STATE MARKET AGENT'S LETTER

Vigilance Committee Needed.
Local Wheat Market.
Prosperous Institution.
New Field for Apples.

The Gresham Outlook, noting the extensive operations of thieves going about the country and stealing from the farms, barnyards and poultry houses, suggests that some kind of organization should be formed among the farmers for their mutual protection from such depredations, which are carried off by the use of automobiles and trucks. The Outlook gives an idea of the experience in its neighborhood and similar conditions exist in many places. It says: "If these conditions were confined to a small area or could be segregated the situation would be bad enough, but it is spreading with the speed of a contagious disease. Instances have been brought to the Outlook's attention where thieves have visited a farm-yard three times within a period of three weeks. Other farmers pocket their losses and say nothing, in the belief that publicity helps the thief rather than the farmer."

Pacific Northwest wheat markets were firm the past week, particularly on soft and western white and red wheats, for which there was an improved export inquiry, says the U. S. department of agriculture. Export sales during the week at Portland were reported approximately 1,500,000 bushels, principally to the United Kingdom and the continent. This was principally soft and western white with small amount of western red. Bids from the Orient were still below current quotations and no sales were reported. Milling demand was rather dull at both Portland and Seattle, but prices held steady and growers were reported to have disposed of around 1,000,000 bushels.

The Cooperative creamery at Mt. Angel has passed through the most active and prosperous year of its history. Martin Kesteven, manager of Monitor grades, is vice president and Frank Helmer is its manager, and the 500 patrons of the creamery live as far south as Jordan valley in Linn county, north to Colton and east and west from the Cascades to Willamette river. The institution made 200,000 pounds more butter in 1929 than in 1928. It now is one of the strongest cooperatives in the state, is financially sound and clear of debt. It operates a fleet of nine trucks to gather milk and cream, and one truck hauls butter and powdered milk daily to Portland.

New markets for boxed apples of the Northwest are now open in South America, as a steamship line plying between the west coast of North America and that of South America has equipped five of its large ships with refrigerators for compartments for 3,000 boxes each. Boxed apples heretofore had to be carried east and shipped from New York to South America—several thousand miles extra haul.

C. D. LATOURETTE, OREGON PIONEER, DIES IN HOTEL

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 15.—Funeral services for Charles D. Latourette, 75, pioneer Oregon resident and former mayor of Oregon City, who died suddenly in a downtown hotel here yesterday,

were uncompleted today. Death occurred during the night, physicians said. A hotel maid found the body.

Latourette was a leading figure in legal, political and financial circles in the state. He founded the First National bank at Oregon City.

Health Bulletin

COMMON SENSE DIETS

(State Board of Health)
There have been, and are, many diet fads. Going without breakfast is a fad. It may be all right, in individual cases, but generally it is all wrong. These people frequently eat enough at dinner to last twenty-four hours, overworking their digestive systems and throwing a sudden load on their organs of excretion. Common sense in eating, with a well-balanced diet, and cutting out such foods as are not properly digested or excreted, and noting the general health of the individual is the only way to acquire the end desired by a change in diet.

Food should not be eaten too hot, and should not be taken too hot or too cold. Any violent exercise after meals is inadvisable; neither is it advisable to lie down and sleep after a heavy meal. There is no more harm, if one requires it, in taking some simple, easily digestible food at bed time than there is for a baby to be fed and put to bed.

When one is very tired, he should not eat immediately as digestion will be prevented. Most any nervous disturbance, and pain of any kind will interfere with digestion. This is typically true of the ordinary type of eyestrain, headaches and when the digestion of a meal is inhibited; when nausea and vomiting occur the stomach may evacuate food taken many hours before.

On the other hand, it is wrong to withhold small amounts of easily digestible food because the patient has a fever. His condition must be kept up, if possible, throughout the fever process. This does not mean that during the first day or two of an acute disease one should not be almost on a starvation diet. Such management is frequently very beneficial. As the illness is prolonging, restriction of food must not be continued more than two or three days at most. During this starvation period the patient should receive plenty of water and fruit juice.

With ordinary sensible, simple foods, digestion should be almost without sensation. When there is an abnormal amount of stomach or intestinal gases, when there is pain, and when there is nausea or vomiting the cause should be sought. If the individual recognizes the cause, the indication can be corrected by himself. However, as soon as he does not recognize the cause he should seek medical advice. Indigestion may be caused by any one of the following: The eating of indigestible food, too much spice, too much condiments, too much sugar, too much fried food or too much soup, eating too rapidly, drinking too much ice water between meals; smoking too much; eating too soon after laborious work; working too soon after a hearty meal or being too tired mentally or physically to eat.

469,000 TO SHARE IN DIVIDENDS OF PHONE COMPANY

When the 121st dividend of the American Telephone and Telegraph company is paid today (Wednesday, January 15), it will be received by more than 469,000 stockholders, according to an announcement made today by J. R. Farrington, manager of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company.

This is an increase of 14,000 in the past three months. Mr. Farrington said. The company has the largest number of stockholders of any corporation in the world. Wider distribution of the stock is shown in the announcement of the company that the average number of shares held by each stockholder decreased from 29.6 as of September, 1929, to 28.2. Holders of 5 shares or less increased more than 6 per cent during the past quarter, and holders of 6 to 10 shares, inclusive, increased almost 4 per cent, while the groups holding large amounts remained almost stationary. No one individual holds as much as one per cent of the stock.

