization work, declaring that the purpose had been to conduct a "searching examination of criminal law enforcement, including prohibition."

Reform Plan Sought

The organization of its work, the statement said, "naturally falls into the conduct of police, prosecution, courts and judicial procedure, the management of penal institutions and the causes of crime; the object of all of which is to determine the positive measures of reform which will secure more prompt and effective justice." It explained that eleven committees had been appointed to deal with various subjects.

Necessity of a study of police organization was emphasized, and the statement declared that the commission's efforts in that direction were being continued. Under separate headings the commission repeated what it had been doing in the way of research work in the field of prosecutions, the courts, penal institutions, causes of crime, criminal justice as it affected the foreign born, the cost of crime, abuses in enforcement, and statistics.

Continued cold weather with possibility of light local snows is forecast by the weather bureau for tonight and Sunday in Roseburg and vicinity. The thermometer, early this morning, dropped to 19 degrees, the lowest since last February when 16 degrees was reported on the 7th and the 8th. The lowest temperature last January was the same as this morning, 19 degrees, reported on the 26th.

So far the cold weather has caused but little damage to broccoli, but it is feared that continuing, particularly if the temperature goes lower, will cause considerable loss.

Next Week Forecast

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 11.—The weather outlook for the week beginning January 12 was announced here today by the United States weather bureau as follows:

Far western states: Changeable weather is probably with occasional periods of precipitation and with temperatures generally below normal.

Whole Coast Shivers

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 11.—From Canada to the Mexican border, the Pacific coast shivered today as temperatures continued to hover around the freezing mark, with no indication of immediate relief from the unseasonal cold.

Despite intermittent showers in California, principally in the southern part of the state, expected rises in temperatures were not forthcoming as the raindrops turned to snow at high altitudes, intensifying the cold.

Similar conditions that prevailed throughout the far west yesterday were promised by the weather bureau here for today. Basing its prediction of disturbances over southern Nevada and west of San Francisco, the bureau forecast for a continuation of the cold wave: "Rain in California, snows in the mountains and furies of snow in regions where it is seldom seen."

In the northwest, generally clear skies and cold weather prevailed at midnight. Temperatures remained at their sub-normal mark.

Northwest Conditions

In northern Washington, some districts reported a temperature of ten degrees below zero. Six feet of snow blanketed the high-lying regions while the lowlands were still white with yesterday's fall.

At Tacoma the maximum temperature was 32 degrees and the minimum 21.7 above zero. The northern Idaho and eastern

Southern California, which received most of yesterday's precipitation, welcomed additional rain which served the double purpose of staying off threatening frosts in the citrus districts in addition to benefiting agriculturists.

The snow and rain took its toll, however, in disrupted communications and highway travel in the mountain regions of southern California.

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NOTICE OF SPECIAL CITY ELECTION

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Canyonville, Oregon, has called a special election of the legal voters of said City which will be held thereon on Tuesday, the 28th day of January, 1930.

Said special election is called pursuant to the provisions of Sections 115 and 114 of the City Charter of said City of Canyonville and Ordinance No. 60 of said City, passed by the Council and approved by the Mayor on the 8th day of January, 1929; that by said ordinance the Common Council of the City of Canyonville, Oregon, proposes to acquire and construct a gravity water system for the City of Canyonville from the waters of O'Shea Creek, about two miles from said City, for the purpose of supplying water for any and all purposes for which the same may be used to the City of Canyonville and the inhabitants thereof and to provide funds for the construction of said gravity water system the Common Council of said City shall be authorized and empowered to borrow on the faith and credit of the City of Canyonville the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars and to issue general bonds of said City therefor.

That the Common Council of the City of Canyonville shall provide by ordinance for the method of issuing and selling said bonds and shall fix the time for which the same are to run which shall not be more than twenty years, and the rate of interest thereon which shall not exceed six per cent per annum, payable semi-annually.

That said bonds shall not be issued, sold, signed nor delivered, neither shall any money be borrowed as provided by said Ordinance No. 60 until the proposition of incurring such indebtedness be submitted to the qualified voters of the City of Canyonville for their approval or rejection and unless said proposition be approved by the qualified voters at said election.

That if at said election a majority of the qualified voters shall be in favor of incurring said indebtedness and acquiring said constructing said water system, the Common Council shall proceed to incur said indebtedness by the issuance of bonds therefor and to expend the moneys received therefrom for the purposes hereinbefore set forth.

The following shall be the form in which said proposition shall be submitted upon the official ballots at said election, to-wit:

Shall the City of Canyonville acquire and construct a gravity water system from the waters of O'Shea Creek for the City of Canyonville and issue bonds of said City for the payment thereof in the sum of \$10,000.00?

Vote Yes or No.

The following, or their duly selected substitutes, shall constitute the Board of Election at said special election: Judges, Mrs. Frank Sullivan, Mrs. R. L. Cougler and Mrs. L. Burker; Clerks, Mrs. P. C. Schwartz and Mrs. Ira Poole.

That said election shall be held in the City Hall in the City of Canyonville, Oregon, between the hours of Nine o'clock A. M. and Seven o'clock P. M., on the 28th day of January, 1930, and let the manner and under similar rules as provided by the Charter of said City for the holding of special elections therein; provided that an adjournment of one hour at noon may be had as provided by the Charter of the City of Canyonville.

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
