

FORMER RESIDENT OF YONCALLA DIES AT GOLD BEACH

(News-Review Douglas County Special)
YONCALLA, Jan. 18.—James D. Fay, aged 65 years, an ex-printer, died of Gold Beach, January 16 as a result of heart trouble. He was born at Jacksonville, Oregon, the son of Mrs. Gertrude Appleton Fay, and was a grandson of James and Cynthia Appleton, pioneers of 1845. His mother was the second daughter of the famous wagon trail leader, of Oregon Trail fame.

James Fay spent his boyhood in Yoncalla, where he attended the public schools, making his home with his grandparents. He moved to Gold Beach about 20 years ago and served for 6 years as postmaster. He worked on a number of large daily newspapers before going to Gold Beach, and while a resident of that place published the Gold Beach Globe and later the Independent, besides serving as correspondent for outside papers.

Wool Item Booster
WASHINGTON, Jan. 18.—The senate today approved an increase in the tariff on the wool class of wool felt hat bodies, but refused an additional duty of 12 cents apiece on blocked hat bodies and finished hats.

The rate agreed upon on wool hat bodies, looms, forms and shapes regardless of value, was 35 cents a pound and 50 per cent ad valorem. Existing levies are lower on the cheaper products and higher on the costlier articles.

The rate approved was much lower than that provided in the house bill—40 cents a pound and 75 per cent ad valorem.

Both the house bill and the finance committee measure proposed an additional rate of 25 cents an article of blocked or finished, but this was eliminated at the suggestion of Senator George, democrat, Georgia.

Poison Alcohol Stays
The house today rejected, 107 to 25, an amendment to the treasury post office supply bill to prohibit the placing of poison in industrial alcohol by the government to make it unfit for beverage purposes.

The republican steering committee of the house today decided to expedite legislation to carry out President Hoover's recommendations for strengthening prohibition enforcement.

The steering committee is an unofficial group composed of republican leaders that passes upon the legislative proposals to be considered on the floor. It determined to give the legislative right of way to the bills as rapidly as they are reported by various committees.

The first expected bill is the Williams measure to provide for the transfer of the prohibition suit from the treasury to the justice department.

Rum Runners Rapped
WASHINGTON, Jan. 18.—Chairman Wood of the appropriations committee said in the house yesterday he was "tired of all this 'mildly sympathetic' for rum runners who are shot down while violating the law."

Replying to Representative Chafetz, republican, Wisconsin, who expressed the opinion that more attention should be given to the "life saving" functions of the coast guard than to its "life taking" activities, Wood asserted that more lives were saved last year by the coast guard than ever before.

He said he had no sympathy for law violators who run around of the coast guard and added that "if a man is willing to wager his life against an officer sworn to uphold the law, let him have it."

The exchange came during debate on the treasury postoffice supply bill which would provide \$32,000,000 for the coast guard.
