POSTOFFICE SHOWS EXCELLENT GROWTH AT MYRTLE CREEK

MYRTLE CREEK, Jan. 11.—Business in the Myrtle Creek post office for 1929 showed a substantial gain over 1928. The gross receipts for 1928 were \$21,501.92 while 1929 went out with \$26,807.50 to its credit.

The receipts for the last quarter of 1929 were \$671.87 and the corresponding quarter of 1928 were \$543.99. The gain for the year was almost 25 per cent.

The Christmas mail was much heavier than it has ever been before, both incoming and outgoing, but owing to some new arrangements for handling the mail in the postoffice, it was not so hard as it was formerly.

PROHIBITION FOE OF CHRISTIANITY, LAWMAKER AVERS

Constitution Changed Into Criminal Statute Book; Drunkenness Gains, Schafer Says.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—The assertion that prohibition has "ushered in an age of corruption, intemperance, disrespect for law and contempt for government such as this nation never before witnessed" was made today in the house by Representative Schafer, republican, Wisconsin.

Making a charge that the "constitution has been changed from a charter of rights and liberties into a criminal statute book," the Wisconsin representative asked:

"How can people respect a constitution that makes the act of temperance a crime?"

Granted an hour by consent of the house, Schafer spoke on the subject of "Prohibition versus Christianity."

"You must choose between prohibition and the Christian religion," he said. "You cannot have both, for they are eternal opposites."

An unbridgeable gulf separates one from the other, with God and Christ standing on one side and the devil on the other."

Dry Senators Jabbed
Without mentioning names, Schafer said "The recent hysterical outburst of four horsemen of the prohibition forces indicates the demoralization in their ranks and that they have reached a realization of the failure of the sumptuary prohibition laws."

He suggested that the "four horsemen" turn their "oratorical guns and attention to the states of Georgia, Idaho, Texas and Nebraska, where a deplorable condition exists today as a result of prohibition."

Senator Harris lives in Georgia, Borah in Idaho, Sheppard in Texas, and Howell and Norris in Nebraska. All are dry leaders, and have taken a part in the recent dispute.

"In these states," Schafer said, "under federal prohibition, bootlegging, drunkenness and drunken vehicle drivers have increased tremendously; fundamental rights guaranteed to our people under the constitution flagrantly violated; lives snuffed out without due process of law by irresponsible and fanatical enforcement agents; the privacy of life and the sanctity of the home guaranteed under the constitution ruthlessly violated."

Bible Quoted
Schafer declared that Dr. Clarence True Wilson of the Methodist board of temperance and other dry leaders demand that the prohibition law be amended to make the buyer equally guilty and added they insisted upon widening the "already impassable gulf between themselves and their God on the drink question."

Quoting numerous passages from the Bible on the use of wine, Schafer said that to dry "who have more respect for Volstead than for divine authority, these texts mean no more than their religion means to God."

CLINIC ANNOUNCED FOR CHILDREN UP TO 6 YRS. OF AGE

An infant and pre-school clinic will be held next Wednesday, January 15, from nine to twelve o'clock. This clinic is for the purpose of giving children from birth to six years of age a thorough examination in order to discover any defects which may be present and advise as to the proper method of making corrections. Dr. R. R. Shoemaker, health officer, will make the examinations in the office of the health unit in the courthouse.



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fies of the health unit in the courthouse.

It is especially urged at this time that parents of children who will enter school this term bring the children to this clinic for examination, in order that they may be physically able to begin the school work well.

"Health examinations for children between the ages of two and six years are particularly important," Dr. Shoemaker states, "for it is during this time that the child passes through the most critical period. If rickets were present during babyhood the bones do not form naturally, causing irregularly shaped chests or other deformities. The teeth are especially affected at this age by diet. With the beginning of the formation of the sinuses infection in the nose or throat may develop into serious sinus trouble in later life. Habits formed at this age are especially important as one author has stated that the child's essential character is fully formed at five years of age."

The health unit in conducting these clinics endeavors to locate any defects that may be present. The child is at an age where corrections may be made much more easily than in later life. It has been found that children free from physical defects make far better grades in school on an average than those suffering from some ailment, so that the parents may give their children a more advantageous start in school by first attending to the matter of health.

The clinics will be held at regular intervals so that a check may be kept upon the condition of the child.

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According to John Gross, new president of the club, several projects are to be taken up by the organization during the coming year, particularly in the matter of bettering game and fish conditions on the South Umpqua. Short talks were made by L. L. Matthews of Roseburg and C. H. Hill of Days Creek along the line of fish conservation and other club activities.

This club is an ideal one for the purpose, lying on the south bank of the river with a beautiful view and ample parking space for cars. A fine rifle range is available near by. The lumber and other materials have been purchased and are on the ground. The construction committee, headed by H. A. Ritter plans to commence erection of the building immediately.

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
