EIELSON REPORT DOUBTED BUT HUNT WILL BE KEPT UP

NOME, Alaska, Jan. 17.—With prospects for favorable flying conditions indicated in weather forecasts, Pilots Pat Field and Ed Young were scheduled to take off in two Fairchild cabin planes today for Teller, Alaska, to prepare for the 500-mile hop to the ice-bound fur trading ship Nanuk at North Cape, Siberia, to engage in the search for Carl Ben Eielson and Earl Borland, American aviators missing since November 9. Eielson and Borland dropped from sight while attempting a flight to the Nanuk.

Although there was a tendency here to discount a Moscow report stating that Eielson's plane was reported to be down in the Anguema river district, Siberia, Alfred J. Lomen, manager of the Eielson-Borland rescue expedition, radioed Joe Croason to make a flight over the area as soon as possible to ascertain whether there was any truth in the report. Croason is now at the Nanuk. The Russian government has also ordered dog teams to proceed to Anguema river and in addition was preparing to send planes on scouting trips over the country.

The point at which the Russian dispatch reported the fliers down is about 120 miles southeast of the Nanuk and about 60 miles back from the coast. It was believed here, however, that if Eielson had landed in the territory indicated his presence there would have been reported earlier by dog team drivers who make occasional trips through the country.

DRAIN-REEDSPORT ROAD ICE-COATED

Robin Reed, well known wrestler, accompanied by Mrs. Reed and Miss Ann Chapman, editor of the Port Union, County of Reedspore, were visitors in Roseburg today. Mr. Reed is connected with the wood preserving plant now in operation near Dillard. They reported considerable difficulty in traveling the roads in the vicinity of Reedspore, as the road is covered with ice, making it hard to negotiate grades. The Drain-Reedspore road, it is reported, is almost impassable as a result of the ice. They came to Roseburg by way of Marshfield and had little difficulty after leaving Coos Bay.

SIDELIGHTS ON OREGON'S COLD

GARGANTUAN ASPIRANT FOR FISTIC TITLE



CARNERA HOOKS HIS MAN WITH HIS 14-LB. CANE. CARNERA'S GARGANTUAN PEDAL EXTREMITIES CARNERA LIFTS HIS MAN

Introducing the skyscraper of the ring—Primo Carnera, alias the Gargantuan Giant, who measures his pugilist by horsepower. Flatland's newest sensation has come to town and has more than lived up to all the fabulous stories that Turney and other visitors to Europe have told of him. The Italian boxer, who until two years ago was a circus performer with his enormous "tootsies" wrapped in burlaps, is regarded by experts as exceptionally promising material. A far better prospect, in fact, than was Jess Wil-

lard at the corresponding stage of his career.

Carnera is six feet ten inches tall, weighs nearly 500 pounds, and carries a 14-pound cane to support his hefty frame. He wears size 17 shoes and encases his neck in a size 20 collar. When he was an itinerant circus performer his best meal consisted of seven pounds of bread, but now his breakfast includes such trifles as six eggs, 20 slices of toast, two quarts of milk and an enormous slice of ham, and may be a bit of orange juice. And after this modest repast he is ready

for a limbering up at the gymnasium.

It is hoped late this month to stage Carnera a first bout in this country. Just now they are paying all the great fighters to find one to challenge conclusions with the Italian's fourteen-ounce boxing gloves, which measure sixteen and one-half inches, against the average ten and one-half "mitt." Up to now there has been no great rush of giant boxers to offer themselves as a sacrifice to Primo Carnera. George Godfrey, the human lion of coal, would be a logical op-

ponent after the Italian has had some experience of American ring methods.

Carnera is having his work-outs at Stillman's gymnasium and proving that he is not just another ring freak. He displays considerable agility and is remarkably limber. He does not rest heavily on his enormous "dugs" nor does he lumber around. He knows how to use his left and carefully pulls his punches against lighter opponents. At all events, he is a life-saver just when the ring was devoid of colorful personalities and thrills.

BAND CONCERT TO AID FINANCING OF TENNIS COURTS

An effort will be made to secure a large attendance in order to raise sufficient funds for the project, which is expected to cost about \$200.

BRADDOCK TO TAKE ON LOMSKI TONIGHT

CHICAGO, Jan. 17.—Two of the hardest punchers in the ring, James J. Braddock of New Jersey, and Leo Lomski, the "Aberdeen Assassin," will match rights and fight in the 10-round feature of Jack Dempsey's boxing show at the Coliseum tonight.

The winner has been promised one of the big "shows" in one of the several big matches Promoter Dempsey is planning for Chicago this winter.

Tonight's fight will be the last in the light heavyweight class for Braddock. Because of weight difficulties, he has decided to enter the heavyweight field.

NEUNER, NEWELL ADDRESS OFFICERS ON DRY STATUTE

PORTLAND, Jan. 17.—Unified responsibility for enforcement of the prohibition laws, rather than a system which permits "back passing" between departments, will solve all problems of the eighteenth amendment, said George Neuner, United States district attorney, in an address to district attorneys and sheriffs of Oregon. The proposed transfer of federal enforcement agencies from the treasury to the justice department was commended.

Declaring that confidence of the people was a vital necessity if the law was to be enforced, Neuner condemned certain methods of procedure, including conviction on uncorroborated testimony of "saloon pigeons" and excessive penalties for minor offenders, which he declared would hasten the repeal of the prohibition law.

The Law's Hand

Replacing of fines with jail sentences and the abatement of all places where liquor is regularly sold for one year, are steps in the direction of better enforcement, said W. K. Newell, district prohibition agent. The prohibition situation is much better in Oregon than in other states, where congestion of courts with prohibition cases has led to opposition to funds for additional arrests, he declared.

In 1929 the federal agents arraigned 743 defendants in liquor cases, of whom 601 were tried with 95 per cent of convictions, he said. Of these "defendants," 272 were booked in federal courts and 471 in other courts.

Federal courts were declared to have gone more heavily on jail sentences than on fines. The average fine in state courts was \$233.75; in federal court, \$93.60. The average sentence in federal court was 154 days; in state courts, 26 days.
