FEDERAL REPORT ON OREGON SCHOOLS PROMISED IN MAY

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 13.—A confidential report on the survey of Oregon's five state institutions of higher learning will be made to the board of higher education probably in October, according to Dr. Arthur J. Klein, representative of the federal bureau of education, who has arrived in the state to conduct the survey. Klein met with the board in Portland last Friday, when the agreement was drawn up, and will meet the executive committee next Saturday for signing the agreement.

The survey was provided for in the 1929 legislative act creating the board of higher education. During the spring Klein will give his time to collecting data pertaining to the institutions, and in May, according to the plans, a group of field workers will come to the state to complete the work. Some parts of the survey, Klein said, may require the services of technical experts.

No iron-clad plan for the future conduct of the institutions will be held down as a result of the survey, he said, but rather a long-time flexible program will be suggested. All phases of administration relative to the state university, the state college and the three normal schools will be dealt with, including duplication of courses.

SCHOOLS TO DEVOTE DAY TO STUDY OF EDWARD BOK

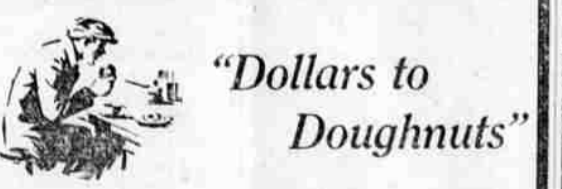
