BRITANNIA YOUTH WITH K. O. RECORD TO FIGHT GENARO

PARIS, Jan. 17.—Yvon Trevidic, an 18-year-old youth from Brittany, is probably the youngest boxer in the history of the prize ring ever to get a crack at a title.

His chance comes tomorrow night when he meets Frankie Genaro of New York, generally recognized world's champion in the fly-weight class, over the 12-round route.

Trevidic, a red-headed, fiery fly-weight, has scored 19 victories out of 20 fights, eighteen of them by knockouts, and one on a decision. The 20th fight was a draw.

Genaro, who has been suffering from a boil under his right arm pit, had to ask for a postponement after an operation, as the battle originally was scheduled for January 11. He does not yet appear in the pink of condition but nevertheless is favored to defeat the youngster at odds of 8 to 5.