CHINA DEMANDS GOLD ON IMPORTS

NANKING, China, Jan. 15.—The national government today threatened the inspectors-general of customs to collect import duties on a gold basis from February 1. Commenting on the decision, the minister of finance stated that such action was necessary, as China otherwise would be unable to meet her foreign loan obligations secured on customs revenues.

MAUDE E. PARTIN SUES FOR DIVORCE

Suit for divorce was filed in the circuit court today by Maude E. Partin against Everett T. Partin. Criminal and inhuman treatment is alleged. They were married at Coquille, May 24, 1924. The plaintiff is represented by Attorney R. L. Eddy.

SKIRTS OF KNEE LENGTH PASS OUT IN STYLE CHANGES

NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—The short skirt is strictly de trop in the spring wardrobe, judging from the 140 models exhibited before the garment retailers of America.

The creations of 13 leading fashion arbiters, paraded before representatives of the trade in the annual spring promenade last night displayed skirted evening gowns and frocks for afternoon, street and sport wear with hem lines from four to six inches below the knee.

The consensus was that a certain latitude of personal preference was permitted in the skirt length rather than any hard and fast fashion ruling, but no models shown had knee-length skirts.

The nature, neckline and the molded silhouette were features of the dresses for all occasions.

Spring colors exhibited featured prints and plain colored fabrics, lively but not riotous. The plain colors seemed to predominate. Black backgrounds prevailed in the printed frocks for street and sport wear and the black and white theme was frequently repeated in both afternoon and evening dresses.

Almost every frock had its wrap definitely related in fabric and color. In fact ensembles out-numbered separate frock and coat combinations.

A percent of bridal costumes revealed that the 1930 bride will be arrayed much as the bride of 1929 was.

Orange and brown, orange and gray, vivid blues, black and white and combinations of yellow and green and red and white were much in evidence.

LIQUOR SEIZURE AT SEA INVOLVES FEDERAL QUESTION

WILMINGTON, Del., Jan. 15.—The federal district court of Delaware yesterday ruled that any person who in any foreign country owns or outfits a vessel and loads her with goods that may not be imported into the United States and sends her out with a view of landing the goods in this country, is liable under the tariff act regardless of her nationality.

The ruling was made by Judge Hugh M. Morris in denying a motion that a levy be instructed to return a verdict of not guilty in the case of John T. Callahan and others.

Callahan, whose home is said to be in Newark, N. J., is alleged to have been the owner of the schooner Charles Edward, which was seized by coast guards four miles off the Delaware coast on the night of November 10, 1927, with a cargo of liquor estimated to have been worth \$200,000.

Louis Halle, New York counsel for the defense, remarked in preliminary argument that if Callahan could be found guilty on this basis the federal court of New York and other places could be threatened by the United States courts.

Charge Army Employs Sex Appeal Methods

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 14.—(AP)—Federal Judge McNary today had under advisement the motion to dismiss the suit of Rukhsa Singh Gherwal, Hindu lecturer, who sought reinstatement as a citizen.

Gherwal was naturalized in 1922 when Federal Judge Worcester overruled the objections of the naturalization inspectors. In 1923 the United States supreme court decided that Hindus could not become citizens. The United States attorney here filed suit to cancel the citizenship and a decree was entered.

Gherwal's home is in Santa Barbara, Cal.

ROSEBURG STUDENT IN STATE UNIVERSITY BAND

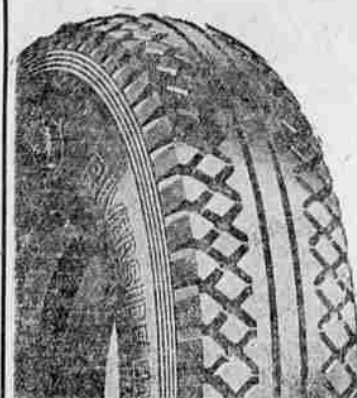

RED UPRISING ON CHINESE ISLAND PERILS AMERICANS

SHANGHAI, Jan. 15.—The United States destroyer MacLeish was heading for Hainan, port city of Hainan island, today to protect fifteen American war correspondents who had been launched a campaign of boating there.

Canton authorities also sent five gunboats to the scene in an effort to regain control of the city. In appealing for protection the Americans threatened that the communists, who for years have been using Hainan island as a stronghold, had started the besting and killing in a campaign against the authorities, who are controlled by Canton.

The message said the reds had seized the city and that there was much disorder, although the foreigners had not been harmed. The MacLeish was expected to reach the city today.

SURVIVOR TELLS HOW BRAVE SEAMEN MET THEIR DEATH

PLYMOUTH, England, Jan. 15.—A tale of how heroic British bluejackets on the naval tug St. Genny went bravely to their fate as the little vessel sank Sunday night was told today by William Sullivan, one of the five survivors of the crew of 25.

"The weather became so terrible, we put on our life belts as a precautionary measure," he said. "It was well that we did so for a few minutes later the St. Genny began to sink. All the ship's crew acted as if they were at exercises. They stood at their stations. There was no panic, no noise, nothing of that sort, even when the ship disappeared beneath us and we were buffeted about by the waves."

"We were in the water about half an hour before our companion boat, the St. Cyrus could pick us up. The seamanship of the captain of the St. Cyrus was marvelous."
