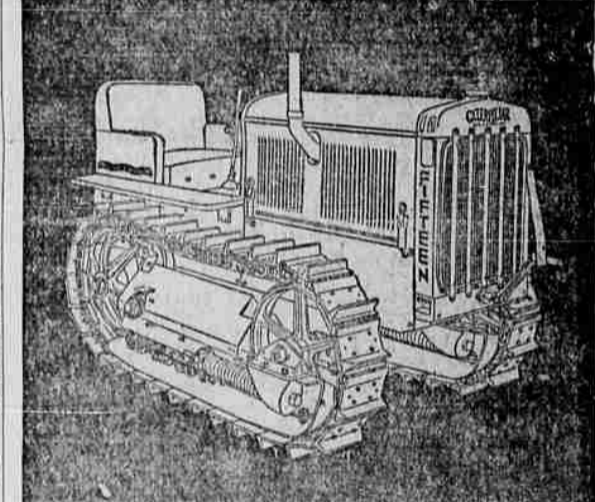
Concise Poster Stamps to Spread Gospel of Oregon

PORTLAND, Jan. 9.—(Special)—Keen interest and enthusiasm from every part of Oregon has been expressed about the first series of Oregon poster stamps being issued by the Oregon state chamber of commerce in its 1930 program of "Build Oregon!" W. G. Ide, manager of the organization, stated here today. Samples of the stamps are shown above.
"The first series of stamps cover only a few of the outstanding points about Oregon and we're now planning the issuance of additional series of poster stamps. It is our desire to produce the most effective series of poster stamps ever issued by any state and we believe we can gain this distinction if the people of Oregon will give us their ideas and suggestions for additional poster stamps," Ide said.
"Ideas and suggestions for Oregon poster stamps will be greatly appreciated and should be turned in to local chambers of commerce or sent to the information service department of the Oregon state chamber of commerce at Portland."
Each Oregon poster stamp, printed in four colors, tells tersely in some interesting fact about Oregon and the lines of copy on each stamp invite the reader to write the local chamber of commerce for further information. The complete series of stamps is planned to tell what Oregon has, offers, wants, how the state ranks and about its special points of interest.
The state chamber plans for 6,750,000 Oregon poster stamps to be placed on outgoing mail during 1930 through the cooperation of the state's 39,000 business and professional men. The stamps themselves advertise Oregon and the funds created from the sale of the stamps create the state chamber's budget to carry on its program of work.
