GLLENDALE POWER LINE DOWN AGAIN

GLENDALE, Jan. 12.—Glendale was again plunged into darkness early Wednesday evening on account of line trouble but the power company was able to restore the service two hours later. After having been without electric lights or power for three days, because of line trouble occasioned by the big snowstorm the first of last week, some of the people who have been telling about the "good old days" did not exactly relish going partially back to them. Flickering candles, smelly coal oil lamps, instead of electric lights; no electric irons, washing machines, sweepers, and other every day conveniences; no radio, and no hot water and no cook-stoves in many homes. The so-called "good old days" may have been all right then but the present generation more than welcomed the resumption of light and power service.

FIRE ALARM CODE ADOPTED GLENDALE

GLENDALE, Jan. 12.—In order to save valuable time and expedite matters whenever it is necessary to give a fire alarm, the Glendale Telephone company, from whose office the fire siren is usually switched on and the alarm given, will use the following code in giving fire alarms after this:
 One long blast of the siren followed by one short will indicate the fire is in the first ward, the area south of the railroad tracks and east of Third street or the city hall.
 One long blast followed by two short blasts will indicate the fire is in the second ward, the area south of the railroad tracks and west of Third street.
 One long blast followed by three short blasts will indicate the fire is in the portion of the Third ward north of the railroad tracks.
 One long blast followed by four short blasts will indicate the fire is in the Clara addition.
 If the fire is considered very serious the alarm will be repeated.
 J. H. Smith, manager for the Glendale Telephone company, requests that persons who are not volunteer fire fighters will refrain from calling the telephone company as soon as the siren is heard to inquire about the fire as their doing so delays the operator in giving this information to the fire department. The switchboard is usually swamped whenever a fire alarm is sounded.

FARM EXCHANGE PAYS DIVIDEND, NAMES OFFICERS


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
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
