Enforcement Bill Meets Suggestion of Hoover Board

(Associated Press Special Wire)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—A bill to authorize United States commissioners to pass on cases involving misdemeanor law violations, recommended in the report of the law enforcement commission submitted to congress by President Hoover, was introduced yesterday by Representative McKeown, democrat, Oklahoma.

The commissioners would be empowered to hear the evidence against such violators, and discharge defendants if justified by the evidence.

If in the opinion of the commissioner hearing the evidence the person charged was guilty the commissioners could recommend to the district court the punishment to be inflicted.

In this event the defendant could on his appearance in district court demand a trial or could waive trial and accept the sentence recommended by the commissioner.
